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Executive Summary

The 2016 Arkansas Labor Market and Economic Report is produced by the Occupational/Career Information unit of the Labor Market Information Section to provide relevant information about the economy and workforce in Arkansas and the 10 Workforce Development Areas. The primary focus of this report includes the years 2011 to 2015, with some information covering shorter periods due to accessibility of data. Projection information for industry and occupational trends covers the years 2015 to 2017.

Arkansas increased in population to almost 3 million residents in 2015 by 11,369 from 2014 and added 39,666 from 2011 to 2015. Of Arkansas's 10 Workforce Development Areas, Northwest Arkansas continues to see the largest increase in population, adding 11,647 in 2015. The Eastern, North Central, Southeast, and Southwest Arkansas WDAs continued to see decreasing populations in 2015.

Between 2014 and 2015 the state's labor force increased by 25,958 and employment increased by 36,217. Labor Force and employment were mixed across the WDA's. The State's unemployment rate dropped significantly to 5.2 percent in 2015 or by three and one-tenth percentage points since 2011. The unemployment rate continued to decline through July 2016, ending the month at 3.9 percent. The unemployment rate decreased across all LWDA's in 2015 and through July 2016. The Central, City of Little Rock, Northwest Arkansas WDAs unemployment rates all fell at or below state levels through July 2016.

Short-term employment projections for 2015 to 2017 continue to see an increase in the Arkansas job market with 34,704 jobs, equivalent to a 2.63 percent rise in employment. Goods-Producing Industries are estimated to see a net gain of 4,846 jobs, while the Services-Providing Industries are forecast to increase employment by 27,002. Arkansas's self-employed ranks are estimated to experience a net gain of 2,856, an increase of 2.33 percent.

Jobs requiring a High School Diploma or equivalent are estimated to add more jobs than any other education level with 13,129 jobs between 2015 and 2017. Occupations requiring a Bachelor's degree are expected to grow by 5,850 or by 2.55 percent.

Arkansas' per capita personal income increased over the 2010-2014 period to \$37,782; however, the state's income in 2014 remained below the United States per capita income of \$46,049. During the second quarter of 2016, the cost of living composite index in Arkansas' urban areas was below the national average for all urban areas in the index.

Almost 850,000 Arkansas workers earned at least \$10 or more an hour in 2015, with the mean wage for all employer sizes estimated at \$38,540 in 2015. Of the six states surrounding Arkansas, only Mississippi had a lower overall average hourly and annual wage for all occupations. Of the surrounding states, Texas had the highest annual wage that was about 21 percent higher than the average annual wage for Arkansas.


The State of Arkansas' population grew to 2,978,204 in 2015, adding 11,369 from 2014 to 2015 and 39,666 from 2011 to 2015. The State of Arkansas consists of 10 Workforce Development Areas (WDAs), six Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSAs), and 75 counties. Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri, Oklahoma, Tennessee, and Texas border the state.

Job creation increased between the second quarter of 2014 and the second quarter of 2015 to 63,147, an increase of 4,548 compared to the second quarter of 2014. Job creation has fluctuated over the five-year period for the second quarter of 2014 but was 5,136 higher compared to the second quarter of 2011. New hires increased in the second quarter of 2015 by 12,158 compared to the second quarter of 2014 and increased by 22,566 compared to the second quarter of 2011. Separations

increased over the five-year period by 15,525 to 216,085 in the second quarter of 2015, and the turnover rate increased between 2014 and 2015. The turnover rate increased two-tenths of a percentage point, to 8.8 percent.

The labor force increased by 25,958 between 2014 and 2015 and employment increased by 36,217 over the same period. Unemployment decreased by 10,259 from 2014 to 2015, but has seen a decrease of 43,684 since 2011. The State's unemployment rate dropped by nine-tenths of a percentage point from 2014 to 2015. Over the past five years, the unemployment rate has dropped three and one-tenths percentage points to 5.2 percent for 2015. The State's unemployment rate continued to decline in 2016, with July's rate ending at 3.9 percent.




Labor Force/Employment



ABOUT THE INDEX: C2ER produces the Cost of Living Index to provide a useful and reasonably accurate measure of living cost differences among urban areas. Items on which the Index is based have been carefully chosen to reflect the different categories of consumer expenditures. Weights assigned to relative costs are based on government survey data on expenditure patterns for professional and executive households. All items are priced in each place at a specified time and according to standardized specifications.

INTERPRETING THE INDEX: The Cost of Living Index measures relative price levels for consumer goods and services in participating areas. The average for all participating places, both metropolitan and nonmetropolitan, equals 100, and each participant's index is read as a percentage of the average for all places.

Based on the composite cost of living index, goods and services in Jonesboro, Arkansas were 84.1 percent of the national average for all participating places, both metropolitan and nonmetropolitan, for the second quarter of 2016. Also, given composite indexes for Conway (84) and Little Rock-North Little Rock (94.4) a move from Conway to Little Rock would require about a 12.3 percent increase in after-taxes income to maintain the same lifestyle.

The Index does not measure inflation (price change over time). Because each quarterly report is a separate comparison of prices at a single point in time, and because both the number and the mix of participants changes from one quarter to the next, Index data from different quarters cannot be compared. 

Arkansas/United States Median Household Income Per Capita Income

Arkansas' median household income of \$41,335 increased by \$1,416 from 2013 to 2014 but is below the national median household income of \$53,657 for 2014. Arkansas' per capita personal income in 2014 was \$37,782, an increase of \$1,253 from 2013. Over the past five years, the per capita personal income has increased by \$5,791. The State's per capita personal income is below the United States per capita personal income of \$46,049.

Employment Status


In 2015, whites made up 80.0 percent of the labor force while the total of all minority groups made up 20 percent of the labor force. The unemployment rate for all races, including Hispanics, was 5.2 percent. The unemployment rate for all minority groups combined was 8.6 percent. Hispanics of all races made up 6.4 percent of the labor force, with an unemployment rate of 4.4 percent.

