18	BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS:
19	SECTION 1. <u>Title.</u>
20	This act shall be known and may be cited as "The High Cost
21	Transportation Funding Act of 1997."
22	
23	SECTION 2. Arkansas Code Annotated $^{\circ}$ 6-20-219 shall be repealed.
24	6-20-219 State transportation aid funds Operation of certain
25	school buses prohibited.
26	(a) The State Board of Education is authorized to formulate rules and
27	regulations for the administration of State Transportation Aid funds for the
28	public schools of Arkansas.
29	(b) Such regulations shall provide for a minimum of seventy dollars
30	(\$70.00) and a maximum of not more than two hundred eighty dollars (\$280) of
31	annual aid per average child transported under the pupil aid section of the
32	transportation aid formula which shall be paid to each school district
	operating a transportation program, provided, that in the event the State
34	Transportation Aid funds during any fiscal year are inadequate to pay each
35	school district the full amount of transportation aid according to the
36	regulations of the State Board of Education, the board shall make a percentage

1	reduction in the aid payable to the school district.
2	(c) Computation of annual aid per average child transported shall
3	include students in grades kindergarten through twelve (12).
4	(d)(1) Any school district which owns or operates any school bus
5	manufactured prior to April 1, 1977, shall cease operating such bus as a
6	regular route bus prior to the beginning of the 1993-94 school year and shall
7	cease to operate such bus for any purpose prior to the beginning of the 1995-
8	96 school year. For purposes of this section "regular route bus" means a bus
9	that is regularly scheduled to transport students to and from school.
10	(2) The State Board of Educations shall withhold all
11	transportation aid due a district found in violation of this section until
12	such time as noncomplying school buses are replaced.
13	(e)(1) Any state transportation aid funds distributed to a school
14	district under this section shall be used by the district only for those
15	purposes as enumerated by the State Board of Education as permitted uses of

17	(2) Any balance of state transportation aid funds on hand in any

22	SECTION 3. Title 6, Chapter 20 of the Arkansas Code Annotated is
23	amended by adding a Subchapter 17 to read as follows:
24	"6-20-1701. Title.
25	The title of the subchapter shall be "The High Cost Transportation
26	Funding Formula Act of 1997".
27	
28	6-20-1702. Definitions
29	As used in this subchapter, unless the context otherwise requires:
30	(1) Activity bus means a bus which is used to transport students for
31	participation in activities sanctioned by the Arkansas Activities Association
32	or other extracurricular activities sanctioned by the school district.
33	(2) Approved Transportation Unit means a school bus meeting all state
34	and federal safety standards for school bus construction and certified by the
35	manufacturer as a school bus. The school bus must be assigned to a regular

36 school bus route for transporting students to and from the public schools

1	during the regular school term. To qualify for state aid the bus must have a
2	capacity of at least eleven (11) students. All approved transportation units
3	shall be in good repair, sanitary, and in safe operating condition as
4	indicated by regular maintenance and safety inspections.
5	(3) Area means the number of square miles of land within the school
6	district boundary lines computed to the nearest whole section.
7	(4) Assigned school means the school site where a student receives
8	most of his/her academic instruction.
9	(5) Average Daily Membership (ADM) means the total number of days
10	attended plus the total number of days absent by students in grades
11	kindergarten through twelve (K-12) during the first three (3) quarters of each
12	school year, divided by the number of school days actually taught in the
13	district during that period of time rounded up to the nearest hundredth.
14	(6) Average Daily Transported (ADT) means the average number of
15	students transported daily in Kindergarten through Grade 12 (K-12). ADT is
16	based on the average of the first three quarters of the previous school year
17	rounded up to the nearest hundredth. Students eligible to be counted as the
18	average daily transported include resident students attending school within
19	the district and residing two route miles or more from their respective
20	assigned schools, legally transferred students under Arkansas Code Annotated $^{lpha}$
21	6-18-316, school choice students under Arkansas Code Annotated $^{ m 6}$ 6-18-206, and
22	tuition agreement students.
23	(7) Bus Seating Capacity means the rated seating capacity (indicating
24	the maximum number of persons to be accommodated) as designated by the
25	manufacturer.
26	(8) Density means the area in square miles of the school district
27	divided into the average daily transported in grades Kindergarten through 12
28	(K-12) rounded up to the nearest tenth.
29	(9) Disaster Aid means transportation aid payable to a school district
30	due to a natural or man-made disaster that causes a school district to re-
31	route one or more approved transportation units so that additional miles are
32	incurred above the previously established route for a minimum of twenty (20)
33	school days in which affected students are actually transported.
34	(10) Feeder Bus means a bus used to transport students from their home
35	to the bus line where they board an approved transportation unit. No
36	transportation aid shall be allowed for a feeder bus

