MEETING SUMMARY

Introduction of Incoming Members

Senator Jeffress recognized incoming members of the House and Senate Education Committees and requested that they stand and be given a hand.

Senator Jeffress called for a moment of silence in respect for the recent passing of both the mother of Representative-Elect Patti Julian and the father of Ms. Lori Bowen of the Bureau of Legislative Research (BLR).

Reports from Members Who Attended Recent Meetings Concerning Public or Higher Education

The Honorable Joyce Elliott, State Senator, District 33, was recognized. Senator Elliott apprised the Committees that she would serve as co-chair of the National Conference of State Legislatures (NCSL) Education Committee along with Senator Luther S. Olsen of Wisconsin.

Mr. Dave Spence, President, Southern Regional Education Board (SREB), Atlanta, Georgia, was recognized. Mr. Spence commented on Arkansas's leadership in the statewide college readiness initiative, and urged those involved to stay the course.

Senator Jeffress announced that there would be a deviation from the agenda, and the Committees would next take up Item H.

Report by the Arkansas Department of Higher Education (ADHE) Concerning Student Remediation Pursuant to Act 696 of 2011

Presenter & Synopsis:

Mr. Shane Broadway, Interim Director, Arkansas Department of Higher Education, was recognized. Mr. Broadway discussed the 2012 Annual Remediation Report, including direct and indirect costs of providing remediation to students, and initiatives taken up to address issues of remediation and student success.

- o implementation of transitional courses,
- o input of administrators into discussion of course modules,
- o Southwest Arkansas Preparatory Academy,
- o expansion of summer programs and the Career College Readiness Program (CCRP),
- o transitional courses as key to solving the problem with remediation,
- data indicates a student's completion of remediation before exiting high school is a "gamechanger,"

Senator Jeffress announced that the Committees would now return to Item F on the agenda. He explained that the Administrative Rules and Regulations Subcommittee had sought the Committees' input on the following rules before final approval. He said the Committees had three options when looking at the rules: 1) favorably review the rules, 2) choose not to review them, or 3) do nothing.

Review of the Arkansas Department of Education's Proposed Rules Concerning Educator Licensure and Proposed Repeals Referred by the Administrative Rules and Regulations Subcommittee of the Arkansas Legislative Council

Presenter & Synopsis:

Mr. Mark White, Staff Attorney, Arkansas Department of Education, was recognized. Mr. White said nine (9) separate rules for licensure had been collapsed into this single rule, and noted that the number of pages had been cut from 78 to 40 in the process. Mr. White said there had been 264 oral and written comments incorporated into these rules. He highlighted some key changes in this third revision:

- initial licensure eliminated,
- P4 license converted to a K6 license,
- birth K level license added,
- administrator license converted to a P12 license,
- additional opportunities to test out to other license areas, and
- additional options offered for licensure of school counselors.

- effect of proposed rules on contract counselors.

<u>Relevant Actions:</u>

The Honorable Johnnie Roebuck, State Representative, District 20, was recognized, and made a motion to send the rules back to the Administrative Rules and Regulations Subcommittee, noting that the Committees had reviewed all of the rules with the exception of 4.0. The motion was seconded by Senator Joyce Elliott.

The Honorable Kim Hendren, State Senator, District 9, was recognized, and made a substitute motion to send the rules back to the Subcommittee, noting that the Committees had favorably reviewed all of the changes in the rules. The substitute motion was seconded.

The Honorable Joyce Elliott, State Senator, District 33, was recognized, and spoke against the substitute motion.

The Honorable Debra Hobbs, State Representative, District 96, was recognized, and spoke in favor of the substitute motion.

Following a voice vote and subsequent failure of the substitute motion, Representative Roebuck restated the original motion. *Pursuant to the motion of Representative Roebuck, the motion was carried.*

Senator Jeffress announced that the rules would be sent back to the Administrative Rules and Regulations Subcommittee to take up at their meeting on December 12.

Discussion of Policy Issues from a School District Perspective

1. Impact of the Leader in Me Program

Presenter & Synopsis:

Ms. Ashley Williams, Principal, Mary Mae Jones Elementary School, Bentonville, AR, was recognized. Ms. Williams gave a PowerPoint presentation on how The Leader in Me is impacting Bentonville, AR through the Mary Mae Jones Elementary School. She gave a brief background of the program which takes the principles of Dr. Stephen R. Covey's book, *Seven Habits of Highly Effective People*, and integrates them into the school curriculum, everyday language, and culture. She said it's a three-year process that builds upon the knowledge and understanding of each previous year. She commented that there are 18 schools in Arkansas that are currently in The Leader in Me process. She noted that positive results from the process include increased student academic achievement, increased accountability, increased engagement with teachers, students, and parents, increased student confidence, and decreased discipline referrals. She stated The Leader in Me process not only students individually but classrooms and schools as a whole.