Education

Every education category is projected to see positive net growth between 2015 and 2017. Occupations requiring no formal education are projected to add 11,565 jobs during the projection period and are expected to be the fastest growing educational group at 3.28 percent. Jobs requiring a High School Diploma or equivalent are expected to add the most jobs at 13,129 during the projection period. Occupations requiring a Bachelor's degree are expected to grow by 5,850 jobs or by 2.55 percent. Growth in occupations requiring a Master's degree or Doctoral or Professional degree is expected to be 475 and 863 jobs respectively. Educational attainment of the State's population aged 25 years and over shows that 84.2 percent have earned a high school diploma/equivalent or higher while 20.6 percent have earned a Bachelor's degree or higher. Educational attainment of a high school diploma/ equivalent or higher across the WDAs range from 77.52 percent in the Eastern WDA to 90.50 percent in the City of Little Rock WDA. The highest percentage of the population aged 25 years and over with a Bachelor's degree or higher is found in the City of Little Rock WDA at 38.50 percent

Doctoral or professional degree (D) – Requires at least three years of full-time academic study beyond a bachelor's degree.

Master's degree (M) – Requires one or two years of full-time academic study beyond a bachelor's degree.

Bachelor's degree (B) – Requires four or five years of full-time academic study.

Associate degree (A) – Requires at least two years of full-time academic study.

Postsecondary non-degree award (PS) – Programs last a few weeks to more than a year; leads to a certificate or other award.

Some college, no degree (SC) - Requires the completion of a high school diploma or equivalent plus the completion of one or more postsecondary courses that did not result in a degree or award.

High School diploma or equivalent (HS) - Requires the completion of high school or an equivalent program resulting in the award of a high school diploma or an equivalent, such as a GED.

No Formal Education (NFE) - Signifies that a formal credential issued by an educational institution, such as a high school diploma or postsecondary certificate, is not typically needed for entry into the occupation.



Average Wages of States Surrounding Arkansas



Wages

Retail Salespersons was estimated to have the most employees across the State with 38,976 employed in 2015 with an average wage of \$24,380. Cashiers is the second largest occupation with 34,289 employed, earning an average wage of \$18,700. General and Operations Managers, with an estimated employment of 19,913, had the highest average wage of the 10 largest occupations, earning \$84,920 annually.

All of the State's occupations that pay the most are in the **Healthcare Practitioners and Technical** major group. *Internists, General* topped the list with an annual salary of \$265,360. *Surgeons* with an average annual salary of \$258,790, ranked second on the occupations paying the most list.



State of Arkansas Wages of 10 Largest Occupations




The entry wage estimate for employers of all sizes was \$18,540 for 2015. The median wage estimates for employers with 250-499 employees was \$31,131, while wages for experienced workers averaged \$48,540 for employers in all size categories.

Of the 1,176,129 estimated employees, 196,066 made \$15.00 to \$19.99 an hour while 160,635 made \$12.00 to 14.99 an hour. Employees making \$7.50 or below totaled 2,135.

Industry

The Arkansas job market is expected to continue its growth with an increase of 34,704 jobs between 2015 and 2017, equivalent to a 2.63 percent rise in employment. Restaurants and Other Eating Places is predicted to be the top growing industry adding 2,903 new jobs, going from 81,816 jobs in 2015 to 84,719 in 2017. Support Activities for Rail Transportation is projected to raise employment levels by 69.60 percent becoming the fastest growing industry in the state. Support Activities for Mining could see the opposite effect, losing 452 jobs due to the volatility in the oil and gas industry and be the top declining industry. Cutlery and Handtool Manufacturing is estimated to be the fastest declining industry with a loss of 40 percent of its workforce. Trade, Transportation, and Utilities is expected to be the top growing supersector in Arkansas adding 8,136 jobs bringing employment levels to 254,064 for March 2017.

Occupations

In terms of total annual job openings, 49,090 are expected during the 2015-2017 projection period. Of these, 18,184 jobs are estimated to come from growth and expansion of businesses. The other 30,906 jobs are expected to be available due to the need to replace workers who leave their jobs for various reasons. All major occupational groups are estimated to see gains in employment. Retail Salespersons is forecast to lead the state in net growth and annual openings with 2,026 new jobs and 2,495 total annual openings raising employment to 41,646. Welding, Soldering, and Brazing Machine Setters, Operators, and Tenders is set to be the fastest growing occupation increasing employment by 16.85 percent to 1,879. Tellers could be the top declining occupation losing 255 jobs, moving from 6,371 in 2015 to 6,116 in 2017. Petroleum Pump System Operators, Refinery Operators, and Gaugers could also be impacted by the oil and gas industry with a loss of 20.47 percent of its workforce becoming the fastest declining occupation. The Sales and Related Occupations major group is estimated to lead the state in net growth adding 4,887 new jobs to its workforce increasing employment to 137,651 by 2017.



The Central Arkansas Workforce Development Area's population was 521,019 in 2015, an increase of 2,152 since 2014 and the Area has seen an increase in population of 17,145 since 2011. Central Arkansas WDA includes a large portion of the Little Rock-North Little Rock-Conway Metropolitan Statistical Area and six counties: Faulkner, Lonoke, Monroe, Prairie, Saline, and Pulaski County, excluding Little Rock.

Job creation increased by 651 when comparing the second quarter of 2015 to the second quarter of 2014 to 10,468 and increased by 1,345 when comparing to the second quarter of 2011. The number of new hires and the number of separations increased in the second quarter of 2015 from the same time period in 2014. New hires totaled 38,494 for the second quarter of 2015 while separations totaled 35,111. Turnover increased to 9.7 percent.

