Ark Division of Youth Services - Overview

Target populations:

- Youth ages 12-21 adjudicated as delinquent and committed to DYS and Juvenile Courts;
- families of youth committed to DYS;
- youth and families referred by Courts as diversion from incarceration or DYS commitment;
- FINS (Families in Need of Services) Interstate Compact for Juveniles;
- 400 youth currently in DYS custody, Secure residential treatment = approx. \$238/day or \$87k year); 12,000 youth and families served in community = approx. \$4k/year or \$11 day)
- aftercare, and FINS services; service priorities determined jointly by Courts and Providers. and youth assessments, diversion, family reunification, family and youth case management, Private provider contracts in each judicial district for community based services to provide family
- DYS currently managing the 7 secure residential treatment facilities, plans to issue RFP for private facility management contractor(s), July 2019. Case Management provided directly by DYS.

Division of Youth Services - Youth Demographics

- 87% male, 50% African American
- Median age at commitment 15 yrs
- Average length of stay (LOS) 10 months; 47% stay longer than 12 months
- 85% below grade level in math/reading; IQ tests below average or lower
- 70% committed for property/drug offenses or technical probation violations
- 67% committed for felony offenses, 33% Misdemeanors
- 75% first time commitments; 25% recommitments
- 35% youth require special education services

Contributing factors:

- inadequate family support system or placement,
- lack of access to mental health, DD and substance abuse services
- commitment of delinquent (felony) act;
- impulsivity aggression or other mental health disorder;
- undiagnosed/untreated learning disorders

Community Based Supports for Youth and Families

- Family reunification, and case management (for families and for youth)
- Validated Risk and Needs assessment for families and youth
- Individual, family and group counseling, Psycho-educational, parenting classes
- Electronic monitoring; Community Service Supervision
- Substance abuse treatment and drug screening

 Day and evening reporting centers
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- Independent living skills; Job skills, vocational training and certifications
- Emergency shelters

Arkansas Juvenile Justice System Reform Goals in Arkansas

- Reduce secure confinement and DYS commitments of delinquent juveniles,
- Right-size (close or repurpose) DYS secure residential treatment facilities and
- 3. Improve services within current residential facilities, including validated risk and needs
- Increase availability and funding for evidence-based community services
- 5. Increase funding and support for Juvenile court staff
- 6. Enhance collaborative data collection, analysis, sharing, and reporting
