Re: Arkansas Forestry Commission monthly activity report for September 2017

Dear Senator Sample and Representative Branscum:

Per Act 59 of the 89th General Assembly, Fiscal Session, 2014, Section 48, the Arkansas Forestry Commission (AFC) is to report monthly fiscal and agency activities to the Arkansas Legislative Council. Please find attached the report for September 2017.

September brought, as expected, heightened fire danger as well as fire activity. A total of 66 wildfires were suppressed for a total of 738 acres burned. Recent rains have slightly lowered the danger and activity.

Also in the month of September, forty participants from fourteen conservation and fire partners across the state participated in the 2017 Arkansas Prescribed Fire as a Management Tool Workshop held September 25-29 at Camp Robinson. The workshop, commonly referred to as Prescribed Burn School, has been held since 1997 and is organized by the Arkansas Prescribed Fire Council.

AFC continues to keep Arkansans safe from wildfires as well as train partners in proper forest management tools.

ARKANSAS FORESTRY COMMISSION September 2017 Activity and Fiscal Report

FIRE PROTECTION

Wildfires: During September a total of 66 wildfires were suppressed for a total of 738 acres burned. The ten-year average for the month of September is 120 wildfires for 1778 acres burned.

Search and Rescue Assistance: An AFC crew assisted in a search and rescue for a missing 9-year-old boy in the northwestern part of Madison County. He was found safe.

Rural Fire Protection: Rural Fire Protection (RFP) assists rural volunteer fire departments (VFDs) with organization, training and equipment. RFP provides interest-free loans and administers federal grants to assist volunteer rural fire departments. RFP oversees both the Federal Excess Personal Property (FEPP) program and the Firefighter Property (FFP) program. The RFP shop also provides maintenance to AFC equipment.

On September 11, 2017, Rural Fire Protection welcomed our new Administrator, Kathryn Mahan-Hooten. She comes to us from Arkansas Federal Surplus Property and will be a great asset to our program.

In September 2017

- 73 rural fire departments (187 firefighters) were provided wildland fire training, including one minority department and ten AFC personnel.
- RFP received two Stewart & Stevenson M1083 Brush trucks (valued at \$256,152.00), two Chevy Brush Trucks (valued at \$31,502.00), one GM Tahoe Service Truck (valued at \$32,990.00), two Gooseneck trailers (valued at \$30,800.00), and six Hose Assemblies (Valued at \$30,030.78)
- There were four Department of Defense (DOD) vehicles issued to VFD's including three Freightliners (valued at \$498,669.00) and one Kovatch Pumper (valued at \$169,108.34).
- 552 DOD Recycling Control Point (RCP) items were received for redistribution to VFD's (valued at \$44,893.47) including, fabric tanks, 20-ton bottle jack, split leather gloves, hose assembly, high visibility vests, pry bar, boom spill containments, spotlights, flashlights, work lights and Xenon strobe lights, firefighting helmets, and firefighting jackets.
- Rural Fire provided two interest free loans via the Rural Fire Revolving Loan Fund in September 2017.
 - Wirth FD '91 E-1 Pumper \$9,000.00 Sharp Co. D-8
 - Burnt Ridge '88 FMC Pumper \$11,625.00 Van Buren D-7

- The RFP shop completed maintenance on 11AFC vehicles and three DOD vehicles.
- Three Districts have submitted their completed files, with awarded applications, size forms for personal protective equipment (PPE) and, non-awarded applications, for the 2017 Wildfire Volunteer Fire (WFVF) Grant.
- The 2017 Annual Fire Show (Oct 18th) preparations are underway. This year is looking to be one of the biggest show's we have had due to the publicity received from publications and social media, implemented by Adriane Barnes, Public Information Manager of the AAD.

Firewise: Firewise staff and district personnel work with fire departments and civic organizations to make communities safer from the threat of wildfire through mitigation projects and community education initiatives. Arkansas leads the nation with 170 active Firewise communities. Recognized communities display Firewise signs at the city limits.

Firewise Accomplishments September 2017:

- Added three new communities
- Conducted three Risk Assessment trainings and one Initial Presentation
- Attended the USFS Go Native, Grow Native event; presented at the Hot Springs Village American Legion on Wildfires in the Wildland Urban Interface; and had a booth at the Saline County Family Prep Day.
- Processed 37 Firewise Community \$500 Grants

Law Enforcement: AFC has the authority to enforce the laws of the State of Arkansas, but focuses primarily on unlawful dumping, timber theft, forest fires, and forestry equipment theft and vandalism. AFC aggressively seeks prosecution of violators to deter such crimes. AFC Investigators and district law enforcement officers opened three dumping, three fire related, and ten timber cases. They closed, three fire related, one timber, and two dumping cases.