The WDA saw an increase in the labor force of 4,630 to 245,315 from 2014 to 2015 but saw a decrease in the labor force of 1,216 over the 2011 to 2015 period. Employment increased by 6,332 between 2014 and 2015 and increased by 5,175 over the five-year period. But the WDA has also seen a decrease in unemployment over the same time periods. From 2014 to 2015, there was a decrease of 1,702 in unemployment and from 2011 to 2015, unemployment decreased by 6,391. The WDA's unemployment rate decreased by eight-tenths of a percentage point from 2014 to 4.6 percent for 2015 and the unemployment rate decreased by two and six-tenths of a percentage point over the five-year period. In 2016, the unemployment rate decreased by two-tenths of a percentage point to 3.8 percent in July.







Wages

With an estimated employment of 3,653, Combined Food Preparation and Serving Workers, Including Fast Food was the largest occupation in the WDA in 2015, with an estimated average wage of \$17,728. Cashiers had the next largest estimated employment with 2,939, earning an estimated entry wage of \$17,324. General and Operations Managers had the largest estimated experienced wage of all the occupations on the 10 largest occupations list at \$100,728.

Family and General Practitioners, with an estimated average annual salary of \$242,713 led the Occupations Paying the Most list in 2015. Occupations on the list were mixed with *Business Teachers, Postsecondary* finishing the list, earning an average annual salary of \$92,532.







Employers of all sizes had a median wage estimate of \$28,331 in 2015 with an estimated experienced wage of \$46,974. Employers with 50 to 99 employees had an estimated entry wage of \$17,325. Estimated mean wages ranged from \$35,236 for employers with 0 to 49 employees to \$47,302 for employers with 500 or more employees.

Of the 81,277 estimated employees in the Area, 10,526 employees made an hourly wage in the \$12.00 to \$14.99 range. Employees making less than \$7.50 an hour totaled 159. Employees making \$7.50 to \$9.99 an hour totaled 25,650. Note: Wage data for Central Arkansas WDA does not include Pulaski County.

Industry

The Central Arkansas WDA is expected to add 4,343 new jobs, an increase of 2.52 percent. Food Services and Drinking Places is estimated to be the top growing industry with an increase of 564 new jobs growing from 14,715 in 2015 to 15,279 in 2017. Sporting Goods, Hobby, Book, and Music Stores is anticipated to be the fastest growing industry during the 2015-2017 period with an increase of 13.93 percent adding 102 jobs to an employment of 834. Data Processing, Hosting and Related Services is predicted to be the fastest declining industry decreasing by 15.94 percent, dropping to an employment of 116. Federal Government, Excluding Post Office could see a decline of 129 dropping to an employment level of 3,838. Education and Health Services is projected to be the top industry supersector, adding 1,214 to 35,239 employed in 2017.

Occupations

The Central Arkansas WDA is expected to have 6,548 annual job openings during the projection period with 2,416 being for growth and expansion and 4,132 being for replacement. Retail Salespersons, which is estimated to gain 231 jobs by March 2017, is projected to be the top growing occupation increasing employment to 5,570. Postal Service Mail Carriers could see a 14.23 percent increase in jobs making it the fastest growing occupation increasing to a level of 313 as population grows in certain areas of the WDA. Service Unit Operators, Oil, Gas, and Mining is projected to be the top and fastest declining occupation with a loss of 119, or 59.50 percent of its workforce due to decreased investment in natural gas activities. Sales and Related Occupations is projected to be the top occupational group, adding 600 by March 2017.


The City of Little Rock Workforce Development Area grew by 340 in 2015, bringing the population to 197,992. The City of Little Rock's population has grown by 2,732 between 2011 and 2015. The Area is the county seat of Pulaski County and includes part of the Little Rock-North Little Rock-Conway Metropolitan Statistical Area.

Job creation increased by 832 to 7,204 jobs created in the second quarter of 2015. This is an increase compared to the second quarter of 2011 when 6,806 jobs were created in the WDA. The number of new hires increased by 1,502 while the number of separations increased by 400 between the second quarters of 2014 and 2015. Both new hires and separations increased from the second quarter of 2011 compared to second quarter 2015. The

turnover rate remained the same from the second quarter of 2014 to 2015 at 7.9 percent.

The labor force increased in the WDA by 1,891 from 2014 to 2015, and saw a decrease of 2,188 between 2011 and 2015. Employment increased by 2,597 from 2014 to 2015 and by 631 from 2011 to 2015. Unemployment and the unemployment rate decreased between 2014 and 2015, with unemployment decreasing by 706 and the unemployment rate decreasing by eight-tenths of a percentage point to 4.7 in 2015. The unemployment rate decreased by two and seven-tenths of a percentage point from 2011 to 2015. The Area unemployment rate continued to decline through July 2016, decreasing by ninetenths of a percentage point from January 2015 to 3.8 percent.







Wages

Retail Salespersons was the largest occupation in 2015 with 8,176 estimated employees with an estimated entry wage of \$17,378. Registered Nurses was the second largest occupation with an estimated employment of 7,786 and an estimated experienced wage of \$71,006. General and Operations Managers had the highest estimated experienced wage of the largest occupations at \$122,902 in 2015.

Obstetricians and Gynecologists topped the list of occupations paying the most with an average annual salary of \$283,460 for the Area. With an estimated average annual salary of \$231,132, Family and General Practitioners ranked second on the list. Personal Financial Advisors completed the list, earning \$113,377 annually in 2015.







The City of Little Rock WDA had an estimated median wage of \$34,306 for employers of all sizes in 2015. Employers with 100 to 249 employees had an estimated entry wage of \$19,053. Estimated mean wages ranged from \$38,975 for employers with 100 to 249 employees to \$52,462 for employers with 500 or more employees in the WDA.

The Area's total number of estimated employees by hourly wage was 253,912 with 30,377 estimated employees earning \$20.00 to \$24.99 an hour. The number of employees earning between \$7.50 and \$9.99 was estimated at 54,334. The number of employees earning less than \$7.50 an hour was estimated at 100 in 2015. Note: Wage data for the City of Little Rock WIA includes all of Pulaski County.

