Dear Co-Chairs,

First, pursuant to Ark. Code Ann. § 25-15-216(b)(4), please consider the following Arkansas Department of Health (ADH) Division of Health-Related Boards and Commissions update on rulemaking resulting from Acts of 2023. Arkansas law requires that each rule be promulgated by the specific Board or Commission, which meet at various times of the year. Various regulatory boards under the ADH Division of Health-Related Boards and Commissions are now drafting and amending rules specifically required due to legislation from the 2023 session. Please find a summary of the Boards' efforts made thus far below.

Arkansas State Board of Nursing

Act 672 of 2023 establishes nursing earn-to-learn programs and authorizes a nursing student to earn direct patient care clinical credit hours for working in a healthcare facility in certain jobs. The nursing program and the healthcare facility shall establish boundaries and expectations of the senior-level nursing student based on accreditation standards and rules of the Arkansas State Board Nursing. The ADH's Arkansas State Board of Nursing (ASBN) drafted rule changes to comply with the Act. The ASBN has completed public comment on the proposed changes and has requested to present the rule to the Public Health, Welfare, and Labor Committee. The Board will continue the promulgation process.

The Arkansas Department of Health Division of Health-Related Boards and Commissions will continue to provide updates on rulemaking. If there are changes or additional updates identified, the ADH will provide further information in these updates as submitted to the Administrative Rules Subcommittee.

Second, pursuant to Ark. Code Ann. § 25-15-216 (b)(4), please also consider the following Arkansas Department of Health (ADH) and State Board of Health update on rulemaking resulting from Acts of 2023. The State Board of Health meets quarterly each year and ADH has drafted proposed amendments to rules and proposed repeal of rules to implement new laws. As evidenced below, ADH and the Board will continue the rule promulgation process outlined in the Administrative Procedure Act, including the public notice and comment period, followed by the

Legislative review and approval process under Ark. Code Ann. § 10-3-309, prior to filing the final rules.

Several Rules that follow were approved by the Board of Health on October 26, 2023. The Department has completed the required public comment period and has requested to present the following rules to the Public Health, Welfare, and Labor Committee.

For the Rules Pertaining to Hospitals and Related Institutions in Arkansas and Rules for Critical Access Hospitals in Arkansas, the proposed amendments include provisions to comply with 2023 Acts as follows:

- Provide for Pharmacy Continuity of Care Endorsement (Act 233)
- Require posting of notice that attacking a healthcare professional is a felony (Act 313)
- Require hospitals to comply with federal hospital pricing transparency regulations (Act 482)
- Require hospitals to comply with the abortion right-to-know-and-see-act (Act 559)
- Amend the no-patient-left-alone provision regarding clergy members (Act 716)
- Amend the patient right-to-know regarding licensure of a healthcare provider (Act 830)
- Clarify that the performance of an abortion to save the life of a pregnant woman in a medical emergency may be performed only in a hospital or emergency room (Act 848).

For the Rules for Free Standing Birthing Centers in Arkansas, the proposed amendments include the following provisions to comply with Acts 313, 830, and 848 of 2023:

- Require posting of notice that attacking a healthcare professional is a felony (Act 313)
- Amend the patient right-to-know regarding licensure of a healthcare provider (Act 830)
- Clarify that the performance of an abortion to save the life or a pregnant woman in a medical emergency may be performed only in a hospital or emergency room (Act 848).

For the Rules for Hospices Agencies in Arkansas, the proposed amendments comply with Acts 70, 313, 716, and 830 of 2023 as follows:

- Amend the aide training requirements to include Alzheimer's disease and dementia (Act 70)
- Require posting of notice that attacking a healthcare professional is a felony (Act 313)
- Amend the no-patient-left-alone provision regarding clergy members (Act 716)
- Amend the patient right-to-know regarding licensure of a healthcare provider (Act 830).

For the Rules for Home Health Agencies and the Rules for Private Care Agencies, the proposed amendments comply with Acts 70, 313, and 830 of 2023, as follows:

- Amend the aide training requirements to include Alzheimer's disease and dementia (Act 70)
- Require posting of notice that attacking a healthcare professional is a felony (Act 313)
- Amend the patient's right to know regarding licensure of a healthcare provider (Act 830).

In addition, the Board of Health approved the Rules for Massage Therapy on October 26, 2023, to implement Acts 45 (Student and Apprenticeship Licensing), 137 (Military Licensure), and 167 (Master Massage Therapist Training). The Board of Health also approved the following rules on January 25, 2024, that are currently in the public comment period:

Home Caregiver Training to implement Act 70 of 2023, which amends the aide training requirements to include Alzheimer's disease and dementia,

Onsite Wastewater to implement Acts 137 (Military Licensure), and 457 (automatic occupational licensure for out-of-state licensees), and

Plumbing Rules to implement Acts 137 (Military Licensure), and 457 (automatic occupational licensure for out-of-state licensees).

The Rules for Emergency Medical Services to implement Acts 54 (affecting the required hours for the Community Paramedic license), and 258 (Emergency Medical Responders), are being prepared for the public comment period.

In closing, the Arkansas Department of Health, the Division of Health-Related Boards and Commissions, and the State Board of Health will continue to provide updates on rulemaking. If there are changes or additional updates identified, the ADH will provide further information in these updates as submitted to the Administrative Rules Subcommittee.
