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21	BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS:
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23	SECTION 1. Arkansas Code § 6-20-2305(a)(2), concerning per-student
24	foundation funding amounts, is amended to read as follows:
25	(2)(A) For the <del>2013-2014</del> <u>2015-2016</u> school year, the foundation
26	funding amount is equal to <del>six thousand three hundred ninety-three dollars</del>
27	<del>(\$6,393)</del> <u>six thousand five hundred eighty-four dollars (\$6,584)</u> multiplied by
<b>28</b> .	the school district's average daily membership for the previous school year.
29	(B) For the <del>2014-2015</del> <u>2016–2017</u> school year and each school
30	year thereafter, the foundation funding amount is equal to <del>six thousand five</del>
31	hundred twenty-one dollars (\$6,521) six thousand six hundred forty-six
32	dollars (\$6,646) multiplied by the school district's average daily membership
33	for the previous school year.
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35	SECTION 2. Arkansas Code § 6-20-2305(b)(2)(A)(i) and (ii), concerning
36	per-student state categorical funding amounts for alternative learning

Arkansas Code § 6-20-2305(b)(4)(A)(i)-(iii), concerning 26 per-student state categorical funding amounts for national school lunch 27 28 students, are amended to read as follows: 29 (4)(A) National school lunch state categorical funding for each identified national school lunch student shall be as follows: 30 31 (i) For a school district in which ninety percent (90%) or greater of the previous school year's enrolled students are national 32 school lunch students, the amount of per-student national school lunch state 33 categorical funding is one thousand five-hundred forty-nine dollars-(\$1,549): 34 35 (a) For the 2015-2016 school year, one 36 thousand five hundred sixty-two dollars (\$1,562) and

16	(a) For the 2015-2016 school year, five
17	hundred twenty-two dollars (\$522); and
18	(b) For the 2016-2017 school year, five
19	hundred twenty-six dollars (\$526).

21	SECTION 5. Arkansas Code § 6-20-2305(b)(5)(A) and (B), concerning per-
22	student state categorical funding amounts for professional development, are
23	amended to read as follows:
24	<del>(5)(A)(5)</del> For the <del>2013-201</del> 4 <u>2015-2016 and 2016-2017</u> school <del>year</del>
25	years, professional development funding shall be equal to an amount of up to
26	fifty-three dollars-(\$53.00) thirty-two dollars and forty cents (\$32.40)
27	multiplied by the school district's previous school year average daily
28	membership.
29	<del>(B)-For the 2014-2015-school year and each-school year</del>
30	thereafter, professional development funding shall be equal to an amount of
31	up-to-fifty-four-dollars-(\$54.00)-multiplied by-the-school-district's
32	previous school year average daily membership.
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34	SECTION 6. DO NOT CODIFY. TEMPORARY LANGUAGE.
35	(a) The General Assembly finds that:
36	(1) It is the duty of the state to provide a general, suitable,

1	and efficient system of free public schools to the children of the state
2	under Arkansas Constitution Article 14, § 1;
3	(2) The General Assembly is obligated to ensure that an adequate
4	and equitable system of education is provided;
5	(3) Student transportation may be a necessary component for
6	providing a student with an equitable opportunity for an adequate education
7	to the extent that a student would not otherwise be able to realize this
8	opportunity but for transportation being provided by the state;
9	(4) Analyzing the portion of student transportation funding is
10	required for adequacy purposes and is a highly complex, fact-intensive study
11	that requires the analysis of many factors such as student characteristics,
12	bus routes, route miles, and a variety of other factors;
13	(5)(A) In "A Report on Legislative Hearings for the 2014 Interim
14	Study on Education Adequacy", the House Committee on Education and the Senate
15	Committee on Education found that transportation funding should continue to
16	be funded at the same levels for the 2016 and 2017 fiscal years.
17	(B) The House Committee on Education and the Senate
18	Committee on Education also recommended the creation of a separate
19	supplemental transportation funding program for school districts with high
20	transportation costs to be distributed using a transportation funding model
21	developed by the Bureau of Legislative Research;
22	(6) The transportation funding model developed by the Bureau of
23	Legislative Research would result in one hundred (100) of two hundred thirty-
24	six (236) school districts not receiving any supplemental transportation
25	<u>funds;</u>
26	(7) The Bureau of Legislative Research dedicated extensive time
27	and effort toward the development of the transportation funding model and the
28	General Assembly is extremely grateful for those efforts;
29	(8) The transportation funding model developed by the Bureau of
30	Legislative Research may be the best evidence-based method for the
31	distribution of supplemental transportation funding; and
32	(9) The General Assembly requires additional time to study the
33	transportation funding model developed by the Bureau of Legislative Research
34	before implementing the findings and recommendations of the House Committee
35	on Education and the Senate Committee on Education.
36	(b) The House Committee on Education and the Senate Committee on

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1	Education, in conjunction with the Bureau of Legislative Research, shall
2	conduct a review of the transportation funding model developed by the Bureau
3	of Legislative Research and make recommendations to the Ninetieth General
4	Assembly for consideration during the 2016 fiscal session.
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6	SECTION 7. EMERGENCY CLAUSE. It is found and determined by the
<sup>.</sup> 7	General Assembly of the State of Arkansas that funding for public schools is
8	the obligation of the state; that ensuring adequate funding is provided is
9	the duty of the General Assembly; and that this act is immediately necessary
10	to ensure that funding is provided for the 2015-2016 and 2016-2017 school
11	years so that school districts can budget accordingly. Therefore, an
12	emergency is declared to exist, and this act being immediately necessary for
13	the preservation of the public peace, health, and safety shall become
14	effective on:
15	(1) The date of its approval by the Governor;
16	(2) If the bill is neither approved nor vetoed by the Governor,
17	the expiration of the period of time during which the Governor may veto the
18	<u>bill; or</u>
19	(3) If the bill is vetoed by the Governor and the veto is
20	overridden, the date the last house overrides the veto.