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1	(11) Fleet Seating Capacity means the number approved transportation
2	units, by bus seating capacity, times the bus seating capacity of each
3	respective unit(s).
4	(12) Legally Transferred Students means students granted transfers
5	under Arkansas Code Annotated 🕯 6-18-316.
6	(13) Previous year means the school year immediately preceding the
7	school year in which funds authorized by this chapter are allocated.
8	(14) Resident Student means students in grades Kindergarten through 12
9	(K-12) living within the local school district.
10	(15) Route means an established regular course of travel used daily by
11	approved transportation units for the purpose of moving students to and from
12	their assigned school.
13	(16) School Choice Students means students attending a public school
14	in a district other than the one in which the student resides pursuant to
15	Arkansas Code Annotated 🖞 6-18-206.
16	(17) Shuttle Bus means a bus not used on the daily route, but used to
17	shuttle students from one school to another. Shuttle buses shall not be
18	counted for aid purposes as an approved transportation unit.
19	(18) Spare Bus means a bus that is held in reserve, an additional, or
20	extra bus which shall not be counted in the number approved for aid purposes
21	as an approved transportation unit.
22	(19) Special Units means a sixteen (16) passenger to eleven (11)
23	passenger school bus meeting all state and federal safety standards.
24	(20) Tuition agreement students means students attending school
25	outside the resident district under a written tuition agreement between the
26	resident district and the receiving district.
27	
28	6-20-1703. Calculation of Transportation Aid.
29	A local school district's base aid is determined by adding the school
30	district's student aid and depreciation allowance using the Worksheet for
31	Transportation in Arkansas Code Annotated $\degree$ 6-20-1716 and the formula
32	components set forth in Arkansas Code Annotated $\degree$ 6-20-1704.
33	
34	6-20-1704. Calculation of Transportation Aid Components.
35	(a) Calculation of Average Daily Transported
36	(1) Average daily transported may include resident students who

1	reside two route miles or more from their assigned schools. Districts may
2	count students who live in this area even if private transportation is
3	provided for these students, as long as a school bus is operated by the
4	district for the potential transportation of these students. The school
5	district must determine whether a student lives outside or within the two mile
б	distance for each assigned school using an established bus route.
7	(2) Average daily transported may include legally transferred
8	students, School Choice students, and tuition agreement students. However, a
9	legally transferred student, a School Choice student, or a tuition agreement
10	student may only be counted for average daily transported if the district
11	actually transports this student. Under Arkansas Code Annotated $\degree$ 6-18-206,
12	if both the resident district and the receiving district provide
13	transportation to a legally transferred student, a School Choice student, or a
14	tuition agreement student, both districts may count this student on their

16	(3) Average daily transported may not include students living
17	within the two mile distance of the assigned schools using an established bus
18	routes, even if students are picked up at courtesy bus stops within the two

20	(4) In order to verify average daily transported, all school

23	(i) The number of students who live outside the two route

35	(a) Base aid shall be modified by	applying two (2) factors to

33	(1) Multiply the number of approved transportation units
34	(excluding special units) times the maximum eligible average daily

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1	(2) Multiply the result from subsection (b)(1) times fourteen

