35	available technology to disseminate information to the public or send a
36	warning;

(2) Whether other missing person alert types should be used, such as the Blue Alert, Silver Alert, and Ashanti Alert, in addition to the AMBER Alert, and how the state could develop an effective Missing Person Alert Plan to set out each alert, the criteria for each alert, the resources available for each alert, and the process for using each alert; (3) Access to resources provided by the United States Government and other sources to educate and support public safety officials on how to create effective and actionable alert messages to the public to get desired actions; and (4) The creation of the Arkansas Endangered Persons Task Force, a multidisciplinary committee that would provide guidance and support to develop an effective Missing Person Alert Plan, to support statewide Child Abduction Response Teams and include representatives from the Governor's office, Attorney General's office, the General Assembly, the Arkansas Sheriffs' Association, the Arkansas Association of Chiefs of Police, the Arkansas Municipal League, the Division of Arkansas State Police, and a victim advocate.
