#### **KIPP DELTA BY THE NUMBERS**

- 5 schools currently operating
- Over 1300 students in grades Pre K-12
- 92 % African-American
- 88 % qualify for free or reduced lunch
- 99% of our 5 graduating classes have been accepted by a college or university

### OUR JOURNEY A timeline of KIPP Delta Public Schools

- 1994 First KIPP school opens in Houston, TX.
- 2002 KIPP Delta College Preparatory School opens its doors to 65 fifth graders in Helena-West Helena.
- 2006 KIPP Delta Collegiate High School opens. The class of 2010 finished eighth grade with scores on average at the 86th percentile in math. In fifth grade, these students were at the 18th percentile on average.
- 2008 KIPP Delta College Preparatory School is one of only three schools in Arkansas to be named a Blue Ribbon School by the U.S. Department of Education.
- 2009 KIPP Delta Elementary Literacy Academy opens its doors. KIPP Delta opens multi-purpose gym that provides a home for our competitive sports teams, physical education dasses and school-wide events.
- 2010 KIPP Blytheville College Preparatory School opens. The first dass of KIPPsters graduates from KIPP Delta Collegiate High with a 100% acceptance rate to a four year college or university. They have an average ACT score above the Arkansas and national average.
- 2012 Executive Director, Scott Shirey, named to "World's 7 Most Powerful Educators" list in *Forbes*. KIPP Delta Elementary Literacy Academy begins offering Pre-Kindergarten.
- 2014 KIPP Blytheville Collegiate High School opens. KIPP Delta Collegiate High School named #2 high school in state by U.S. News and World Report.



## **SCHOOLS AT A GLANCE**

- Part of the national network of KIPP (Knowledge is Power Program) Public Schools.
- Our 5 graduating classes have earned over \$5 million in college scholarships.
- 99% of our students have been accepted by a 2 or 4-year college or university across the nation. 85% of our five graduating classes are currently enrolled in or have graduated from a 2 or 4-year college or university.

- Where we started: 1 school, 65 students.
  In 2002, KIPP Delta Public Schools began with 65 fifth graders and one promise: We would do whatever it takes to help our kids climb the mountain to and through college.
- Where we are: 5 schools, over 1300 students.

Today, KIPP Delta Public Schools serve students in Pre-Kindergarten through 12<sup>th</sup> grade in five schools: KIPP Delta Elementary Literacy Academy, KIPP Delta College Preparatory School, KIPP Delta Collegiate High School, KIPP Blytheville Collegiate High School.

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#### **KIPP Delta Mission & Demographics**

#### KIPP Delta History & Achievements

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#### **KIPP Through College**

KTC is a comprehensive approach to supporting KIPPsters from middle school through college graduation. Our goal is to eventually graduate students at the same rate as their high-income peers throughout the country.

KTC has secured 3 college partners who will provide over \$2.6 million in the next three years to help support students in high school and college.



In the last 4 years, KIPP Delta graduates have been offered \$5.2 million in scholarships (from non-partner sources).

## KIPP Through College -Impact

<u>2010 - 2014</u>

- 74% Persisting or Graduated (4-year, 2-year, and ACTI)
- 3% Military or National Service (Full-time only)
- 13% of 2010 have graduated with a 4-year degree















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# **About KIPP Delta**



KIPP Delta Public Schools is a growing network of KIPP charter schools offering a free, college-preparatory education to children in the Arkansas Delta. After being asked by the state to come to Arkansas, we opened our first school in Helena in 2002. We now serve more than 1,200 students across four schools in Helena and Blytheville, Arkansas. KIPP Delta Public Schools are providing a choice to families in the Delta seeking an excellent public education for their children. Our mission is to create and support schools that empower students from underserved communities to develop the knowledge, skills, and character traits necessary to pursue a college education and a life of value, joy, and integrity.

## Results

- KIPP Delta College Preparatory School named "Blue Ribbon School" by US Department of Education in 2007.
- KIPP Delta Collegiate High School named the #2 high school in Arkansas by U.S. News & World Report in 2011 and #4 in 2012 and 2013. School also named one of five "exemplary" schools by Arkansas Department of Education in 2012.
- KIPP Delta Public Schools received the APSRC District MAP Growth Award in 2013.



## **Barrier to Growth: Inadequate Funding for Facilities**

The lack of facilities funding is the largest barrier to financial sustainability for KIPP Delta. Like traditional Arkansas public schools, charters receive foundation, or per-pupil funding from the state (though KIPP Delta is funded at a lower level than the local district, as referenced in the chart below). However, unlike traditional public schools, charters do not have access to the local tax base (millage) for facility needs. We are also not allowed to receive funding from the state's Academic Facilities Partnership Program, which helps traditional public schools build, renovate, and maintain their facilities. In addition, KIPP Delta has not been able to take advantage of unused, vacant local district facilities. Therefore, we must raise funds or take on debt to ensure our students have the facilities they need. Either way we still come up short.

Our ability to expand is hindered, while our student waiting list grows by the day.





Despite our best efforts, financial constraints have prevented us from providing adequate facilities for all of our students.

## **Stretched Thin**

Since 2002, KIPP Delta has stretched all we can from available resources to lease, build, and renovate existing facilities. We have had to take on **\$7 million in debt**, and that is just to help with basics. No KIPP Delta school has a dedicated gymnasium; only two schools have a cafeteria, and our elementary school has no playground. (By comparison, Helena-West Helena School District received more than \$6 million in dedicated facilities funding from the state and \$1.1 million in local tax dollars last year alone.) Meanwhile, we are forced to spend nearly **8% of our per pupil state allocation funding to pay back our debt** – money that should be spent educating our students.



## **The Solution**

For KIPP Delta to continue serving our students, and to facilitate the kind of growth that will benefit our communities, it is vital that Arkansas implement education policies that bridge the facilities funding gap between traditional public schools and charters, like KIPP.
