# **TFA Proof Points in Arkansas**

2007 TFA alumnus and Arkansas native, Justin Minkel, was named Arkansas Teacher of the Year.

### 2009

In an independent study, 97% of principals partnering with TFA reported that TFA teachers made "very positive impacts on their schools."

#### 2011

On average, 1st year TFA teachers met 81% of their growth goals: 1.6 years of growth (elementary) and 1.9 years of growth (high school). On average, 2nd year TFA teachers met 91% of their growth goals: 1.6 years of growth (elementary) and 1.9 years of growth (high school).

#### 2012

KIPP Delta Collegiate High School-Helena, where 100% of its school leaders and over 75% of its teachers are TFA corps members and alumni, was named: - 2°\* highest performing high school in Arkanasa by US *News and Warkit Report*. - 1 of only 5 Exemplary High Schools in the state, as named by the ADE.

## Student Performance in TFA Classrooms

Clarendon High School, Clarendon: In his first-year of teaching, 100% of Jeremy Rogoff's students scored proficient or advanced on the Algebra EOC exam.

Lakeside High School, Lake Village: Alen Amini's Advanced Math students averaged an 11 in August on the math portion of the ACT. By May, their Math average rose above the national average to 23.7.

SE Middle School, Pine Bluff: Kailfin Parker and Katelyn Wilhemi, 7th Grade Language Arts teachers, closed the reading gap between their students and their more affluent peers by 53% in one year.

Marvell High School, Marvell: Due in part to Sean Anthony's Algebra students' significant growth on the ECC exam, Marvell High School met the requirements for exiting "school improvement" for the first time in over a decade.

# TFA & Arkansas working together...

Human Capital: Supply & Demand

Increasing Supply:

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- TFA tripled its Arkansas corps size from 71 teachers to 214 (total) teachers this fall.
- In 2011, Arkansas legislators passed ACT 1178, that stream-lined and removed redundancies and duplications from the licensure process for TFA teachers and others.

Greater Demand:

- reater Demand: Commissioner Kimbrell requests that TFA continue growing its corps size to a minimum of 250 TFA teachers in Arkansas each year. This year, TFA placed 103 first-year teachers by June 8th, and received requests to fill yet another 100 to 150 positions. Superintendents, school administrators, the ADE, supporters and community leaders across the state are requesting more TFA teachers than TFA is able to fund.

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## Human Capital: Invest to Sustain & Grow TFA to achieve AR's vision for educational excellence

TFA significantly increased and diversified its funding base primarily through private sector resources to recruit, select, train, and provide on-going support to accomplish these high academic results.

ADE is increasing its support from \$3K to \$4K per TFA teacher per year.

For AR to remain competitive nationally and with contiguous states, AR needs to increase its annual contribution to \$10K per TFA teacher per year to preserve its market share of desired top talent.

Investing \$2.5M in recurring State Funds would sustain and keep TFA's human capital supply on-track to meet increasing demand and the State's request to increase TFA teachers and leaders in Arkansas.

TFA's fund-raising would match state funds 1+ :1 primarily from other private sources .
