1 INTERIM STUDY PROPOSAL 2017-033 2 REQUESTING THAT THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL REFER TO THE HOUSE 3 COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION A STUDY TO EVALUATE THE NEED FOR SCHOOL-4 LEVEL NUTRITION DATA, THE IMPACT OF PROVIDING BREAKFAST-AFTER-5 6 THE-BELL PROGRAMS, AND THE IMPACT OF THE COMMUNITY ELIGIBLITY 7 PROVISION AND OTHER UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE 8 NUTRITION MODELS ON SCHOOL BREAKFAST PARTICIPATION AMONG HIGH-NEED ARKANSAS STUDENTS. 9 10 11 WHEREAS, more than nineteen percent (19%) of Arkansans struggle to 12 provide enough food for their families and more than twenty-six percent (26%) of Arkansas children are food insecure, meaning they do not have consistent 13 14 access to adequate food; and 15 16 WHEREAS, more than sixty-three (63%) of Arkansas public school students 17 qualify for free or reduced-price school meals, yet many of those low-income students are not eating the nutritious school breakfast offered due to 18 barriers such as social stigma, late buses or carpools, long cafeteria lines, 19 20 and tight class schedules; and 21 22 WHEREAS, eating breakfast as part of the school day is associated with 23 positive student behavioral health and academic outcomes such as improved 24 concentration in class, lower rates of chronic absenteeism, fewer classroom 25 disruptions, and less frequent visits to the school nurse; and 26 27 WHEREAS, Breakfast-after-the-Bell programs, such as Breakfast in the Classroom, Grab and Go Breakfast, and Second Chance Breakfast, are proven 28 29 meal delivery methods to boost school breakfast participation and related positive outcomes and are recommended by the Governor's Healthy Active 30 31 Arkansas plan as an effective means to reduce childhood obesity; and 32 33 WHEREAS, adopting the Community Eligibility Provision of the United 34 States Department of Agriculture would allow eligible low-income school 35 districts to serve all students breakfast and lunch at no charge, and when 36 combined with a Breakfast-after-the-Bell program, could maximize students'

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school breakfast participation and enhance the nutrition budgets of the
school districts these students attend through increased meal reimbursements;
and

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5 WHEREAS, Arkansas schools have realized an increase in the number of 6 breakfast meals served to low-income students of three million six hundred 7 thousand (3,600,000) meals served and a federal meal reimbursement increase 8 of ten million four hundred thousand dollars (\$10,400,000) since 2011, when 9 Arkansas No Kid Hungry campaign partners began supporting school districts to 10 offer Breakfast-after-the-Bell programs and, more recently, to adopt the 11 Community Eligibility Provision; and

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WHEREAS, although Arkansas ranks seventh in the nation in low-income 13 14 students eating school breakfast as compared to lunch, an additional fifteen 15 thousand nine hundred five (15,905) of those students struggling with hunger 16 would be served if Arkansas reached the goal of seventy percent (70%) 17 participation rate of low-income students eating school breakfast compared to school lunch participation, and school districts would realize an additional 18 19 four million three hundred thousand dollars (\$4,300,000) in federal meal 20 reimbursements for school nutrition budgets of school districts; and 21

WHEREAS, regarding the connection between student nutrition and academic performance, there is a need for more data that would enhance our understanding of the true positive impact of school breakfast participation on student health, behavioral and academic success,

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27 NOW THEREFORE,

28 BE IT PROPOSED BY THE ARKANSAS LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL OF THE NINETY-FIRST29 GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS:

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THAT the Arkansas Legislative Council refer to the House Committee on Education a study to evaluate the need for school-level nutrition data, the impact of providing Breakfast-after-the-Bell programs, and the impact of the Community Eligibility Provision and other United States Department of Agriculture nutrition models on school breakfast participation among highneed Arkansas students.
