Re: Arkansas Forestry Commission monthly activity report for February 2017

Dear Senator Teague and Representative Jean:

Per Act 59 of the 89th General Assembly, Fiscal Session, 2014, Section 48, the Arkansas Forestry Commission (AFC) is to report monthly fiscal and agency activities to the Arkansas Legislative Council. Please find attached the report for February, 2017.

February, with continued drought conditions and low rainfall, made fire suppression our top priority. A total of 295 fires were suppressed for a total of 5,853 acres burned. Recent rainfall has helped reduce fire activities.

Also, Baucum Nursery invited Staff from the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), one of AFC's partners, to tour AFC's nursery and learn the process of seedling production. The tour was attended by 21 NRCS employees. The NRCS employees were shown the process of seedling production from lifting to final packaging.

AFC strives to strengthen partnerships and productivity by providing information to those we work with.

ARKANSAS FORESTRY COMMISSION February 2017 Activity and Fiscal Report

FIRE PROTECTION

Wildfires: During February a total of 295 wildfires were suppressed for a total of 5853 acres burned. Ten year average for the month of February is 174 wildfires for 2993 acres burned.

Rural Fire Protection: Rural Fire Protection (RFP) assists rural volunteer fire departments (VFDs) with organization, training and equipment. RFP provides interest-free loans and administers federal grants to assist approximately 1,000 volunteer rural fire departments. The RFP shop provides maintenance to AFC equipment.

In February 2017, 45 rural fire departments (125 firefighters) were provided wildland fire training, including two Minority fire departments.

RFP received two Freightliners (Valued at \$332,446.00) and one Chevy Dually Pickup (Valued at \$16,902.00) from Department of Defense (DOD).

There were seven Department of Defense (DOD) vehicles and equipment issued to VFDs including: three Freightliners (Valued at \$498,669.00), three Pumper Trucks (Valued at \$507,325.02) and 1 High Density Water unit 25 hp/10 gpm pump (Valued at \$32,500.00).

There was one Federal Excess Personal Property (FEPP) equipment issued to a VFD. A FEPP boat (with trailer and two motors) (Valued at \$8,082.00).

138 DOD Recycling Control Point (RCP) items were received for redistribution to VFD's (Valued at \$22,887.30) including Haz Mat absorbent pillows.

Rural Fire provided two interest free loans via the Rural Fire Revolving Loan Fund in February 2017.

The RFP shop completed maintenance on seven AFC vehicles and four DOD Vehicles.

Firewise: Firewise staff and district personnel work with fire departments and civic organizations to make communities safer from the threat of wildfire through mitigation projects and community education initiatives. Arkansas leads the nation with 166 active Firewise communities. Recognized communities display Firewise signs at the city limits.

In February Firewise achieved the following:

- Hosted The National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) National Firewise State visit.
- Hosted two recognitions for new communities.
- Visited 18 fire chiefs and two Office of Emergency Management (OEM) coordinators to discuss Firewise.
- Assisted one community with Firewise renewal mitigation.

Law Enforcement: AFC has the authority to enforce the laws of the State of Arkansas, but focuses primarily on unlawful dumping, timber theft, forest fires, and forestry equipment theft and vandalism. AFC aggressively seeks prosecution of violators to deter such crimes. In February, AFC Investigators and district law enforcement officers opened two dumping, one equipment theft/vandalism, 32 fire, and six timber cases.

An AFC Law Enforcement Investigator attended a Law Enforcement Appreciation Dinner in Arkadelphia on February 9th.

Another AFC Law Enforcement Investigator went to the Greenwood High School for career day and talked about Forestry Law Enforcement. He also went to the bi-yearly Program Managers Meeting in Little Rock.

FOREST MANAGEMENT

Forest Stewardship/Rural Forestry Assistance Programs: AFC works with a diverse group of partners and professionals to conserve, protect, and enhance Arkansas's forests. The Forest Stewardship Program (FSP) is an opportunity for non-industrial private forest landowners who are interested in managing their property for wildlife, recreation, soil and water conservation, agro-forestry and\or for timber production to get a comprehensive multiple use forest management plan that is prepared by private consulting or AFC foresters, private consulting or AGFC private lands wildlife biologists, and USDA Natural Resource Conservation Service soil and water professionals. Arkansas has 4,758 landowners owning 869,558 acres that are enrolled in FSP. Landowners that implement practices under their FSP management plans become Forest Stewards. Arkansas has 1,299 Forest Stewards owning 280,476 acres.

For February, 12 FSP plans were prepared on 2,269 acres. In addition, AFC personnel provide technical assistance through the rural forestry program to landowners that are enrolled in USDA tree planting and forest management programs such as the Conservation Reserve Program, Environmental Quality Incentives Program, Wetland Reserve Program, and AFC Southern Pine Beetle Prevention and Restoration Program. AFC foresters prepared 92 rural forestry management plans on 8,949 acres. AFC personnel conducted 33 prescribed burns on 3,760 acres.

Urban Forestry Assistance: Urban Forestry Program staff provides assistance and training to communities, educational institutions, non-profit organizations, developers and homeowners on urban tree care, inventory and management.

AFC urban forestry staff have been busy providing educational programs across the state to a variety of volunteer organizations, educational institutions, and government agencies. In order to maintain a healthy urban forest it is important to have trained staff to care for the trees and volunteers to help make the program successful. Five workshops were given to city employees of Siloam Springs and Fayetteville, a garden club in Clinton, the Future Farmers of America students in Batesville and the Green County Master Gardeners in Paragould. The workshops were designed to assist public works and utility

employees, community volunteers, and students with new ideas and knowledge that will be beneficial to their communities. Topics for the workshops covered proper pruning, tree identification, and tree selection. One hundred and thirty-four individuals attended the workshops.

