Upon reading the ADC Secretarial Directive regarding notifications, specifically the section labeled B. 3. "**The Internal Affairs Administrator will be notified first on incidents involving criminal activity. After consulting with the Secretary and appropriate Division Director, the Internal Affairs Administrator will notify local law enforcement; including the State Police or County Sheriff where the incident occurred,**" it could be argued that the Secretarial Directive charges the Internal Affairs Administrator with notifying law enforcement of an escape, due to the fact that an escape from a correctional facility is considered criminal activity.

On July 1, 2025, I spoke with ADC Secretary Lindsay Wallace regarding the Secretarial Directive related the notification process. Wallace explained that the portion of the directive examined does not apply to escapes. Wallace provided an email with an explanation, which is attached to this report.

INTERVIEW OF SUBJECT

On July 3, 2025, I interviewed Benny Magness. Magness is identified as the Chairman of the Board of Corrections. The below is an interview summary, it is not intended to be a verbatim account and does not memorialize all statements made during the interview. Communications by the parties in the interview were electronically recorded. A copy of the recording will be included in the case file.

Magness advised that he was notified of Hardin's escape by Director Dexter Payne. Magness said that he was satisfied with the timeliness of the notification and that Lt. Steven Lively had also attempted to notify him because Magness flies a helicopter for the Sheriff's Department. Magness said that he went to the NCU command center after he completed his flight for the Sheriff's Office. Magness said that when he arrived at the command center, Warden Hurst was the incident commander, until Deputy Director William Straughn arrived. When asked if there were any failures that he observed, Magness said "after the escape and notifications, I think it went just as well as it could have." Magness said "there were two failures that day. One being the kitchen person letting the inmate out without staff being out there with him and of course the guy that opened the gate and let him out." Magness recommended some type of system that sounds a horn of notifies the Captain if someone is let outside of the gate when there is no officer on the ground.

During the course of this investigation, it was determined that the North Central Unit (NCU) participates in Unit Emergency Preparedness Plan exercises on a quarterly basis, in accordance with NCU policy. The most recent exercise involving an escape scenario occurred on November 13, 2024. Documentation associated with this training will be incorporated into the official investigative file. In addition to escape drills, the NCU conducts various other emergency response simulations, including but not limited to: Stabbing Drill, Man Down Drill, Fire Drill, Hanging Drill, Tornado Drill, and Hostage Drill.

Since January 2024, the NCU has conducted approximately twenty-three (23) such training exercises. Records evidencing these scenarios were provided by Lieutenant Robert Cross of the NCU and they will be made part of the investigative file. NCU policy regarding Safety and Emergency Procedures will also be made part of the investigative file.

PART IV - (Narrative)

Narrative: A brief narrative is required of the drill, table top or exercise prior to the Wardens final approval. Additional comments and after action recommendations may be added in this area after the completion of the drill or exercise.

Narrative: On 11/13/2024 a Field Utility Squad will be working on the East side of the Airstrip. It will be simulated that the Field Utility Sergeant's horse would get spooked, begin to buck, and throw the rider from the back of the horse. The rider will be knocked unconscious, and the high rider will have to come out of the woods and take control of the squad. While verifying his count the high rider will observe he has a bad count. A dog kennel Inmate will be staged in the woods and begin laying a track simulating an Inmate ran from the squad while the rider was unconscious.

Observation: On 11/13/2024 at approximately 10:00AM Cpl. Felton was working his assigned squad on the East side of the Airstrip. At this time, he was thrown from his horse rendering him unconscious. Sgt. Ward immediately took over the squad, notified his supervisor (Lt. Rush), and moved the squad away from the area. Lt. Rush immediately notified the Infirmary of the situation. There were 14 Inmates that turned out to work on this squad. At approximately 10:01AM Sgt. Ward conducted a count of the squad and found that he only had 13. He immediately notified his supervisor of the situation. At 10:04AM the infirmary arrived on scene and began treating Cpl. Felton. Lt. Rush then notified the Field Captain of the bad count and began turning all squads back into the building. Captain Brandon began the emergency checklist and started an emergency count at 10:08AM. The Inmate that was missing was identified as Inmate Clark, Derek ADC# 175246. The Inmate's property was searched resulting in staff finding a letter that indicated the escape was premeditated and he was just "Awaiting an opportunity". During this time his e-correspondence and phone calls were also screened. At approximately 10:10AM the command post was set up. At approximately 10:12AM the dog team began conducting a sweep of the tree line near where the Field Utility squad was working. At this time, they picked up a track, began tracking and called the coordinates in to the command post. Upon squads turning in, a perimeter was established, and staff was assigned to checkpoints. At approximately 10:31AM ERT members began arriving and were also dispatched to checkpoints. Inmate Clark was tracked approximately 1.8 miles and was apprehended at 10:50AM. At 10:52AM the emergency count was cleared. The drill was complete at 10:55AM.