An AFC Law Enforcement Investigator attended a two-day Agro terrorism class in Little Rock, assisted with the county ranger training in Malvern and Mountain View, assisted the Livestock and Poultry Division with a case in Jackson County, and he attended a joint Law Enforcement mock child abduction training in Independence County.

Another AFC Law Enforcement Investigator attended the Arkansas Department of Emergency Management Conference in Rogers, AR. He also, attended a class on Animal/Plant Joint Criminal Epidemiological Investigations, a course conducted by the FBI in Little Rock, AR.; conducted law enforcement training for 70 AFC law enforcement personnel across the state; and he also, assisted Arkansas Livestock and Poultry Department with Equine case.

A third AFC Law Enforcement Investigator assisted in county ranger training in Mountain View and Malvern. He also assisted other Law Enforcement Officers with timber theft investigations.

FOREST MANAGEMENT

Forest Stewardship/Rural Forestry Assistance Programs: AFC works with a diverse group of partners and professionals to conserve, protect, and enhance Arkansas's forests. The Forest Stewardship Program (FSP) is an opportunity for non-industrial private forest landowners who are interested in managing their property for wildlife, recreation, soil and water conservation, agro-forestry and/or timber production to get a comprehensive multiple use forest management plan that is prepared by private consulting or AFC foresters, private consulting or AGFC private lands wildlife biologists, and USDA Natural Resource Conservation Service soil and water professionals. Arkansas has 4,989 landowners owning 921,936 acres that are enrolled in FSP. Landowners that implement practices under their FSP management plans become Forest Stewards. Arkansas has 1,294 Forest Stewards owning 282,687 acres.

For September, 43 FSP plans were prepared on 8,836 acres. In addition, AFC personnel provide technical assistance through the rural forestry program to landowners that are enrolled in USDA tree planting and forest management programs such as the Conservation Reserve Program, Environmental Quality Incentives Program, Wetland Reserve Program, and AFC Southern Pine Beetle Prevention and Restoration Program. AFC foresters prepared 66 rural forestry management plans on 5,675 acres. AFC personnel conducted 26 prescribed burns on 1,240 acres.

Urban Forestry Assistance: Urban Forestry Program staff provides assistance and training to communities, educational institutions, non-profit organizations, developers, and homeowners on urban tree care, inventory and management.

Urban Forestry has been implementing programs and planning more progress for the future. Urban Forestry partnered with the WWI memorial tree program to get the first tree of 75 planted. Urban Forestry staff also conducted the Shade Trees on Playgrounds meeting to help 30 teachers and Urban Staff educate the children on the importance of the trees being planted on their playgrounds. Urban Forestry also presented to over 100 individuals amongst the Iris Garden club in Clinton AR and the Forest Source Water Protection (Beaver Lake Watershed Symposium) in Northwest Arkansas. The garden club learned about different conifers and evergreens they can plant. The Beaver Lake Watershed Symposium attendees were able to learn about the role urban forestry plays in their environment.

Forest Health: The Forest Health Specialist, Chandler Barton, assists AFC personnel statewide in efforts to maintain healthy, productive forest ecosystems by preventing, detecting, monitoring, and suppressing damaging insects and diseases. AFC offers technical assistance to landowners who encounter forest health issues.

- Variable oakleaf caterpillar, a moth caterpillar that defoliates oaks, was a nuisance in Hot Springs. The caterpillar completely defoliated some urban and yard trees on properties in Garland, Hot Springs, Clark, Pike, Polk, Howard, and Conway Counties. The pest does not cause tree death, but the amount of droppings and dead caterpillars under the trees can be troublesome. Such outbreaks occur in cycles, and it was last observed in a widespread outbreak in 2013.
- Southern pine beetle (SPB) is not active in Arkansas; however, it is still active in other southern states. Alabama and Mississippi are experiencing severe outbreaks. The situation in Mississippi is unprecedented. Over 4,000 spots of red trees were detected by aerial survey over the summer. Most of the spots were located on public lands, including the Homochitto, Bienville, and Tombigbee National Forests. An Incident Management Team was established in order to manage the SPB outbreak. A process of aerial detection, ground-truthing, marking, and felling is being

used. In many cases the SPB spot cannot be salvaged. Therefore, mechanized or chainsaw crews are simply doing a cut-and-leave operation. Freshly attacked and a buffer of un-attacked trees are felled inward, and vacated trees are left standing in the interest of time and safety. Cut-and-leave operations can be successful by controlling the advancing front of the spreading infestation. This method works by disrupting the chemical communication among beetles and trees.