Industry

The City of Little Rock WDA is expected to grow by 4,015 jobs between 2015 and 2017, or an increase of 2.17 percent. *Management of Companies and Enterprises* is projected to be the top growing industry adding 496 jobs between 2015 and 2017 raising employment to 3,911. *Data Processing, Hosting and Related Services* is anticipated to grow significantly with a gain of 41.36 percent making it the fastest growing industry in the Area moving from 191 jobs in 2015 to 270 in 2017. *Educational Services*, however, could see a decline in jobs with a loss of 288 bringing employment down to 11,904. *Other Information Services* could lose a third of its workforce, making it the fastest declining industry. **Trade, Transportation, and Utilities** is projected to be the top growing supersector with an increase of 1,454 raising employment to 29,167.

Occupations

Area employers are expected to have 6,408 annual openings during the projection period. Of these, 4,196 would be for replacement and 2,212 for growth and expansion. *Retail Salespersons* is estimated to be the top and fastest growing occupation adding 523 new jobs at a rate of 9.83 percent increasing employment to 5,842. On the negative side of the economy, *Telecommunications Equipment Installers and Repairers, Except Line Installers* is predicted to lose the most jobs with a decline of 35 jobs, bringing employment down to 558. *Cutting, Punching, and Press Machine Setters, Operators, and Tenders, Metal and Plastic* could see an 11.32 percent reduction in its workforce. **Sales and Related Occupations** is forecast to be the top growing major occupational group adding 938 jobs to bring employment to 18,949.


Eastern Arkansas WDA

The Eastern Arkansas Workforce Development Area's population declined by 1,411 between 2014 and 2015 to 121,999 residents. The Area has seen a decrease in population of 5,886 since 2011. The Eastern Arkansas WDA includes five counties: Crittenden, Cross, Lee, Phillips, and Saint Francis. With Tennessee bordering to the east, Crittenden County is part of the Memphis Metropolitan Statistical Area.

Job creation increased in the second quarter of 2015 compared to the second quarter of 2014 by 317 jobs, with 2,354 jobs created. Job creation increased in the WDA by 150 when comparing second quarter 2011 to 2015. New hires and separations increased from 2014 to 2015 by 915 and 761 respectively. The turnover rate was 9.9 percent during the second quarter of 2015.

The labor force increased by 287 to 48,829 in 2015 but has decreased by 4,730 from 2011 to 2015. Employment also increased during 2015, gaining 851 workers to 45,556. Unemployment and the unemployment rate saw significant decreases from 2014 to 2015, having 564 fewer unemployed and the unemployment rate dropping by one and two-tenths of a percentage point to 6.7 percent. Over the five-year period, the Area saw the unemployment rate drop by three and nine-tenths of a percentage point from 10.6 percent to 6.7 percent. Since the beginning of 2016, the unemployment rate has continued to decline ending July 2016 at 5.2 percent.




Labor Force/Employment







Employers of all sizes in the Eastern Arkansas WDA had an estimated entry wage of \$17,946 in 2015. Employers with 250 to 499 employees had an estimated mean wage of \$37,459. Employers of 50 to 99 employees had an estimated entry wage of \$17,650, while estimated experienced wages were \$39,848 for 2015.

Of the 36,768 estimated employees in the Area, those earning \$7.50 to \$9.99 an hour was the largest group on the list, with an estimated 13,554 employees. The estimated number of employees earning \$12.00 to \$14.99 an hour was 4,896.

Industry

The Eastern Arkansas WDA is expected to experience a net growth of 1,090 jobs between 2015 and 2017. *Administrative and Support Services* is estimated to be the top growing industry adding 243 jobs between 2015 and 2017 bringing its employment to 1,918. *Nonmetallic Mineral Product Manufacturing* is expected to be the fastest growing industry with a gain of 53.33 percent, or 56 new jobs going from 105 jobs in 2015 to 161 in 2017. *Educational Services* could see a drop of 76 jobs making it the top declining industry in Eastern Arkansas, dropping employment to 4,446. *Insurance Carriers and Related Activities* could see a 17.73 percent drop in employment during the projection period dropping to 116 jobs in 2017. Population decline could be a contributing factor in these industry declines. **Professional and Business Services** leads the Area in net growth among the industry supersectors with 273 new jobs, increasing employment 11.17 percent to 2,718.

Occupations

The Eastern Arkansas WDA is expected to have 1,608 annual job openings during the projection period with 986 being for replacement and the remaining 622 for growth and expansion. *Personal Care Aides* is predicted to add the most jobs with 79 new jobs anticipated, increasing employment to 1,467. *Industrial Machinery Mechanics* is forecast to be the fastest growing occupation with an increase of 11.72 percent moving from 145 jobs in 2015 to 162 in 2017. *Tellers* could lose 10 jobs between 2015 and 2017 making it the top declining occupation, while *Advertising Sales Agents* could be the fastest declining occupation, losing 12.5 percent of its workforce. **Transportation and Material Moving Occupations** is anticipated to be the top growing major occupational group with 158 new jobs, increasing its total workforce to 4,687.


The North Central Arkansas Workforce Development Area had a slight increase in population in 2015, adding 88 to bring the population to 237,547. But the population decreased over the five-year period of 2011 to 2015, decreasing by 1,279. The North Central Arkansas WDA consists of 10 counties: Cleburne, Fulton, Independence, Izard, Jackson, Sharp, Stone, Van Buren, White, and Woodruff, with the state of Missouri bordering the area to the north.

There were 4,035 new jobs created in the second quarter of 2015, an increase of 457 compared to the same quarter in 2014.

New hires and separations increased compared to the second quarter of 2014, with new hires increasing to 14,139 and separations increasing to 12,808. The turnover rate increased by four-tenths of a percentage point 9.3 percent.

