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## Arkansas DHS Division of County Operations (DHS-DCO) American Rescue Plan – USDA Food and Nutrition Services SNAP State Administrative Expenditures Grant

On March 11, 2021, President Joseph R. Biden signed into law the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021. This legislation provides support for American families, State governments, and communities to rebuild lives and respond to the COVID-19 public health emergency. Section 1101(b) of the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 provides an additional \$1.15 billion of appropriated funds for SNAP administrative expenses to assist State agencies in carrying out legislative provisions and administering SNAP. These funds are available at a 100 percent reimbursement rate.

Arkansas will receive \$3,626,229.39. These funds must be obligated by September 30, 2023 and expended by December 31, 2023.

FNS' expectation is that State agencies will use these funds to achieve the President's objective with this legislation, which is to make a difference in people's everyday lives. This funding provides a unique opportunity for State agencies to make investments into their business processes, including technology, that will increase access while maintaining stewardship of Federal dollars.

DHS-DCO will use these funds in the following categories:

Certification - Arkansas will use approximately 57.5% of FY 2022 SAE allocation to defray onetime costs to replace our county office in Jefferson County. Arkansas DHS maintains a county office location in each county in the state to provide services to our clients. Jefferson County is one of our most heavily populated counties in our state. Our current location is at capacity with no room for growth as our population changes and the need to be able to house additional staff can change. Also in our current location, we experience multiple, frequent maintenance issues that require repair. The current location has previously had copper stolen from the HVAC units and other damage due to criminal activity that has occurred in the vicinity of the office. Although these issues are mitigated as they occur, we determined that a more suitable location and building would better meet the needs of our clients and staff. We have located and leased a building that will meet future needs for growth, is in excellent condition and has adequate parking to for clients and staff. The new location is still within an area where many of the clients we serve live, and close to the city high school. We will use approximately \$1,600,000 (44%) to cover the cost to remodel the existing space to suit the needs of an active county office, including private interview spaces to conduct in-person interviews as needed for SNAP clients. Private kiosk space will be available for online applicants to ensure privacy and ease of access. Arkansas will save \$1,450,000 in rental charges over the next ten years by paying this renovation cost at the beginning of our lease. Approximately \$585,000 (16%) of Arkansas' allocation will be used to cover cubicles, furniture, set up, and physical moving expenses for the new office. The following table provides specific details on the planned use of funds:

- Certification Arkansas will use approximately 14.5% of these funds to replace work out
  furniture and improve physical security in county offices with improved keypad entry or card
  access entry locks, improved visibility and lighting at exit doors. Approximate amount equals
  \$500,000.
- ADP Operations: Upgrades to support IT infrastructure in county offices Approximately 28% will be spent to replace network switches, cables, laptops and scanners that support DHS-DCO operations in county offices. In addition to this, updates to the SNAP Works Employment and Training Management Information System will be completed to improve provider interactions with the system. The following table provides specific details on the planned equipment and software order:

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## DHS – Division of Aging, Adult, and Behavioral Health Services (DAABHS) American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) Mental Health Block Grant Arkansas Plan

Arkansas will be using ARPA funds to develop, enhance, and improve our crisis continuum services, enhance evidence-based practice, and implement a First Episode of Psychosis/Early Serious Mental Illness (FEP/ESMI) pilot program.

Our focus on the crisis continuum services will include additional expansion (beyond the COVID Relief Plan) of our Peer Workforce. We have a goal of infusing more Peers into judicial, correctional, law enforcement, and child welfare settings. These funds will ensure appropriate training, program development, and Peer Supervision for this workforce. Peers providing services in these areas will ensure coordination/connection with those in need of behavioral health services. \$5,500,000.00

Additionally, our crisis continuum is currently lacking accommodations for the deaf, hard of hearing, and Spanish speaking communities. Ready access to credentialed interpreters is crucial for those experiencing mental health crises. Effective communication may also be able to divert individuals from more costly crisis services. \$480,000.00

Our current crisis system does not ensure adequate follow-up with individuals, post-crisis. With the enhanced Peer workforce, our plan will include incorporating Peers to staff an informational line which will incorporate a "warm line" along with follow-up for 6 months after the initial crisis. This element of the crisis continuum encompasses the mandatory 5% set aside for Crisis Services per our federal block grant requirements. \$1,288,679.00

Finally, our current crisis continuum is lacking a state-wide platform for outreach and informational campaigns on how to seek crisis services. In addition to these campaigns, Arkansas will develop a portal for treatment providers and community supports. This resource will be helpful with the implementation of 9-8-8. \$2,000,000.00

Evidence-based practice enhancement will target providing our mental health professionals with nationally recognized training models. One critical area of training will focus on trauma-focused care. In addition, Mental Health First Aid training will be made widely available for Arkansans who work with the public but have limited knowledge of how to deal with those in crisis, including referrals for appropriate services. \$1,000,000.00

Arkansas lags behind many other states with implementation of evidence-based care for our FEP/ESMI citizens. As this is a priority population identified by our federal block grant. This grant requires a minimum of 10% of the funds be dedicated toward this population. A full Coordinated Special Care model will be implemented with this funding. \$1,248,000.00

Support and administration of the ARPA program components through hiring of 3 positions to oversee these programs. \$970,351.00
