## Automated External Defibrillator (AED) Report in Arkansas Public Schools

As required by A.C.A. §6-10-122



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Ark. Code Ann. §6-10-122 requires the Commissioner of Education to provide a yearly report to the Joint Legislative Committees on Public Health, Welfare, and Labor regarding the status of Automated External Defibrillator (AED) availability on each school campus. The Anthony Hobbs III Act of 2009 created the school-based AED and Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation Programs. The implementation of these programs continues to be improved as life-saving techniques and equipment change and evolve.

For the 2018-2019 school year, 1,054 school campuses reported information on AED availability and a contact person for the campus. The number of trained faculty in Arkansas public schools totaled 13,772 persons. Schools provide ongoing training and education to staff and students to increase positive outcomes in life-threatening situations. Support for services and guidance by the Arkansas Department of Education with data monitoring and reporting is provided to district personnel and the Arkansas Department of Health for quality improvement of these programs.

Additionally, Ark. Code Ann. §6-18-703, implemented the requirement for guidelines and other relevant materials to inform and educate school officials, teachers, athletic coaches, students, and parents about the nature and warning signs of sudden cardiac arrest, has increase the response time when an emergency occurs on recognition and use of an AED. Although reporting rescue outcomes is not required, during the 2018-2019 school year, there were five known successful student rescues with an AED.
