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13	WHEREAS, improperly managed or stockpiled tires can be costly to clean
14	up and hazardous to the environment and public health, presenting a fire ris
15	and ideal habitat for the breeding of mosquitoes and other disease-
16	transmitting vectors; and
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18	WHEREAS, waste tires present a difficult disposal problem for
19	landfills; and
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21	WHEREAS, processed waste tires are a valuable commodity that can be
22	beneficially recycled into many products, including advanced pavement
23	surfaces, tire-derived fuel, flooring and molded products, rubber mulch and
24	surfaces, and civil engineering aggregate; and
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26	WHEREAS, waste tire end-market development programs, including economi
27	incentives to reduce the high cost of producing commodities and products from
28	waste tires, are proven strategies to drive better end-of-life outcomes for
29	waste tires; and
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31	WHEREAS, these end-market development programs also support economic
32	development and jobs in the recycling industry; and
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34	WHEREAS, free-market waste tire programs have been shown to be
35	effective and capture almost all waste tires in a state; and

WHEREAS, the Arkansas waste tire programs require substantial

improvements in order to produce better financial and environmental outcomes,

NOW THEREFORE,

BE IT PROPOSED BY THE SENATE COMMITTEE ON PUBLIC HEALTH, WELFARE, AND LABOR OF THE NINETY-FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS:

THAT the Senate Committee on Public Health, Welfare, and Labor study the operations of the Arkansas waste tire program and the potential for improving the financial and environmental strength of the Arkansas waste tire program, including without limitation:

- (1) The full-cost accounting of the current program, including the full-cost accounting of each used tire program district;
- (2) Appropriate definitions for tire categories by size and use for small, large, extra-large, and off-the-road, also known as "OTR", tires and appropriate associate disposal fees;
- (3) Where and how any tire disposal fee should be applied for all scrapped tires generated;
- (4) Innovations in other state programs that encourage higherend uses for waste tires, including market-development programs and incentives to processors;
- (5) An assessment of whole tire and processed material inventories and any steps to be taken to reduce the number of tires or processed materials currently not properly disposed of in legal storage or illegal dump sites;
- (6) Recommendations for changes to the waste tire program that will put the program on a sustainable financial footing while providing for efficient management of the state's waste tires and better environmental outcomes for Arkansas;
- (7) An investigation of potential state actions to create markets and outlets for used tire materials and products;
 - (8) Analysis of manifest systems for efficiency, modernization,

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     and effectiveness; and
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                  (9) Any steps to be taken to reduce illegal dumping in the
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     future.
