RE: Arkansas Department of Energy and Environment, Arkansas Energy Office, Weatherization Assistance Program

Dear Co-Chairs:

Thank you for your willingness to schedule a special meeting of the PEER Subcommittee regarding the \$32,895,998 in Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) funds allocated for the expansion of the Arkansas Weatherization Assistance Program. Since the ALC meeting last Friday, we confirmed that the complete application is not due by July 1, 2022. The only item due no later than July 1, 2022, is the Notice of Intent (NOI) for this program. Therefore, if acceptable to the committee, we can wait until the regularly scheduled PEER Subcommittee meeting in July for additional review. However, if preferred, we are willing to attend a special meeting.

In the interim, the Department intends to submit the NOI by the July 1st deadline to the U.S. Department of Energy (USDOE) indicating our intention to operate the expanded weatherization program funded by the IIJA. The NOI signals the Department's intent to file a complete application in the coming months. The NOI also qualifies the Department to receive fifteen percent (15%) of the anticipated IIJA funds for program planning and administration costs. However, the Department will not file our complete application nor expend any of the expanded funds until a final and favorable review by the PEER Subcommittee is granted.

Thank you for your consideration of this item. Please let us know if this item will be placed on the agenda for the July PEER Subcommittee or if a special meeting for consideration of this request is preferred.

# Responses Requested by ALC June 14, 2022 Arkansas Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP)

#### **Program Eligibility and Outreach**

Each WAP provider determines eligibility from individual applications filled out by interested individuals. Eligibility is based on total household income which must be at or below 200% of federal poverty level.

Example: for 2022, maximum income for a household of 4 is \$55,500.

Each WAP provider advertises the program on its website and through local media and other community based organizations serving low-income individuals and families.

#### **Selection of Contractors**

Contractors to work on homes where WAP installs Energy Efficiency and Health & Safety measures are selected through a sealed bid procurement process that is prescribed by E&E based on federal procurement guidelines. Each CAA/other WAP provider is required to conduct a procurement process every one (1) to three (3) years in its own area. E&E oversees that process to ensure rules are followed.


#### Allocation by County.

Funds are allocated by county and funds for counties are aggregated to create the total allocation for each WAP provider. The allocation formula used in Arkansas is based primarily on US Census data for percent of low-income population in the state that is located in each county. In addition, aging housing stock and climatic factors in each county are part of the formula. The funding formula was developed by the University of Arkansas/Little Rock research office for Arkansas WAP in 2011.
