Representative Cozart called the meeting to order.

Representative Vaught made the motion to accept the House version of the adequacy matrix presented, and to divide voting by chambers. Representative Cozart placed the motion on hold for further discussion.

Representative Cozart recognized Johnny Key, Secretary, Department of Education, and Mr. Robert Branch, Department of Finance and Administration, State Budget Office, were recognized to provide information on adequacy funds.

Representative Johnson made the motion to end discussion on previous motion on the table and move for immediate consideration. Without objection the motion carried.

Representative Vaught reinstated her motion to accept the House version of the adequacy matrix, and to divide the voting by chambers. The motion carried in the House. The motion failed in the Senate.

Representative Godfrey made the motion that the Joint Committees on Education make a recommendation that the 94th General Assembly considers the 2020 Augenblick, Palaich and Associates (APA) recommendation to remove the special education funding from the matrix and instead provide weighted support based on actual special education students served, after looking at other spending models from other states and collaboration with key stakeholders. Representative Meeks seconded the motion and without objections the motion carried.
