Dear Governor Hutchinson:

Reference is made to Act 1 of the 90<sup>th</sup> General Assembly's Third Extraordinary Session, the <u>Arkansas Highway Improvement Plan of 2016</u> (hereinafter called the Plan).

The additional funding generated under the Plan is to be used to provide the required State match for Federal funds. At the inception of the Plan, \$76.1 million in additional funding was estimated. The breakdown for these funds for State Fiscal Year (SFY) 2018 was as follows:

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As you are aware the Plan established the Arkansas Highway Transfer Fund. Funding sources deposited into the AHTF are from the Securities Reserve and Surplus Funds.

Section 13 of the Plan, Arkansas Code 19-6-832 (c) reads as follows:

In the event revenues to the department are insufficient to fully address the highway construction and maintenance needs of the state, the department may provide a written document to the Governor outlining the reasons that additional funding is needed and requesting that the Governor provide a recommendation to the Legislative Council or the Joint Budget Committee for review and approval of the transfer of funds in the Arkansas Highway Transfer Fund to the State Highway and Transportation Department Fund.

The Department respectfully requests your recommendation to the appropriate legislative body to transfer  $\frac{\$1,065,729.79}{\$1,065,729.79}$  from the Arkansas Highway Transfer Fund to the State Highway and Transportation Fund. This brings the total amount requested from the Securities Reserve Fund up to the \$20 million cap in accordance with the provisions of the Plan.

The \$20 million from the Securities Reserve Fund combined with the redirection of \$4 M in the diesel tax (\$2.7 million net to ARDOT) and the elimination of the State Central Services Deduction from the ½ cent sales tax (\$5.4 million net to ARDOT) brings the total amount of State funds available from the Plan to match Federal funds to \$28.1 million.

#### Remaining Shortfall in State Matching Funds

- The original estimated shortfall in State matching funds needed to fully take advantage of all the Federal funds available to Arkansas was \$50 million.
- However, as shown in the enclosed Federal Highway Administration Notice, the states have been apportioned additional Federal funding pursuant to the Department of Transportation Appropriations Act, 2018. Arkansas has received an additional \$22.4 million in Federal funds. This will require an additional \$5.6 million in State matching funds.

Current State funding levels for highways are insufficient to provide the State match required to use all Federal funds appropriated to Arkansas. Having adequate cash flow from month to month allows us to plan and obligate funds in a more effective manner and prevents the Department from having to delay projects due to a lack of State matching funds. Therefore, we also request that the \$27.5 million shortfall be addressed as soon as possible. The Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) for which these funds are available begins on October 1, 2017 and ends on September 30, 2018. Because of Federal Highway Administration FFY deadlines, it is important that we know by late July if the shortfall in State matching funds will become available so that we may take full advantage of all Federal funds appropriated to Arkansas.

Thank you for your work to meet our State's immediate highway funding needs. I appreciate your, your administration's, and the legislature's efforts to address our funding shortfall.

We look forward to the future as we strive to find a long term funding solution that will enable us to continually improve the transportation system in our great State by maintaining a state of good repair, enhancing safety, increasing mobility and encouraging economic development.
