




# Career Coach Program Overview

- With the passage of Act 1285 during the 2013 General Session, all counties are eligible to participate
- Participation in Arkansas Works Career Coach program is now determined through a competitive grant process
- For AY 2014, Fifteen (15) two-year colleges and one (1) education cooperative received grants and serve as colocation sites for Career Coach Programs
- 49 Career Coaches are employed through the co-location sites

# Career Coach Program Territory Performance of the state of the state

### Career Coach Funding The Career Coach Program is funded by multiple sources: CACG Federal Grants (TANF, College Challenge Access, and Workforce Investment Act) ■ School 14% Districts TANF School Districts (National School Lunch Act – NSLA and Carl D. Perkins Career and ■ WIA Technical Education Act) Winthrop Rockefeller Non-Profit (Winthrop Rockefeller Foundation) 67% of funding streams due to expire in June 2014



### CAREER PATHWAYS PROGRAM SUCCESSES

- Student success more than 17 points higher in FY12 compared to other community college students (Students completed or retained from Fall to Fall)
- More than 28,000 adults enrolled.
- More than 24,000 certificate and degrees attained.
- Entered Employment and Job Retention exceeds goal when matched to Unemployment Insurance (UI) Data.
- Return on Investment (ROI) When participant income at entry into the CPI program (as documented in initial application materials) are measured against subsequent wage increases related to improved employment opportunities, the program is able to document a significant benefit to the state through aggregated increases in income and sales tax revenue and a decrease in spending on public assistance. These positive benefits are then weighed against costs related to the public investment in the CPI. Promising Pathways staff developed a model to project the ROI realized by the State of Arkansas as a result of the CPI program which shows a positive return within a two to three year time frame, despite very conservative assumptions. A very small sample set of participants from a past cohort was used to test the model.

### STUDENT DEMOGRAPHICS

- CPI participants must be an adult caretaker, parent or relative of child living in the home under the age of 21 who is deemed financially needy.
- Average age of the CPI student is 31.
- Student population is primarily female 90%.
- More than 60% are single parents (FY12 Progress Report).

### RECOGNITION OF MODEL

- In addition to being identified as 1 of 10 most Promising Pathways programs in the nation, CPI was:
  - SELECTED as member of Career Pathways Alliance (CP Alliance), a two-year national-level study by Center for Law and Social Policy (CLASP). CLASP is partnering with ten leading edge career pathway states to develop a national voluntary consensus framework of quality benchmarks and performance metrics for career pathways.
  - CHOSEN as one of two Innovative Ideas with \$10,000 awarded by Evans School of Public Affairs, University of Washington. The Ideas for Action Award is a competition to develop new thinking to reduce poverty by shining a light on practical policy shifts that help low-income people build their futures.
  - IDENTIFIED by Office of Family Assistance (OFA) as Model Employment Programs for Economic Self-Sufficiency Site Visits. A technical assistance team and film crew, on behalf of OFA, interviewed the ADHE/CPI team and visited ASUN and NPCC campuses. Career Services staff were interviewed and employers and working students were filmed.
  - <u>Published</u> by Jobs for the Future (JFF), Thinking Big; Career Pathways Initiative was cited as a framework for scaling up in community colleges.
  - SELECTED as Best Fit Integrator Exceptional Service Award in Education Services by Digital Government/Education-Partner. Project: Arkansas Career Pathways Data Management System (CPDMS).
- AATYC is raising private foundation funding to do a thorough evaluation of the Arkansas Career Pathways program. The impact on participants and their children will be evaluated to determine the impact on generational poverty. The evaluation will be used to raise additional funding to maintain and expand the program.

### AATYC CENTER FOR STUDENT SUCCESS

- Center was created to support innovation aimed at graduating more students at the two-year colleges.
- Since 2010, more than \$17 million in grants have been secured to support experimentation with innovative practices to improve student retention and completion.
- The center is managing projects on virtually every aspect of college operations, including reforming developmental education instruction, reforming career and technical education instruction, reforming advising and student support services, and building institutional research capabilities.
- The Center is also developing and advocating for state policy changes to support the institutional level reforms and otherwise improve student success.


# PACE (PATHWAYS TO ACCELERATED COMPLETION AND EMPLOYMENT) GRANT


- o All 22 two-year colleges are piloting the same instructional reform models as the CCA colleges. These reform models are intended to accelerate students completion of developmental education requirements, shortening the time students spend in remedial education by a year or more.
- AATYC is doing a thorough evaluation of these reforms under PACE to identify best practices, and innovation will continue to be supported thru AATYC until there are substantially improved outcomes for students at a significant scale statewide.
- Also under PACE, every two-year college has created a "test prep" program that is intended to orient students to the COMPASS/ACT test before they take the test to improve students test scores and thus eliminate or reduce the need for remedial coursework.