Forest Health: The Forest Health Specialist, Chandler Barton, assists AFC personnel statewide in efforts to maintain healthy, productive forest ecosystems by preventing, detecting, monitoring, and suppressing damaging insects and diseases. AFC offers technical assistance to landowners who encounter forest health issues.

- The Forest Health Specialist met with the Southern Group of State Foresters Forest Health Committee in Biloxi, MS. The group discussed current and future threats to forest health. Learning from successes in other states, Chandler will be incorporating new methods and technologies. For example, new advancements in mobile data collection (e.g., tablet and cell phone applications) will increase the ability of our field personnel to share information and record their accomplishments.
- Chandler assisted in planning a forest health meeting that was announced in February. The
 Western Gulf Forest Health Conference will take place in Shreveport on May 18-19. The meeting
 gathers forest health specialists who will focus their presentations on the specific needs of our
 region. The conference is open to landowners and forestry professionals.
- The warm weather in February has caused plants and trees to exit dormancy earlier. Flowering trees are a good indicator for the beginning of forest pest activity. Chandler made preparations to start pest detection surveys earlier this year. For example, southern pine beetle detection trapping will begin the first week of March.

Baucum Nursery: AFC's Baucum Nursery produces hardwood and pine seedlings for reforestation and afforestation efforts.

Seedling sales began on July 15, 2016. Through February 28, there were 465 on line orders and 101 traditional orders for total sales of 2,320,895 pine seedlings and 4,859,375 hardwood seedlings. Comparatively, in the same period in 2016, there were 673 on line orders and 152 traditional orders for total sales of 2,013,700 pine seedlings and 2,945,050 hardwood seedlings.

Lifting of seedlings began on December 12, 2016. A total of 2,568,775 hardwood and 1,446,000 pine seedlings were lifted and packed during the month of February. 690,975 pine and 1,763,224 hardwood bare root seedlings were shipped in February.

Received the following pounds of seed in February which will be planted as part of the crop for FY18:

Cherrybark Oak 1,475
Northern red Oak

On February 22, Baucum staff prepared 482.76 lbs of pine seed and placed in cooler for stratification, which is a simulation of the natural process pine seed would go through during the winter if the seed had fallen from the tree to the ground.

Tree Improvement: AFC's tree improvement program provides landowners with the highest possible genetic gain in pine and hardwood seed. One of AFC's objectives in tree improvement is establishing the highest genetic gain material in our newest pine and hardwood seed orchards. AFC Baucum Nursery makes available to landowners the improved varieties of pine and hardwood, which is the result of the tree improvement program.

In February, the Tree Improvement staff emptied trays and cleaned out the greenhouse after growing containerized pine seedlings for the Arkansas Natural Heritage Commission. All trays (over 300) were neatly stacked in the shed for storage. The staff also moved 756 containers of rootstock into the greenhouse for grafting and fertilized each container, planted 40 potted grafts and checked the Rosston site in preparation for planting a progeny test.

On February 1, staff planted 2440 bare root seedlings on 12ft x 12ft spacing for a growth and yield hardwood test on Dr. Rob Parkes' property in Scottsville AR. This 8-acre test will provide empirical data on the differences between Improved Nuttall oak vs unimproved and Improved Cherrybark oak vs unimproved. This test will also compare and contrast the two species.

The Reforestation Manager, Nursery Manager, Tree Improvement Reforestation Foreman and Baucum Admin Specialist attended the AFC mid-year meeting on February 2. Deputy State Forester, Reforestation Manager, Nursery Manager and Tree Improvement Reforestation Foreman hosted a tour and training session for NRCS on February 16. There were over 20 people in attendance for the training. On February 22, the Reforestation Manager and Tree Improvement Reforestation Foreman spent the day at the Hope Agricultural Experiment Station to tour the facility and discuss the possibilities of collaborative projects with the stations research scientists.

Best Management Practices: AFC provides BMP training to loggers and timber companies, conducts courtesy exams prior or during timber harvest operations and addresses logging complaints.

The BMP Coordinator conducted one courtesy exam in Perry County with 3 participants. Participant's consisted of two Landowners, and the AFC's BMP coordinator. The exam addressed the Arkansas Forestry Commissions BMP Program. The BMP Coordinator provided copies of Arkansas's BMP Implementation Reports, AFC's manual "BMPs for Water Quality Protection", the water quality complaint process and MOU with ADEQ.

The BMP coordinator continues to work with the Arkansas Forests and Drinking Water Committee. The Committee is planning to formalize a working group, mini strategic plan, and mission statement in the first quarter of 2017.

The BMP coordinator represented AFC at the Arkansas Forestry Association (AFA) Education Committee meeting. The meeting was to calendar upcoming and potential Landowner workshops for 2017.

The BMP coordinator represented AFC and provided reports at the quarterly AFA Forest Practices Committee meeting, and the Sustainable Forestry Committee meeting.

Forest Inventory and Analysis: AFC in cooperation with the USDA Forest Service Southern Research Station is responsible for collecting scientific data from permanently established plots located all over the state. The plots, each representing 5,937 acres, are strategically located on a three-mile by three-mile grid. The inventory plots have been generating data since they were established in the 1950's. Natural resource

managers use the data to make management decisions and follow Arkansas' natural resource trends through time.

The FIA crew completed 50 plots for the month of February. FIA crews are now 80% complete with Inventory 2016.