The labor force increased by 762 from 2014 to 2015 but saw a decrease of 7,344 between 2011 to 2015. Employment increased by 1,645 while unemployment decreased by 883 from 2014 to 2015. The unemployment rate dropped to 6.7 percent or one percentage point from 2014 to 2015. The unemployment rate continued to decline during 2016 to 5.7 percent in July.





Employees of all employer sizes in North Central Arkansas had an estimated median wage of \$26,988 in 2015. Employers with 100-249 employees had an estimated entry wage of \$19,042 and experienced wage of \$43,576. Entry wages for employers with 500 plus employees were estimated to be \$20,282 in 2015.

Of the 68,719 employees in North Central Arkansas, employees making \$7.50 to \$9.99 an hour was the largest group with 21,874 employees. Employees making \$12.00 to \$14.99 an hour totaled 9,493 in 2015.

Industry

The North Central Arkansas WDA is projected to add 1,862 jobs from 2015 through March 2017, or increase employment by 2.28 percent. *Machinery Manufacturing* is forecast to be the top and fastest growing industry with a gain of 242 new jobs, an increase of 38.41 percent moving employment from 630 in 2015 to 872 in 2017. *Pipeline Transportation* is predicted to be the top declining and fastest declining industry losing 59.78 percent of its workforce, or 107 jobs, due mainly to reduced investment in the natural gas industry. **Education and Health Services** is projected to be the top growing supersector with 406 new jobs increasing employment to 21,222.

Occupations

The Area is expected to have 2,999 total job openings annually between 2015 and 2017. Of these, 1,900 would be for replacement, while 1,099 would be for growth and expansion. *Farmers, Ranchers, and Other Agricultural Managers* is anticipated to gain 228 jobs between 2015 and 2017 making it the top growing occupation in the Area. The occupation is also projected to have the most annual job openings with 254. *Tool and Die Makers* are forecast to increase employment by 22.41 percent making it the fastest growing occupation in North Central Arkansas increasing jobs to 71. On the negative side of the economy, *Heavy and Tractor-Trailer Truck Drivers* could lose the most with a loss of 41 jobs dropping employment to 2,422, while *Service Unit Operators, Oil, Gas, and Mining* is expected to lose 14.63 percent of its workforce down to 105 jobs. **Management Occupations** is forecast to be the top growing occupational group adding 293 new jobs to an employment level of 11,962.


The Northeast Arkansas Workforce Development Area's population was 265,685 in 2015, an increase of 1,142 since 2014, and it saw an increase of 3,001 from 2011 to 2015. The Northeast Arkansas WDA consists of the Jonesboro Metropolitan Statistical Area and seven counties: Clay, Craighead, Greene, Lawrence, Mississippi, Poinsett, and Randolph. Both Missouri and Tennessee border the Area.

Job creation increased from the second quarter of 2014 by 291 to 5,223 for the same time period in 2015. But the Area's job creation for the second quarter of 2015 was 160 less compared to 2011. New hires were 20,138 or 643 more than in 2014.

Separations decreased from the second quarter of 2014 by 176 to 19,923. The turnover rate was 9.0 percent in the second quarter of 2015.

The labor force increased to 118,788 in 2015, or by 1,555 since 2014, but it decreased over the 2011-2015 period by 4,310. Employment increased by 2,497 while unemployment decreased by 942 from 2014. The unemployment rate decreased to 5.9 percent, a decline of nine-tenths percentage points from 2014 to 2015. The Area's unemployment rate dropped to 4.7 by July 2016.




Labor Force/Employment

Retail Salespersons was the largest occupation of 2015 for the Area with an estimated employment of 3,400, earning an entry wage of \$17,375. The second largest, Team Assemblers, had an estimated employment of 3,052 with an average wage of \$25,560. Registered Nurses had the largest entry wage of the 10 largest occupations, at \$43,058 annually.

Surgeons, with an average annual salary of \$273,893, was the occupation paying the most in the WDA in 2015. Internists, General earned an annual average wage of \$268,196, placing it second on the list. Pharmacists finished the list, earning \$128,652 in 2015.







Employers of all sizes had an estimated experienced wage of \$43,052 in Northeast Arkansas for 2015. Employers with 100-249 employees had an estimated mean wage of \$35,634 and an estimated entry wage of \$29,707. Estimated entry wages for the Area were above \$18,762 for employers of all sizes.

Of the 68,719 estimated employees in Northeast Arkansas, employees making \$15.00 to \$19.99 an hour numbered 16,768. Employees making \$7.50 to \$9.99 was the largest group in the Area with 29,697.

Industry

The Northeast Arkansas WDA is expected to add 5,324 jobs during the 2015-2017projection period. At 4.90 percent, the Area is estimated to be the fastest growing WDA in the state. Driving growth in the Area is *Food Manufacturing*, which is estimated to gain 1,170 jobs, a 53.99 percent increase, making it the top and fastest growing industry moving employment to 3,337. *Furniture and Related Product Manufacturing* is seeing a less favorable outlook with a loss of 150, or a little over a third of its workforce, making it the top and fastest declining industry in Northeast Arkansas moving employment from 445 in 2015 to 295 in 2017. **Manufacturing** is expected to be the top growing supersector with an increase of 2,268, or an 11.35 percent increase in employment to a level of 22,254.

Occupations

The Northeast Arkansas WDA is expected to have 5,388 annual openings during the 2015-2017 projection period. The Area is projected to be the only workforce area where growth openings lead replacement openings with 2,789 for growth and expansion and 2,599 for replacement. *Team Assemblers* is anticipated to be the top growing occupation with a gain of 368 jobs raising its employment to 3,340. *Food Cooking Machine Operators and Tenders* is estimated to be the fastest growing occupation raising employment by 54.39 percent to a level of 88. *Woodworking Machine Setters, Operators, and Tenders, Except Sawing* is forecast to be the fastest declining occupation losing nearly 13 percent of its workforce moving from 77 in 2015 to 67 in 2017. *Tellers* is predicted to be the top declining occupation with a loss of 23 jobs moving employment down to 533. **Production Occupations** is anticipated to add the most new jobs among the major occupational groups in Northeast Arkansas adding 1,396 increasing employment above 15,000.


