



Arkansas's prison population is projected to increase 19% by the end of FY2023



Arkansas now spends more than half a billion dollars on corrections, a 68 percent increase since 2004




Children/Staff in the foster care system each year

According to a study done in 2015-16, 16 percent of children in Arkansas had at some point in their lives a parent or guardian locked up in prison or jail. That was the highest percentage of any state. Some nearby states also had similar percentages. The report by the Annie E. Casey Foundation followed a similar study done in 2011-12.












*The chart above displays the number of children in foster care as of the first day of each month, beginning January 1, 2017.
