Four-Year Workgroup, Taskforce on College Remediation, Retention, Graduation Executive Summary of February 4 Meeting

Remediation

- *Ultimately a K-12 issue for "traditional" college students
- *BUT two- and four-year colleges MUST work with K-12 to produce better high school graduates, especially in redesigning senior year of high school
- *Therefore, policy: all 11th graders will take the ACT and will take senior-year courses based on results either jointly designed remediation or acceleration
- *Nontraditional" adults returning to school will need remediation/developmental education available at the colleges
- *Two-year colleges will probably handle bulk of post-secondary remediation, but should not be mandated to handle all of it
- *Policy: remedial/developmental education in Arkansas should be assessed; one measure suggested is percentage of students who earn a C or better in subsequent college-level courses. Programs with high success rates can be used as best practices, with professional development implications

Retention

- *Policy: since retention is ultimately an individual college issue, each Arkansas college will develop a retention plan for ADHE with projected increases in retention based on research of benchmark institutions and their retention rates. Incentive funding will act as a catalyst
- *To help colleges with retention, increase numbers and types of scholarships need-based, transfer, first-year performance and state workstudy for on-campus jobs
- *Policy: all colleges will use the same instrument to identify high-risk (not just academic factors) students and will have as part of their retention plan initiatives to address high-risk factors

Graduation

- *Policy: each college will also develop a graduation plan for ADHE with projected increased in graduation, again based on research into benchmark institutions and again supported by incentive funding.
 - *Each college should develop a program to get stop-outs back in school
- *To help colleges with graduation, offer tax credits or post hoc scholarships to adults who return to college

Increasing Number of Students In and Moving Up Education Pipeline

- *Policy: each college will have a transfer plan with the goal of statewide seamless transfer
- *To help students continue up the pipeline from two- to four-year colleges, transfer scholarships and a streamlined financial aid process will be available
- *Market the importance of a college education **Education Matters** widely and often but especially among middle school students
 - *Develop degree-completion programs to help place-bound adult students
 - *Study leaks in P-16 pipeline and develop early alerts and incentives to fix
