9 "AN ACT TO *AUTHORIZE* LOCAL SCHOOL DISTRICTS TO ADOPT
10 POLICIES FOR IMPLEMENTING SITE-BASED DECISION MAKING IN
11 DISTRICT SCHOOLS; TO PROVIDE A FRAMEWORK FOR LOCAL SCHOOL
12 DISTRICTS CHOOSING TO IMPLEMENT SITE-BASED DECISION
13 MAKING; AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES."

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21 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS:

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23 SECTION 1. LEGISLATIVE INTENT. It is the intention of the General
24 Assembly through this act to stimulate local innovation and creativity in
25 restructuring Arkansas public schools and to facilitate the empowerment of
26 educators and other persons at the local building site level to identify the
27 needs of their particular students and to implement methods of satisfying
28 those needs

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30 SECTION 2. DEFINITIONS. As used in this act, unless the context
31 otherwise requires:

32 (1) "Certified employee" means any person for whom certification is
33 required as the basis of employment in the public schools of the state.

34 (2) "Site-based decision making" means a joint planning and problem
35 solving process implemented within a local school building, providing for a

1 sharing of power, authority and responsibility among teachers, administrators
2 and parents, and designed to shift decision making activity to the local
3 building level;

4 (3) "Classified employee" means any person for whom certification is
5 not required as the basis of employment in the public schools of the state;

6 (4) "Parent" means any parent, legal guardian, or other person having
7 custody or charge of a student enrolled in a public school.

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9 SECTION 3. (a) Following a secret ballot vote by two-thirds (2\3) of
10 the certified employees in a local building site to implement site-based
11 decision-making, the local school district board of directors may adopt a
12 policy for implementing site-based decision making in the district, to
13 include, but not be limited to, a description of how district policies have
14 been amended to allow school employees at the local school building site to
15 be involved in the decision making process as they work to meet educational
16 goals.

17 (b) For the policy to be implemented, it must be adopted by a majority
18 of the board of directors of the school district.

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20 SECTION 4. (a)(1) The school district policy adopted by the board of
21 directors and certified faculty of a local school district shall require the
22 following when any local school building site elects to implement site-based
23 decision making under the provisions of this act:

24 (A) A school council shall be established, composed of
25 teachers, classified employees, and the building principal or administrator.
26 A majority of the council shall be made up of teachers;

27 (B) The teacher representatives on the council shall be
28 elected by a majority of the teachers in a secret ballot election conducted
29 by the teachers in the building. The classified employee representatives
30 shall be elected by a majority of the classified employees in a secret ballot
31 election conducted by the classified employees;

32 (C) Members of the school council shall elect a chairman,
33 vice-chairman, and secretary;

34 (D) The school council may include parent representatives
35 if two-thirds (2/3) of the parents present at a meeting called for that

1 purpose vote to participate in site-based decision making. The parent
2 representatives on the council shall be elected by the parents at a meeting
3 called for that purpose and shall not be relatives of any employee of the
4 school or any board member;

5 (2) The policy adopted by the local school district board of
6 directors to implement site-based decision making shall also address the
7 following:

8 (A) School budget and administration, including:
9 discretionary funds; activity and other school funds; funds for maintenance,
10 supplies and equipment; and accounting and auditing;

11 (B) Assessment of individual student progress, including
12 testing and reporting of student progress to students, parents, the school
13 district, the community, and the state;

14 (C) School improvement plans, including the form and
15 function of strategic planning and its relationship to district planning;

16 (D) Professional development plans developed pursuant to
17 the state accreditation standards;

18 (E) Parent, citizen, and community participation including
19 the relationship of the school council with other groups;

20 (F) Cooperation and collaboration within the district,
21 with other districts and with other public and private agencies;

22 (G) Requirements for waiver of district policies;

23 (H) Requirements for record keeping by the school council;
24 and

25 (I) A process for appealing a decision made by a school
26 council.

27 (b)(1) The school council established under this section may implement
28 policies in the following areas:

29 (A) Curriculum, including needs assessment, curriculum
30 development, alignment with state standards, technology utilization, and
31 program appraisal;

32 (B) Assignment of all instructional and non-instructional
33 staff time; provision for planning time for instructional staff;

34 (C) Assignment of students to classes and programs within
35 the school;

1 (D) Determination of the schedule of the school day and
2 week, subject to the beginning and ending times of the school day and school
3 calendar year as specified in the personnel policies or negotiated agreement;

4 (E) Determination of use of school space during the
5 school;

6 (F) Planning and resolution of issues regarding
7 instructional practices;

8 (G) Selection and implementation of discipline and
9 classroom management techniques, including responsibilities of the student,
10 parent, teacher, counselor, and principal; and

11 (H) Selection of extracurricular programs and
12 determination of policies relating to student participation based on academic
13 qualifications and attendance requirements, program evaluation and
14 supervision.

15 (2) *The local board may grant to the school council other*
16 *authority as authorized by law.*

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18 SECTION 5. The State Department of Education *may* develop sample
19 guidelines to assist local boards of directors in the development of their
20 policies, and the department *may* provide professional development activities
21 to assist schools in implementing site-based decision making.

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23 SECTION 6. A local school building site that chooses to have site-
24 based decision making but wishes to be exempt from the administrative
25 structure set forth by this act may develop a model for implementing site-
26 based decision making including, but not limited to, a description of the
27 membership, organization, duties and responsibilities of a school council.
28 The local school building site shall submit the model through the local
29 district board of directors to the Director of the General Education Division
30 and the State Board of Education for approval. The application for approval
31 of the model shall show evidence that it has been developed by
32 representatives of the parents, students, employees of the school and that
33 two-thirds (2/3) of the certified employees voting in a secret ballot
34 election have agreed to the model.

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
