Regional Advanced Manufacturing Partnership: Unleashing Potential

The South West Arkansas Community College Consortium (SWACCC) comprises seven community colleges committed to the economic development of the southwest region of Arkansas. Recently, the colleges developed and launched a new strategic vision for collaboration. With the plan in hand, the consortium submitted a proposal for a Department of Labor grant to support partnerships with manufacturers to create a talent-driven economic development approach for the region. The grant focuses on one major aspect of the plan – to engage employers in new symbiotic relationships supporting skill enhancement for workers. The TAACCCT DOL grant was awarded to the SWACCC for \$8.4 million in October, 2013. This session will highlight the progress of the grant.