All staff took the drill serious, and it was obvious they had discussed and practiced for this type of incident. The infirmary brought the necessary equipment and outlined the procedure to be followed had this been an actual occurrence.

A debriefing was held in visitation at 11:15AM. The drill was a great learning experience for all staff involved and identified areas that excelled as well as areas that could be updated/improved.

Izard County Sherriff Charlie Melton, Calico Rock Mayor Hamby, and Investigator Jeffrey Watts were present as guests during this drill.

The 2024 Tornado Season has arrived and we need to ensure that officers and inmates have an understanding of where the inmates need to be during an actual tornado warning. Several "Tornado Drills" will be conducted to educate officers and inmates on the proper procedures during a tornado warning.

1. Each drill should take no longer than 2 minutes
2. Inmates will need to carry their mats to a designated SAFE area and place the mat over their body.
3. Inmates who have wheelchairs, canes, walkers, or possess a valid weight script will need to report to the designated safe areas with their blankets only (not mattresses). The blanket is to be placed over the inmate after reaching a designated safe area.
4. Noise during the drill is to be kept to a minimum so that officers can conduct a roll-call if necessary, officers are to check each and every bed to ensure no inmate is left behind
5. Each shift should complete a drill of their assigned areas at a minimum of one weekly. Reports should be forwarded to my office containing the start and end times of each drill for the shift's assigned areas.
6. Each shift will be required to complete four drills within the two-minute time frame before the 2024 tornado drills are ceased.

It will be simulated that the Field Utility Sergeant's horse would get spooked, begin to buck, and throw the rider from the back of the horse. The rider will be knocked unconscious, and the high rider will have to come out of the woods and take control of the squad. While verifying his count the high rider will observe he has a bad count. A dog kennel Inmate will be staged in the woods and begin laying a track simulating an Inmate ran from the squad while the rider was unconscious.</p> <p>Observation: On 11/13/2024 at approximately 10:00AM Cpl. Felton was working his assigned squad on the East side of the Airstrip. At this time, he was thrown from his horse rendering him unconscious. Sgt. Ward immediately took over the squad, notified his supervisor (Lt. Rush), and moved the squad away from the area. Lt. Rush immediately notified the Infirmary of the situation. There were 14 Inmates that turned out to work on this squad. At approximately 10:01AM Sgt. Ward conducted a count of the squad and found that he only had 13. He immediately notified his supervisor of the situation. At 10:04AM the infirmary arrived on scene and began treating Cpl. Felton. Lt. Rush then notified the Field Captain of the bad count and began turning all squads back into the building. Captain Brandon began the emergency checklist and started an emergency count at 10:08AM. The Inmate that was missing was identified as Inmate Clark, Derek ADC# 175246. The Inmate's property was searched resulting in staff finding a letter that indicated the escape was premeditated and he was just "Awaiting an opportunity". During this time his e-correspondence and phone calls were also screened. At approximately 10:10AM the command post was set up. At this time, they picked up a track, began tracking and called the coordinates in to the command post. Upon squads turning in, a perimeter was established, and staff was assigned to checkpoints. At approximately 10:31AM ERT members began arriving and were also dispatched to checkpoints. Inmate Clark was tracked approximately 1.8 miles and was apprehended at 10:50AM. At 10:52AM the emergency count was cleared. The drill was complete at 10:55AM.</p> <p>All staff took the drill serious, and it was obvious they had discussed and practiced for this type of incident. The infirmary brought the necessary equipment and outlined the procedure to be followed had this been an actual occurrence.</p> <p>A debriefing was held in visitation at 11:15AM. The drill was a great learning experience for all staff involved and identified areas that excelled as well as areas that could be updated/improved.</p> <p>Izard County Sherriff Charlie Melton, Calico Rock Mayor Hamby, and Investigator Jeffrey Watts were present as guests during this drill.</p>

