

- 12 community mental health centers, established after the 60's deinstitutionalization.
- 2 specialty centers.
- all private, non-profit, each with local voluntary board of directors.
- During SFY 2014 CMHC's provided services to 69,951 unduplicated clients; 20,750 children and 48,841 adults.

- We provide 24/7, 365 day per year coverage for crisis interventions in our jails, detention centers, courts, schools, hospital emergency rooms and intensive care units.
- In the fiscal year ending June 2014, across Arkansas our mental health professionals:
 - Screened a total of 13,916 individuals (adults and children).
 - Of these only 42.5% (5,917) were hospitalized.
 - Hospitalized individuals are seen within 7 days of discharge for outpatient care.
 - Those not hospitalized (7,999 individuals) were referred to
 Community Mental Health Centers for mental health, substance
 abuse treatment, or other services on an outpatient basis.

Arkansas Mental Health

- a. Deinstitutionalize the mentally ill.....
- b. psychotropic medications, the philosophy was to provide treatment
- c. least restrictive setting
- d. CAI was formed in 1972. The current 13 CMHC's were established in the 1970's. All are now private non-profit organizations. Funding is provided by some state and Federal grants, Medicaid, Medicare, private insurance, self pay, and employee assistance contracts.

PUBLIC HEALTH SERVICE ACT SECTION 1913 REQUIRED SERVICES

- SERVICES TO INDIVIDUALS IN DEFINED GEOGRAPHIC AREA
- OUTPATIENT SERVICES, INCLUDING SPECIALIZED OUTPATIENT SERVICES FOR CHILDREN, THE ELDERLY, INDIVIDUALS WITH A SERIOUS MENTAL ILLNESS, AND RESIDENTS OF THE SERVICE AREAS OF THE CENTERS WHO HAVE BEEN DISCHARGED FROM INPATIENT TREATMENT AT A MENTAL FACILITY
- 24-HOUR EMERGENCY SERVICES
- DAY TREATMENT OR OTHER PARTIAL HOSPITALIZATION
 SERVICES OR PSYCHOSOCIAL REHABILITATION SERVICES
- SCREENING FOR PATIENTS BEING CONSIDERED FOR ADMISSION TO STATE MENTAL HEALTH FACILITIES TO DETERMINE THE APPROPRIATENESS OF SUCH ADMISSION

Specialized community mental health clinics have been developed to manage clients with special needs – GAIN, Birch and Small Group Work Therapy (now part of CCI), and Centers for Youth & Families (CYF).

Target Population Clients

- ACT 911 patients
- Persons committed to public mental health system by Courts for dangerousness to others
- Forensic clients persons with mental illness who are incarcerated or on probation.
- Seriously mentally ill adults (SMI)
- Emotionally disturbed children (SED)
- Others with mental health needs to the extent funds available.