- The Forest Health Specialist is working with other state agencies to prepare and educate Arkansas in the event that SPB returns to outbreak potential.

Baucum Nursery: AFC's Baucum Nursery produces hardwood and pine seedlings for reforestation and afforestation efforts.

Seedling sales began on July 15. Through October 1, there were 295 on line orders and 84 traditional orders for total sales of 835,600 pine and 4,556,750 hardwood. Comparatively, in the same period in FY 17, there were 200 on line orders and 59 traditional orders for total sales of 1,919,450 pine and 4,056,450 hardwood.

Baucum Nursery staff conducted the following cultural practices for the FY18 crop during the month of September:

- Fertilized cypress every week in order to attain a 36" height for a special order.
- Top pruned all hardwood in Fields #7 and #2.
- Top pruned pine. Sprayed micro nutrient and Peters 20-20-20 on pine and hardwood.
- Sprayed Roundup on the ends of beds. Sprayed pro line fungicide on pine and small hardwood.
- Used disc and do-all in two fields in preparation for upcoming methyl bromide treatment.
- Cleaned up improved cherrybark oak, improved nuttall oak and sawtooth oak orchards in preparation for acorn harvest.
- Began a new cultural practice of plowing between rows of hardwood seedlings. The shielded sprayer has the option of attaching plow shanks that are properly spaced to run between the rows of hardwood seedlings. This practice helps with weed control and water absorption.

Tree Improvement: AFC's tree improvement program provides landowners with the highest possible genetic gain in pine and hardwood seed. One of AFC's objectives in tree improvement is establishing the highest genetic gain material in our newest pine and hardwood seed orchards. AFC Baucum Nursery makes available to landowners the improved varieties of pine and hardwood, which is the result of the tree improvement program.

During the month of September, the Bluff City Tree Improvement staff completed the following:

- Bush hogged production orchards in preparation for cone harvest.
- Inventoried and put flagging on trees to be harvested; same ribbon is used on every tree of the same family so the harvest crew can keep cones separated by family.
- Bush hogged Dr. Parkes hardwood test site near Scottsville.
- Tree Improvement Manager Randy O'Neal met with International Forest Company (IFCO) reps and showed them the trees that cones will be harvested for them. IFCO was the winning bidder for the cone harvest of lower gain families that are not needed by AFC. Cone harvest began on September 25 and will continue through most of October.

Best Management Practices: AFC provides BMP training to loggers and timber companies, conducts courtesy exams prior or during timber harvest operations and addresses logging complaints.

The BMP coordinator responded to one (1) timber harvesting complaint, through the Arkansas Game & Fish Commission (AGFC). The complaint was found valid and located in Lawrence County. The BMP Coordinator responded to a complaint by a site visit and followed up by a report back to the AGFC addressing risk and potential risk to water quality on the construction of a logging road. The report also provided information on the corrective measures needed to mitigate the risk.

The BMP Coordinator conducted two technical logger training sessions. One was for Foresters, Loggers and Contractors in Idabel, Oklahoma, for Huber Corporation. The workshop was attended by approximately 45 participants. The second training was provided for the Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) for District Conservationists at Ferndale, Arkansas. The workshop was attended by approximately 40 participants.

Completed one Courtesy Exam in Pulaski County, which was a good preventative exercise. (Prevent Before the Event)

The BMP coordinator continues to work with the Arkansas Forests and Drinking Water Committee and the Forum planning committee. The Committee is planning a south central forum to be held at De Gray Lake Lodge November 7 & 8 2017.

The 8th BMP survey is under way using digital satellite images to locate tracts. The BMP Coordinator has started the ground survey and collecting data on logging sites randomly selected. We hope to complete the survey this fall, with data analysis and final report published by June 2018.

The BMP Coordinator represented AFC at the Arkansas Natural Resource Commission Nonpoint Source Pollution Stakeholder & Project Review Meeting. The two-day meeting provided updates from EPA, ANRC, and the University of Arkansas Division of Agriculture. The second day was EPA 319h grant projects updates in which the BMP Coordinator reported on the AFC 319h project (BMP Implementation Assessment).

Forest Inventory and Analysis: AFC in cooperation with the USDA Forest Service Southern Research Station is responsible for collecting scientific data from permanently established plots located all over the state. The plots, each representing 5,937 acres, are strategically located on a three-mile by three-mile grid. The inventory plots have been generating data since they were established in the 1950's. Natural resource managers use the data to make management decisions and follow Arkansas' natural resource trends through time.

FIA completed 94 plots for the month of September. We are 58% complete with Inventory 2017.
