RE: Interim Study Proposal 2011-178 Children of Incarcerated Parents

Dear Senator Madison:

The Bureau of Legislative Research has requested that I forward information to the Senate Committee on State Agencies regarding information collected by the Juvenile Ombudsman Division on children committed to the Division of Youth Services who may have an incarcerated parent or caregiver. This information is not collected by the Juvenile Ombudsman Division. However, I offer the following insight regarding these issues.

Attached to this letter is a risk assessment that the Juvenile Ombudsman Division in concert with juvenile judges, prosecutors, defense attorneys and representatives of the Division of Youth Services created. This risk assessment is required to be completed and accompany an order of commitment from the court for each juvenile remanded to the Division of Youth Services. On page two of this assessment regarding the youth's social history is a section to determine if a member of the youth's household including a parent/caregiver is either incarcerated or engaged in criminal activity. Our collective thinking was to provide increased focus on the family system and environment impacting on a court-involved youth. As such, potential exists to examine these issues. Currently, this occurs on a case-by-case basis, but to my knowledge, no one is collecting or analyzing this data point.

Additionally, each youth committed to the Division of Youth Services undergoes an extensive battery of physical, mental and educational evaluations administered through the UAMS Program for Adolescent and Children Evaluations (PACE). This PACE evaluation also includes a social history and potential exists to examine the status of parents/caregivers.

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The Division of Youth Services contracts for services through thirteen community based agencies. One of the roles of these service providers includes family services. Youth placed in the Division of Youth Services residential programs are also afforded family services. Unfortunately, resources limit the capacity for either set of providers to effectively address the needs of the youth with an incarcerated parent. Available resources are, in general, devoted to hopefully preventing the involved youth with continuing in choices and behaviors that might result in the youth experiencing incarceration in an adult setting.

With additional training and focus, efforts could be extended to help a youth remain connected with his/her caregiver that is incarcerated. Regardless of the choices a parent may make, in both the juvenile justice and child welfare arena, the connection between child and parent can and should be a significant bond. Devoting resources to help ensure healthy bonds remain intact and improving upon fractured bonds is an essential pursuit. As I personally witness children "aging out" of the child welfare system and youth in the juvenile justice system who attain majority age, I am reminded that government cannot nor should not place itself in the role of replacing family.

I am grateful for Senator Johnson and his willingness to provide a spotlight on these issues. A first step involving youth remanded to the Division of Youth Services could involve collecting data from the social history contained in the Arkansas Circuit Court Juvenile Division Risk Assessment and the PACE evaluation coordinated through UAMS. Staff training, awareness and resource identification would also need to be included once this subpopulation is identified. Training could be provided through the Arkansas Juvenile Officer's Association, the Juvenile Detention Association and the Division of Youth Services.

If I may be of further assistance in these matters, I welcome your call.