The Northwest Arkansas Workforce Development Area's population increased to 628,862 or by 11,647 in 2015. The Area has seen an increase in population of 38,627 from 2011 to 2015. The Northwest Arkansas WDA consists of nine counties: Baxter, Benton, Boone, Carroll, Madison, Marion, Newton, Searcy, and Washington. The area borders two states, Missouri to the north and Oklahoma to the west. The Fayetteville-Springdale-Rogers Metropolitan Statistical Area, which includes McDonald County in Missouri, is located within this WDA.

Job creation increased by 1,717 in Northwest Arkansas from second quarter of 2014 to second quarter of 2015 to 15,387 and new hires increased by 5,522 to 55,605 for the same time period.

Separations increased by 4,311 to 49,063 and turnover was at 8.7 percent for the second quarter of 2015.

The labor force and employment both increased from 2014 to 2015, with the labor force adding 13,072 to 299,905 and employment increasing by 14,917 to 287,787. Unemployment decreased by 1,845 to 12,118 in 2015, and has seen a decline of 7,143 since 2011. The unemployment rate declined in from 2014 to 2015 by nine-tenths of a percentage point to 4 percent, however the Area's unemployment rate declined by two and eight-tenths of a percentage point from 2015. The unemployment rate ended July 2016 at 3.2 percent.





Retail Salespersons, with an estimated employment of 10,879, was the largest occupation in the Area in 2015 earning an entry wage of \$17,398. General and Operations Managers had the highest estimated experienced wage of the 10 largest occupations at \$119,419 with 5,077 employed.





Industry

The Northwest Arkansas WDA has the largest employment base in the state and is predicted to have the largest growth, which provides job seekers with a variety of career choices among the many industries and occupations. Over the 2015-2017 projection period, this Area is projected to gain 9,537 jobs, an increase of 3.31 percent between 2015 and 2017. *Management of Companies and Enterprises* is predicted to be the top growing industry in the Area with 830 new jobs anticipated raising employment to 23,687. *Support Activities for Transportation* is predicted to increase by 25.46 percent, making it the fastest growing industry in the Area moving employment to above 1,000. *Primary Metal Manufacturing* is projected to be the top and fastest declining industry with a loss of 442 jobs, or 37.30 percent of its workforce moving employment below 1,000.

Occupations

The Northwest Arkansas WDA is projected to have 11,763 annual job openings during the 2015-2017 projection period with 5,006 for growth and expansion and 6,757 for replacement. *Farmers, Ranchers, and Other Agricultural Managers* is estimated to drive growth adding 475 new jobs, making it the top growing occupation in Northwest Arkansas increasing employment to 12,731. *Aircraft Mechanics and Service Technicians* is predicted to be the fastest growing occupation raising employment to 22.58 percent. *Molding, Coremaking, and Casting Machine Setters, Operators, and Tenders, Metal and Plastic* is forecast to see a decline of 79 jobs to a job level of 221, while *Metal-Refining Furnace Operators and Tenders* is expected to lose 36.11 percent of its workforce.


The Southeast Arkansas Workforce Development Area's population decreased to 203,933 from 2014, or by 1,677. The Area has seen a decrease in population of 8,126 from 2011 to 2015. The Southeast Arkansas WDA includes the Pine Bluff Metropolitan Statistical Area and 10 counties: Arkansas, Ashley, Bradley, Chicot, Cleveland, Desha, Drew, Grant, Jefferson, and Lincoln. Louisiana and Mississippi border the Area.

Job creation increased in Southeast Arkansas by 153 to 3,849 for the second quarter of 2015 compared to the second quarter of 2014 while new hires increased for the same time period by 781 to 12,782. Separations increased by 559 from 2014 to 2015

while turnover increased to 8.3 percent in 2015.

Southeast Arkansas saw an increase in the labor force and employment from 2014 to 2015. The labor force increased to 84,335, or by 238, while employment increased to 78,690, or by 1,347. Both the labor force and employment have decreased since 2011 by 10,739 and 6,002 respectively. Unemployment decreased by 1,109 to 5,645 in 2015 and the unemployment rate dropped to 6.7 percent. Since January 2016, the unemployment rate decreased another five-tenths of a percentage point to 5.6 percent in July 2016.





Southeast Arkansas WDA 2016 Monthly Unemployment Rate*







The Southeast Arkansas WDA is expected to gain 842 jobs over the 2015-2017 projection period. *Sporting Goods, Hobby, Book, and Music Stores* is expected to be the fastest growing occupation in Southeast Arkansas at a rate of 20.48 percent raising employment to 253. *Social Assistance* is predicted to be the top growing industry adding 150 jobs to its workforce moving from 3,330 in 2015 to 3,480 in 2017. *Telecommunications* could be the fastest declining industry losing an anticipated 29.69 percent of its workforce dropping below 100 employees. *Federal Government, Excluding Post Office* could lose the most jobs with a decline of 128 moving from 1,609 jobs in 2015 to 1,481 in 2017. **Trade, Transportation, and Utilities** is projected to be the top growing industry supersector adding 284 jobs to an employment level of 12,864.

