RE: Report of the Legislative Task Force on Autism

Pursuant to the provisions of Act 1272 of 2009, we are submitting the Arkansas Legislative Task Force on Autism report for your review.

The task force worked to identify issues affecting individuals with autism spectrum disorder and recommends the following legislative priorities for consideration by the 95th General Assembly:

- Expand the pool of qualified autism evaluators by recognizing Licensed Psychological Practitioners (LPPs) for Autism Waiver and Community and Employment Supports (CES) Waiver eligibility determinations;
- Improve access to specialized, medically supervised autism services for individuals with complex behavioral and medical needs;
- Expand individualized housing options through the CES Waiver for individuals with developmental disabilities who are not adequately served in traditional group home settings;
- Reduce financial barriers to additional autism services by exploring Medicaid coverage and reimbursement for supportive care that is currently paid out of pocket by families;
- Strengthen early crisis intervention and multi-system coordination among schools, behavioral health professionals, and guardians to prevent unnecessary hospitalization, placement loss, or behavioral escalation; and
- Update the task force's membership provisions by removing duplicate and outdated positions and revising the vacancy provisions.
