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HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

9 EXPRESSING OPPOSITION TO THE PROPOSAL OF THE
10 ADMINISTRATION TO REMOVE HIV INFECTION FROM THE LIST OF
11 COMMUNICABLE DISEASES OF "PUBLIC HEALTH SIGNIFICANCE" FOR
12 PURPOSES OF THE IMMIGRATION LAW AND URGING THE U.S.
13 DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES TO MAINTAIN THE
14 CURRENT POLICY OF TESTING ALL IMMIGRANTS FOR HIV INFECTION
15 AND EXCLUDING THOSE WHO ARE INFECTED FROM SETTLING
16 PERMANENTLY IN THE UNITED STATES.

19 EXPRESSING OPPOSITION TO THE PROPOSAL TO REMOVE HIV
20 INFECTION FROM THE LIST OF COMMUNICABLE DISEASES.

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22 WHEREAS, the epidemic of HIV infection in America has claimed over
23 155,000 lives and continues to spread, especially in our largest cities; and
24 WHEREAS, in 1990, the U. S. Congress, in response to this public health
25 crisis, took the extraordinary step of enacting a program to provide state and
26 local governments with emergency federal assistance to educate, counsel, and
27 treat those who are infected with, or at risk for, HIV; and

28 WHEREAS, studies indicate the HIV-infected individuals require, on the
29 average, up to \$200,000 in health care resources to treat the complications
30 associated with the Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome; and

31 WHEREAS, there is currently a resurgence of tuberculosis in our major
32 cities directly related to HIV disease with one third of the cases resistant
33 to currently available drugs; and

34 WHEREAS, Medicaid in most states has serious budgeting problems and
35 forty percent of persons with AIDS depend on Medicaid for care; and

1 WHEREAS, studies further indicate that as many as ninety percent of HIV-
2 infected persons do not know that they are infected with the potentially fatal
3 virus, and therefore have no reason to modify their behavior to prevent its
4 transmission to others; and

5 WHEREAS, immigrants have historically undergone a health assessment
6 before admission into the United States and since 1987 that assessment has
7 included mandatory screening for the Human Immunodeficiency Virus; and

8 WHEREAS, current law requires that all prospective immigrants who are
9 infected with the Human Immunodeficiency Virus be excluded from settling
10 permanently in the United States; and

11 WHEREAS, medical organizations, such as the American Medical
12 Association, agree that all prospective immigrants should be tested for HIV
13 infection and those who are HIV-seropositive should be prohibited from
14 immigrating to the United States; and

15 WHEREAS, the Administration has proposed removing HIV infection from the
16 list of excludable diseases for the purpose of immigration to the United
17 States; and

18 WHEREAS, in light of the aforementioned crisis in our nation's public
19 health care system, the certainty that HIV-infected individuals will consume
20 significant health care resources, the likelihood that the vast majority of
21 HIV-infected immigrants do not know their HIV-serostatus, and the historical
22 function of immigration officials in screening prospective immigrants for
23 communicable diseases of public health significance,

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25 NOW THEREFORE,

26 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE SEVENTY-NINTH GENERAL
27 ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS, THE SENATE CONCURRING THEREIN:

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29 THAT the General Assembly of the State of Arkansas hereby expresses
30 opposition to the proposal by the Administration to remove HIV infection from
31 the list of communicable diseases of "Public Health Significance" for purposes
32 of immigration law and urges the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services
33 to maintain the current policy of testing all immigrants for HIV infection and
34 excluding those who are infected from settling permanently in the United
35 States.

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2 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that upon adoption of this resolution, a copy
3 hereof shall be transmitted to the appropriate officials of the U.S.
4 Department of Health and Human Services.
