Reports from Members Who Attended Recent Meetings Concerning Public or Higher Education

**The Honorable Bill Gossage**, State Representative, District 82, was recognized. Representative Gossage congratulated Governor Asa Hutchinson on his selection as chair of the Southern Regional Education Board (SREB) at the organization's annual meeting in Naples, Florida. He said it was a great honor for the Governor as well as for Arkansas.

**The Honorable Charles L. Armstrong**, State Representative, District 30, was recognized. Representative Armstrong thanked Senator Joyce Elliott for recently serving as chair of the Legislative Advisory Council of SREB. He stated SREB's programs can greatly benefit Arkansas.

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**The Honorable Grant Hodges**, State Representative, District 96, was recognized. Representative Hodges agreed that the SREB conference had been a valuable experience.

Representative Cozart said the SREB meeting was a great conference and Arkansas was well represented. He also mentioned he had returned from a very good meeting of education chairs in Park City, Utah, where he learned from a report that Arkansas was a leader in teacher preparation.

Update on the Activities of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education

# <u>Presenter</u>:

**Dr. Brett Powell**, Director, Arkansas Department of Higher Education (ADHE), was recognized. Dr. Powell discussed changes made in the department as a result of both a 1% funding reduction and a reduction in reimbursements from lottery proceeds. He stated the two combined reductions required adjustments to enable the department to provide adequate and accurate information with less funding. He said the department restructured and formed a research and technology division mainly to analyze and report results from higher education activities to interested constituencies. Dr. Powell discussed the first three projects in which increased efforts around research and a better understanding of data are being utilized.

- 1) Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program analyze the program five years into its existence to determine the program's effectiveness, where roughly \$500 million used for scholarship funding over that five years has gone, and what return there has been for those dollars.
- 2) **Remedial Programs** determine what is and what is not working in remedial programs by utilizing three years of accumulated data, and making recommendations about the most effective way to move forward regarding remediation.
- 3) **Level of Student Loan Debt** determine the level of student loan debt in the state and nationally, and whether it rests with students who have completed degrees or with those who have left without completing a credential; and assessing if anything can be gleaned from that data that would be helpful in recommending policies going forward.

Dr. Powell next spoke about items that came out of the past legislative session, specifically, implementing guidelines developed for regional workforce grants (Act 1131); unplanned pregnancies and orientation materials (Act 943); and tuition and fee reporting (Act 700). He additionally updated activities concerning performance funding, financial aid, and concurrent credit. He said the ADHE website is undergoing an update which will be released sometime in August. He said the outcome of that will be a reporting repository for easier access to reports regularly produced by ADHE; and an improved policy document to make policies for institutions easier to find. Dr. Powell stated that beyond the mentioned activities, ADHE is working on policies and projects around several areas that will, at some point, be built into an updated master plan for higher education work.

Discussion of the Activities of SkillsUSA, formerly known as Vocational Industrial Clubs of America (VICA)

# Presenters:

**Dr. Charisse Childers**, Director, Arkansas Department of Career Education, was recognized, and introduced Mr. Chip McAfee to speak about the student organization, SkillsUSA.

**Mr. Chip McAfee**, Office of Skilled and Technical Sciences, Department of Career Education, was recognized. Utilizing a PowerPoint presentation, Mr. McAfee described SkillsUSA as a CTSO, a career and technical student organization, which is under the umbrella of the Department of Career Education. He said it is part of a not-for-profit, national association with over 300,000 members, including students, teachers, educators, and business and industrial partners. He said this past year the organization had approximately 5,000 members in Arkansas. He noted that, founded in 1965 as the Vocational Industrial Clubs of America (VICA), SkillsUSA has prepared over 10.6 million students for the workforce. He stated that SkillsUSA focuses on three (3) things: technical skills, work-based skills, and personal skills. Mr. McAfee discussed three (3) events: Fall Leadership, State Contest, and the National Contest.

He said SkillsUSA helps students develop the skills they need to find jobs and establish careers, and the competitions help showcase their talents.

**The Honorable Alan Clark**, State Senator, District 13, was recognized. Senator Clark commended Mr. Bibb for the passion he exhibits for educating ACTI students, and praised him for what ACTI's students are able to accomplish.

**Dr. Mark Gotcher**, Deputy Commissioner, Arkansas Department of Education, was recognized, and introduced the presenters.

**Dr. Eric Saunders**, Assistant Commissioner, Division of Research and Technology, Arkansas Department of Education, was recognized. He stated the division is working together with the Department of Information Services (DIS) to make sure every district in the state has a minimum of 200 kbit/s per student. He said implementation for this project will take approximately two years.