10	6-20-1708. Application of minimum and maximum adjustment factors.
11	(a) A school district may not qualify for less base aid than the
12	minimum base aid, and it may not qualify for more than the maximum base aid.
13	(b) The adjusted base aid for which a district is qualified for shall
14	be:
15	(1) the school district's base aid if the base aid is less than
16	the maximum base aid calculated under 6-20-1707 and greater than the minimum
17	base aid calculated in 6-20-1706; or
18	(2) the minimum base aid calculated under 6-20-1706, if the
19	school district's base aid amount is less than its minimum base aid; or

36 <u>6-20-1710.</u> Workshop Aid.

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1	(a) In addition to the total amount of approved aid, a district shall
2	be entitled to workshop aid.
3	(b) Workshop aid shall be calculated as follows:
4	(1) Seventy dollars (\$70) will be paid to the school district for
5	each qualified route driver, substitute driver and/or activity driver employed
6	by the school district who attends the State Department of Education sponsored
7	in-service workshop. To qualify for the seventy dollars (\$70), attendees
8	shall hold a valid Class "A", "B", "C", or "D" drivers license with a "P"
9	(passenger) endorsement. Payment shall be made from an instructors' sign in
10	sheet containing name and license number.
11	(2) Three hundred fifty dollars (\$350) will be paid to the school
12	district for each school bus mechanic who attends the annual workshop for
13	mechanics sponsored by the State Department of Education.
14	(3) Resident districts or host districts that furnish instructors
15	for the in-service program shall be reimbursed for all expenses incurred in
16	the school bus driver training program. Instructors shall receive seven
17	dollars ( $\$7$ ) per qualified attendee, mileage at the current state allowable
18	rate and any related documented expenses associated with the in-service
19	program for bus drivers. Instructors will be paid one hundred fifty dollars
20	(\$150) for conducting a beginning school bus drivers workshop for schools.
21	All school bus safety instructors shall be employed full time by a
22	public/state educational institution. Payment is made during the current year
23	of instruction.
24	(4) Documented expenses for five (5) Arkansas Association of
25	Student Transportation Officers will be paid to the Southeastern States Pupil
26	Transportation Conference in July of each year. An officer elected at the
27	yearly meeting who cannot attend shall not be replaced with a substitute and
28	the attendance option shall be forfeited that year.
29	(5) Documented expenses for six (6) delegates to the National
30	Minimum School Bus Standards Conference will be paid. This conference,
31	conducted every five (5) years, established the standards for operational and
32	mechanical specifications for school buses nationwide. All delegates shall be
33	employed full time by a public school system and active in the school
34	transportation program. All delegates shall be approved by the Director of
35	the State Department of Education.

1	6-20-1711. Handicapped Aid.
2	(a) In addition to the total amount of adjusted base aid, a district
3	shall be entitled to Handicapped Aid.

33	(a) Districts may apply for disaster aid by completing an application
34	with written documentation of the natural or man-made disaster and returning
35	it to the State Department of Education.
36	(b) Disaster aid must be claimed during the school year in which the

16	aid divided by the required number of days equals aid per day. Aid per day
17	times the number of days not in attendance equals deductions for a shortened
18	school year. No deductions will be made if a waiver is granted by the State
19	Department of Education on the number of days in attendance.
20	(b) The State Department of Education may deny transportation aid on
21	children who are transported beyond a reasonable distance in cases where such
22	children can be satisfactorily accommodated to an approved school nearer their
23	residence. However, the State recognizes and supports that some districts may
24	choose to bus students greater distances to achieve further desegregation.
25	Superintendents are urged to survey conditions and propose agreements between

28	(c) The following penalties shall be assessed against districts:
29	(1) No transportation aid shall be granted to any district if the

31	(2) An indication of an inaccurate report may by the basis for an

33	(3) Base aid shall be withheld on any approved transportation
34	unit found operating in violation of the minimum standards as adopted by the
