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28	SECTION 1. Beg	inning with the 1997-98 school year: (a	a) a unit of		
29	Arkansas history shall be taught as a social studies subject at each				
30	elementary grade level in every public elementary school in this state with			<u>:h</u>	
31	greater emphasis at the fourth (4th) and fifth (5th) grade levels, and (b) at				
32	least one (1) full semester of Arkansas history shall be taught to all				
33	students at the seventh (7th), eighth (8th), ninth (9th), tenth (10th),

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SECTION 2. The Director of the General Education Division of the State 1 Department of Education shall prepare and distribute no later than July 1, 1997, to each public school in this state and to the House and Senate Interim Committees on Education the course content guidelines for courses in Arkansas 5 history to be taught by the public schools of this state. Course quidelines shall ensure that the courses represent the most accurate and historically sound account of the pre-history, history and culture of Arkansas including the significant contributions and achievements of all segments of the population. Any revisions in the Arkansas history course content guidelines shall be reported to the public schools and the House and Senate Interim 11 Committees on Education no later than July 1 of the year the course guidelines 12 are to be implemented. 13 14 SECTION 3. Beginning July 1, 2001, no person shall be certified as a social studies teacher or as an elementary school teacher unless such person 16 has successfully completed at least three (3) hours of college course work in Arkansas history. However, Social Studies teachers and elementary school 17 18 teachers entering Arkansas from another state shall receive a one-year 19 nonrenewable provisional certificate to teach in Arkansas schools as authorized by $^{\circ}$ 6-17-403. The provisions of this section are not applicable to recertification of teachers certified prior to the effective date of this 22 act. 23 24 SECTION 4. Every public school district in this state shall provide 25 substantive and meaningful in-service training in Arkansas history for its teachers. The district may contract with an Education Service Cooperative to 27 provide the training. 28 29 SECTION 5. (a) Each public school superintendent in this state shall certify to the State Department of Education no later than June 1, 1998 and annually thereafter whether the school is in compliance with this act. 32 (b) The Director of the General Education Division of the State Department of Education shall report no later than July 1st of each year to the House and Senate Interim Committees on Education the identity of the

35 <u>schools which have reported compliance with this act, the identity of the</u>
36 schools which have reported non-compliance, and the identity of the schools

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1	which have failed to report.		
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3	SECTION 6. All provisions of this act of a general and permanent nature		
4	are amendatory to the Arkansas Code of 1987 Annotated and the Arkansas Code		
5	Revision Commission shall incorporate the same in the Code.

7	SECTION 7. If any provision of this act or the application thereof to		
8	any person or circumstance is held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect		
9	other provisions or applications of the act which can be given effect without		
10	the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this		
11	act are declared to be severable.		
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13	SECTION 8. All laws and parts of laws in conflict with this act are		
14	hereby repealed.		
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16	SECTION 9. EMERGENCY. It is hereby found and determined by the		
17	General Assembly that the Arkansas Code does not now require Arkansas history		
18	to be taught in the public schools in this state; that Arkansas history is not		
19	being taught in all public schools in this state; that such failure must be		
20	addressed as soon as possible; that this act establishes the mechanism to		
21	ensure that Arkansas history is taught in each public school in this state and		
22	that this act should go into effect immediately in order that it might be		
23	implemented in the 1997-98 school year. Therefore an emergency is declared to		
24	exist and this act being immediately necessary for the preservation of the		
25	public peace, health and safety shall become effective on the date of its		
26	approval by the Governor. If the bill is neither approved nor vetoed by the		
27	Governor, it shall become effective on the expiration of the period of time		
28	during which the Governor may veto the bill. If the bill is vetoed by the		
29	Governor and the veto is overridden, it shall become effective on the date the		
30	last house overrides the veto.