Occupations

Southeast Arkansas WDA employment is expected to increase by 1.06 percent between 2015 and 2017. There are 2,515 job openings projected to be available annually between 2015 and 2017. Of these, 670 would be for growth and expansion, while 1,845 would be for replacement. *Team Assemblers* is predicted to be the top growing occupation in the Area gaining 71 new jobs between 2015 and 2017 increasing to a level of 1,186. *Cargo and Freight Agents* is projected to be the fastest growing occupation, increasing employment by 8.82 percent to 74 employees. On the negative side of the local economy, *Tellers* is estimated to lose the most jobs with an anticipated loss of 39, while *Telecommunications Equipment Installers and Repairers, Except Line Installers* is forecast to be the fastest declining occupation losing 26.19 percent of its workforce. **Sales and Related Occupations** is forecast to be the top growing major occupational group increasing employment by 161 to a level of 6,695.


The Southwest Arkansas Workforce Development Area's population decreased by 987 to 185,913 in 2015. The Area has seen a decline in population over the 2011-2015, losing 4,614 residents since 2011. Southwest Arkansas is the largest WDA in the state in terms of the number of counties represented. Twelve counties are located within this region: Calhoun, Columbia, Dallas, Hempstead, Howard, Lafayette, Little River, Miller, Nevada, Ouachita, Sevier, and Union. Three states border the Area: Oklahoma to the west, Texas to the southwest, and Louisiana to the south. Miller County is part of the Texarkana AR/TX Metropolitan Statistical Area.

Job creation increased by 532 in the second quarter of 2015 to 3,861 jobs, and also increased from 2011 compared to 2015 with

an increase of 277. New hires increased, from the second quarter of 2014 to total 14,062 in the second quarter of 2015, while separations decreased by 242, totaling 13,339. The turnover rate was 7.8 percent in the second quarter of 2015.

The labor force increased from 2014 to 2015 by 980 to 94,588 while employment increased by 1,815 to 88,991. Over the five-year period from 2011 to 2015, the Area has seen a decrease of 8,190 in the labor force and a decrease of 4,537 in employment. But unemployment decreased by 835 from 2014 to 2015 and by 3,633 over the five-year period. In turn, the unemployment rate dropped one percentage point in 2015 to 5.9 percent. The unemployment rate continued to drop through July 2016, ending at 5.2 percent.



Wages

Heavy and Tractor-Trailer Truck Drivers was the largest occupation in the Area with 3,379 estimated employees, earning an annual average wage of \$37,203 in 2015. Cashiers was second with an estimated employment of 2,816 with an entry wage of \$17,331. General and Operations Managers had the highest experienced wage at \$110,377.

Family and General Practitioners was the occupation paying the most for the WDA, earning an average annual salary of \$187,354. *Pharmacists* was second on the list, earning an average annual salary of \$135,533. Completing the list, *Nurse Practitioners* earned an average annual salary of \$95,034 in 2015.





Industry

Employment in the Southwest Arkansas WDA is projected to increase by 1,302 or a 1.44 percent growth rate over the 2015-2017 projection period. *Administrative and Support Services* is predicted to lead the Area in net growth with 224 new jobs moving from 1,762 jobs in 2015 to 1,986 in 2017. *Support Activities for Transportation* is anticipated to be the fastest growing industry with an increase of 28.08 percent, or 57 new jobs increasing employment to 260. On the negative side of the economy, *Paper Manufacturing* is estimated to decline by 171 jobs, or 13.67 percent of its workforce, making it the top and fastest declining industry dropping to an employment of 1,080. **Trade, Transportation, and Utilities** is predicted to add the most jobs among the industry supersectors with 406 new jobs, increasing employment to 16,427.

Occupations

Between 2015 and 2017, Southwest Arkansas WDA employers are estimated to have 2,935 job openings annually. The Area is forecast to have 2,098 replacement annual openings, or about 71.48 percent of the total job openings for the Area. *Farmers, Ranchers, and Other Agricultural Managers* is expected to be the top growing occupation adding 95 jobs between 2015 and 2017 increasing to an employment of 5,370. *Helpers—Electricians* is predicted to be the fastest growing occupation, raising employment 9.38 percent to a level of 105. *Tellers* is forecast to be the top declining occupation losing 27 jobs during the projection period, going from 673 in 2015 to 646 in 2017. Roustabouts, Oil and Gas could lose 13.81 percent of its workforce, making it the fastest declining occupation dropping to a level of 156. **Construction and Extraction Occupations** is estimated to be the top growing major occupational group increasing employment by 189 jobs to above 5,000.


The West Central Arkansas Workforce Development Area saw a slight increase in population between 2014 and 2015 of 346 to total 259,628. The Area has seen a decrease in population from 2011, losing 1,202 from 2011 to 2015. The West Central Arkansas WDA consists of 10 counties: Clark, Conway, Garland, Hot Spring, Johnson, Montgomery, Perry, Pike, Pope, and Yell; with the Hot Springs Metropolitan Statistical Area located within the WDA.

Job creation decreased by 245 during the second quarter of 2015 compared to second quarter of 2014 in West Central Arkansas. New hires also decreased, declining by 178 compared to the second quarter of 2014 for 21,328 new hires in second quarter of 2015. Separations decreased during the time period, declining

by 148 from the second quarter of 2014 and declining by 953 compared to the second quarter of 2011. The turnover rate remained the same over the 2014 to 2015 quarters at 8.9 percent.

In 2015, both the labor force and employment increased in the WDA. The labor force increased by 1,073 for a total of 132,983, while employment increased 2,116 for a total of 125,414. But both the labor force and employment decreased over the five-year period by 6,961 and 2,460 respectively. Unemployment and the unemployment rate both decreased from 2014 to 2015. Unemployment decreased to 7,569 and the unemployment rate decreased by eight-tenths of a percentage point to 5.7 percent. The unemployment rate has continued to decline in 2016, ending July at 5 percent.



Wages

Retail Salespersons was the largest occupation in West Central Arkansas in 2015 with an estimated employment of 4,114, earning an entry wage of \$17,407. Cashiers was the second largest with an estimated employment of 3,551. Heavy and Tractor-Trailer Truck Drivers earned the highest average wage of the 10 largest occupations with \$39,849 earned annually.

