


INCOME

Median household income in Arkansas: **\$41,371, 49**th in the nation About three quarters of Arkansas households have an income of less than \$75,000.




Arkansas's highest median household incomes are in the central and northwest regions of Arkansas. The lowest incomes are along the state's eastern border.

Median Household Income, by County (2011-15)







Median age of workers 16 to 64 years old: 39.9 years old



Weeks Worked, Arkansas Population 16-64 Years Old









EDUCATION


In Arkansas, just 22% of adults 25 to 64 years old have a bachelor's degree or higher. In a somewhat expanded age range, nearly 238,000 Arkansans ages 18 to 64 do not have a high school diploma or GED.



The overall poverty rate in Arkansas is **19.3%**. The rate decreases as education levels increase. The poverty rate among adults with a bachelor's degree or higher is about a third of the poverty rate among adults with some college or an associate's degree.



Adults with a bachelor's degree earn about 48% more than those with only some college or an associate's degree.




The Arkansas Department of Workforce Services calculates the top 10 occupations in Arkansas based on "the projected number of annual job openings."



ARKANSAS'S JOBS BY INDUSTRY

Currently, the highest number of jobs in Arkansas are in trade, transportation and utilities, followed by government.