Narrative: On 4-27-2024 at approximately 8:55 pm, inmate Washington, Jerome ADC#148939 refused to allow Cpl. Nathaniel Ham to continue a search of his rack by slamming his rack closed, grazing Cpl. Ham on his right arm. Other inmates in the barracks then began to surround Cpl. Ham. At this point, Cpl. Ham exited the Barracks and called for a supervisor. When Sgt. Morrow arrived, he gave inmate Washington several direct orders to come into the hallway. Inmate Washington refused these orders and 12 other inmates (Murphy, James ADC#123064; Locklear, Matthew ADC#168043; Davis, Dwaun ADC#159852; Gatlin, Dale ADC#147131 Scott, Fredrick ADC#178648; Parker, Jarvis ADC#118490; Cline, Adam ADC#120624; Wade, Sean ADC#555377; Scarver, Brian ADC#113209; Conley, Antwan ADC#181084; Turner, Jackie ADC#101227; and Smith, Lemarks ADC#139899) walked to the day room. Sgt. Morrow told the ones who were not involved to go back to their racks, and they refused this order by staying in the dayroom and trying to intimidate staff by banding together. Captain Brandon was notified and attempted to resolve the situation but was unsuccessful. After several attempts to get the aggressors to exit the barracks, the Duty Warden Michelle Gray and Chief of Security Major Aaron Rogers were notified. ERT staff, Field staff and utility staff were activated, at approximately 9:48 pm. Duty Director Gaylon Lay and others were notified. At approximately 12:10 am on 4-28-2024, NCU ERT members opened 12 barracks door and restrained inmate Washington and escorted him to Restrictive Housing. They then began restraining, searching, and removing all the inmates not involved and placed them in the Central Shower. After removing the inmates that were not involved, the inmates who had banded together were removed from the Barracks and escorted to Restrictive Housing. At approximately 1:15 am, the barracks was cleared of inmates and a thorough search of the barracks was completed. At 1:45 am, the inmates not involved in the disturbance were allowed to return to the barracks. A bed/roster count was conducted for the Unit and cleared in a timely manner. A debriefing was conducted and the Unit returned to normal operations at approximately 3:15 AM. All 13 inmates were authorized by Warden Michelle Gray to be placed on 72-hour behavioral control due to disrupting Unit Operations. Additionally, inmate Washington was placed on dry cell status due to suspicion of concealing contraband on his person/body cavity. Disciplinary action was initiated. SPECIAL AGENT NOTES

During the course of this investigation, it was determined that the Arkansas Department of Corrections (ADC) maintains a contractual agreement with Marquis Software for the provision of the electronic Offender Management Information System (eOMIS). eOMIS is referenced in ADC administrative policy, which states, in part, that the ADC Radio Room is responsible for entering escape notifications into the eOMIS platform.

On July 8, 2025, I, Special Agent Mike McNeill, formally requested from ADC Director Dexter Payne a copy of the department's current contract with Marquis Software pertaining to eOMIS. It is important to note that eOMIS serves as a centralized repository of inmate data, housing comprehensive information on each individual incarcerated within the ADC. This includes, but is not limited to, identifying information, physical descriptors, photographs, criminal history, and any documented affiliations.

The eOMIS platform is capable of performing a wide range of functions that can significantly benefit institutional operations. Its deployment can vary based on institutional needs and budgetary allowances. A facility may be granted access solely to the inmate information repository or, alternatively, to several dozen system functions, depending on the level of service authorized under ADC's contract.

As part of this inquiry, the ADC's contract with Marquis Software will be reviewed to determine whether the Department utilized the full functionality of the eOMIS system in connection with the escape of Inmate Hardin. A copy of the email sent to Director Payne requesting the contract will be included in the investigative file.
