THE IDENTIFIED NEED IN ARKANSAS...

- o K-12 2010 student population: 467,061 (59% or 276,034 qualified for free or reduced lunch) (Source: ADE School Performance Report)
- o The percentage of public school children that have Medicaid coverage is over 53%(source MITS)
- o There are currently over 345,000 children aged 3-20 that have Medicaid in the state of Arkansas.

THE IDENTIFIED NEED IN ARKANSAS...

- o Early Periodic Screening, Diagnosis, and Treatment (EPSDT)...34% of Medicaid school age children in AR were served in 2010 (source Arkansas Advocates for Children & Families))
 - 227,000 had no EPSDT
 - · AR ranks last in the country



BARRIERS TO IMPROVING STUDENT HEALTH

- o Current economic climate
 - · Skimping on prevention and screening
 - o Leads to increased medical costs
- o Geography...Not enough medical providers/specialists
 - · Mainly in population centers
- o Low reimbursement rates
 - \$56.41 and has not increased since 2004 (Surrounding states, \$82.51-92.63)
- o Access for caretakers
 - · Missing work means missing income.
 - Transportation
 - Language
- o Inconsistent enrollment
 - · Annual re-enrollment
 - Children lose coverage due to paperwork or procedural reasons, not because he/she became ineligible



Source of funding for SBHC

- Primarily through state general funds and the Maternal and Child Health Block Grant under Title V of the Social Security Act.
- o In Arkansas, our Governor tapped into the tobacco excise tax dollars to fund school-based health centers through competitive grants.



COORDINATED SCHOOL HEALTH AND WELLNESS CENTER INITIATIVE (CSH & WCI)

o With funding from ACT 180 of 2009, the tobacco excise tax, the Arkansas Department of Education (ADE) Office of Coordinated School Health in collaboration with the Arkansas Department of Health (ADH), Arkansas Department of Human Services (DHS), Arkansas Center for Health Improvement (ACHI), and Arkansas Children's Hospital (ACH), awarded nine "Coordinated School Health and Wellness Center Initiative" (CSH & WCI) grants to promote health, wellness, and academic achievement in Arkansas' public schools.





PAYMENT FOR SERVICES:

- Most insurance plans are accepted including Medicaid and ARKids 1st.
- o A co-pay may be required; however, no child will be turned away because of inability to pay for services.
- (ARWITS provided \$5,000 to LPS for costs associated with students who cannot pay)pay)








WHAT IS NEEDED FOR A CHILD TO RECEIVE SERVICES?
