9 LEGISLATIVE AFFAIRS TO DO A COMPARATIVE ANALYSES OF THE
10 ARKANSAS CODE AND CORRESPONDING ADMINISTRATIVE REGULATIONS
11 RELATIVE TO THE ABUSE AND NEGLECT OF CHILDREN AND THOSE
12 RELATIVE TO THE ABUSE AND NEGLECT OF SENIOR CITIZENS IN
13 ORDER TO ENSURE COMPARABLE PROTECTION.

16 REQUESTING THE JOINT INTERIM COMMITTEE ON AGING AND
17 LEGISLATIVE AFFAIRS TO ENSURE THE ADEQUACY OF THE ABUSE
18 AND NEGLECT LAWS TO PROTECT THE ELDERLY POPULATION.

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20 WHEREAS, Arkansas has a significant Senior Citizen population that is
21 continuously growing as more out of state residents continue to choose
22 Arkansas as their retirement home;

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24 WHEREAS, because of improvements in medical technology, the elderly
25 population is living longer, which makes them more vulnerable to the problems
26 of abuse and neglect;

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28 WHEREAS, the adequacy of laws relative of the abuse and neglect of
29 adults has never been identified as an issue of concern in Arkansas, and
30 therefore, has not been analyzed;

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32 WHEREAS, problems of the abuse and neglect relative to our children
33 have been a pressing issue for several years and the statutes in this regard
34 have been reviewed intensely to ensure that there are adequate safeguards to
35 protect the safety of this population; and

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2 WHEREAS, wisdom dictates that Arkansas' elderly population deserves
3 the same protection.

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5 NOW THEREFORE,

6 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE EIGHTIETH GENERAL
7 ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS:

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9 THAT the Joint Interim Committee on Aging and Legislative Affairs is
10 requested to conduct a study of the Arkansas Code and corresponding
11 administrative regulations to determine if existing statutes safeguard our
12 elderly population from abuse and neglect at least as adequately as existing
13 statutes protect our children from abuse and neglect; and further, to develop
14 legislation to ensure comparable protection of this important segment of our
15 population.

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
