Total Commitments for Fourth Quarter FY 2017-2019

2019 = 81

2018 = 101

Commitments by Offense (Figure 1)

Felony = 62% Misdemeanor = 38%




Figure 2: First Commitments vs. Recommits

First Commitments vs. Recommits (Figure 2)

First Commits = 69% Recommits = 31%




Figure 3: Violent vs. Non-Violent Offenses April–June 2019

Violent vs. Non-Violent Offenses (Figure 3)

Violent offenses = 16% Non-violent offenses = 84%





Figure 4: Commitments by Age, Sex, and Race April-June 2019

Commitments by Age, Gender, Race (Figure 4, 5, 6)

Total commitments, gender: 77% male, 23% female AR youth population, gender: 51% male, 49% female

Total commitments, race: 48% African American, 31% white, 21% other AR youth population, race: 20% African American, 77% white, 3% other

Ages of committed youth: 12–19 years

More than half of youth were 16–17 years old.

Figure 1: Commitments by Offense April-June 2019

April–June 2019



Figure 5: Commitments by Age and Gender April-June 2019



Figure 8: Commitments by District April–June 2019




Figure 9: Commitments by District by Year April–June 2019




Figure 9: Commitments by District by Year (cont.)






Figure 10: Total Commitments for Quarter with Reference to Previous Years

April–June 2019




Figure 11: Youth Served by Community-Based Provider (CBP)