Surgeons was the highest paying occupation for the Area, earning \$280,098 annually. Family and General Practitioners was second on the list, earning \$197,688. Pharmacists completed the list, earning \$109,514.






The 2015 experienced wage for employers of all sizes was estimated to be \$42,409 for the Area. Employers with 50 to 99 employees had an estimated mean wage of \$32,751. The estimated entry wage for all size categories of employers was \$17,953 for 2015.

Industry

The West Central Arkansas WDA is expected to see a growth of 2,075 jobs by over the 2015-2017projection period. *Food Services and Drinking Places* is estimated to be the top growing industry adding 350 new jobs between 2015 and 2017 to an employment level of 9,365. *Transit and Ground Passenger Transportation* is projected to be the fastest growing industry increasing employment by 12.10 percent to an employment of 139. On the negative side of the economy, *Hospitals* is projected to experience a loss of 199 jobs making it the top declining industry, dropping employment down to 3,233. *Support Activities for Transportation* could see a 31.71 percent decline making it the fastest declining industry in West Central Arkansas going from 328 in 2015 to 224 in 2017. **Professional and Business Services** is predicted to be the top growing supersector adding 482 new jobs increasing employment to 8,643.

Occupations

The Area's employment is expected to increase by 1.69 percent during the 2015-2017 projection period. An estimated 4,207 annual job openings are anticipated in this Area. Growth and expansion is estimated to account for 1,273 of those jobs, while 2,934 would be for replacement. Farmers, Ranchers, and Other Agricultural Managers is estimated to be the top growing occupation with a gain of 123 to an employment level of 6,973. Brickmasons and Blockmasons is expected to increase employment by 8.57 percent making it the fastest growing occupation adding 12 employees to its workforce of 140. Tellers is projected to lose the most jobs with a loss of 46, dropping to an employment level of 594. Reporters and Correspondents could see a 13.51 percent reduction in employment. Food Preparation and Serving Related Occupations is projected to be the top growing major occupational group with an increase of 332 employees.


The Western Arkansas Workforce Development Area saw a slight increase in population between 2014 and 2015, increasing by 107 to 304,658. The Western Arkansas WDA consists of six counties: Crawford, Franklin, Logan, Polk, Scott, and Sebastian; and is bordered to the west by the state of Oklahoma. The Arkansas portion of the Fort Smith Metropolitan Statistical Area is located in the Western Arkansas WDA.

Job creation decreased in the second quarter of 2015 compared to the same quarter in 2014 declining to 4,687. The number of new hires and separations increased during the same time period with new hires totaling 21,294 and separations totaling 20,275

in the second quarter of 2015 and saw significant increases over the 2011-2015 period gaining 2,642 and 1,737 respectively. The turnover rate was 8.6 percent.

Both the labor force and employment increased in from 2014 to 2015. The labor force increased by 1,472 to 113,746, while employment increased by 2,100 to 107,779. Unemployment and the unemployment rate both decreased significantly from 2011 to 2015. Unemployment decreased by 4,185 to 5,967, while the unemployment rate decreased by three and three-tenths of a percentage point to 5.2. The Area's unemployment rate continued to decline through July 2016, falling to 4.3 percent.




Labor Force/Employment



Wages

Heavy and Tractor-Trailer Truck Drivers was the largest occupation in the Area in 2015 with an estimated employment of 4,642, with an experienced wage of \$41,462 annually. Registered Nurses, with an estimated employment of 2,120 had the highest entry wage of the 10 largest occupations, earning \$42,025 annually.

Surgeons was the highest paying occupation, averaging \$281,048 annually. Family and General Practitioners was second, and average annual wage of \$251,858. Sales Representatives, Wholesale and Manufacturing, Technical and Scientific Products finished the list at \$100,420 annually.







The Area's mean wage estimate for employers of all sizes was \$34,838 in 2015. Employers with 100 to 249 employees had an estimated entry wage of \$19,194. Estimated entry wages for all categories of employers in the Area was \$18,371 while experienced wages was at \$43,072.

Of the 106,577 total number of employees, employees earning \$15.00 to \$19.99 an hour totaled 17,964. Employees earning \$7.50 to \$9.99 an hour totaled 31,692 for 2015, the largest group for the Area.

Industry

The Western Arkansas WDA is expected to experience a net gain of 2,677 jobs during the 2015-2017 projection period. *Administrative and Support Services* is predicted to be the top growing industry gaining 584 jobs between 2015 and 2017 moving from 5,453 employees in 2015 to 6,037 in 2017. At 17.14 percent, *Paper Manufacturing* is projected to be the fastest growing industry in Western Arkansas adding 188 new jobs to its workforce. *Machinery Manufacturing* is estimated to be the top declining industry losing 141 jobs by March 2017. *Support Activities for Mining* is predicted to lose 13.98 percent of its workforce making it the fastest declining industry in the Area. **Professional and Business Services** is predicted to be the top growing supersector increasing employment by 860 jobs to an employment of 10,709.

Occupations

The Western Arkansas WDA is projected to have a net job gain of 2.30 percent between 2015 and 2017. Around 4,249 annual job openings are expected to be available during the projection period with 2,719 for replacement and 1,530 for growth and expansion. Heavy and Tractor-Trailer Truck Drivers is estimated to be the top growing occupation with an increase of 267 jobs, going from 4,496 in 2015 to 4,763 in 2017. Gas Plant Operators is predicted to be the fastest growing occupation with an increase of 20 percent. Tellers is anticipated to lose 48 jobs by March 2017, with 554 in 2015 dropping to 506 in 2017. Forest and Conservation Technicians, could lose 13.33 percent of its workforce, making it the fastest declining industry in the Area. **Transportation and Material Moving Occupations** leads the Area as the top growing occupational major group with an estimated 468 new jobs, increasing employment to 11,259.
