20	The State of Arkansas, through the State Board of Education, and the General
21	Education Division of the Department of Education, must determine what
22	students must know and be able to do in order to meet the goals. This will
23	not simply require more students to learn what is already taught. Instead, it
24	will require a curriculum that places a greater emphasis on teaching students
25	to think, and to apply methods that are appropriate to ensure that all
26	students will master the more challenging curriculum.
27	(d) In order to achieve these new levels of performance within existing
28	and limited resources, Arkansas must fundamentally restructure its education
29	system. This means providing educators in every school with the flexibility
30	and tools they need to determine the best way to achieve the goals with their
31	students. It means providing them with the training they need to teach new
32	materials in new ways, and with leadership and other skills they need to work
33	together in new ways and succeed in a new education environment. Institutions
34	of higher education must commit themselves to effectively providing new
35	teachers with the content knowledge and pedagogical skills required to help
36	all students achieve the goals. Arkansas schools need new student performance

1	assessment tools that are well matched to new standards for student
2	performance, and that accurately measure what is taught. The results of these
3	performance assessment tools must be incorporated into school report cards so
4	that parents and the general public will be informed as to what students are
5	expected to know and to be able to do and how well Arkansas public schools are
б	performing.
7	(a) The General Assembly recognizes that students in Arkansas deserve
8	the best education that the citizens can provide and establishes a goal to
9	provide a quality educational opportunity to every public school student in
10	every community and in every school district in the state.
11	(b) The General Assembly acknowledges that the State of Arkansas must:
12	(1) Raise student academic achievement in the basic curriculum;
13	and
14	(2) Increase the number of students who complete the courses
15	required for graduation; and
16	(3) Ensure that students graduate with the knowledge and
17	preparation to be contributing members of society.
18	(c) The General Assembly further acknowledges that every
19	school district in Arkansas must graduate academically competent students,
20	have qualified teachers and administrators provide a safe, efficient, and
21	accountable program, and be supported by and assisted by the State.
22	(d) The General Assembly finds that in order for all involved in the
23	education of our young people to work to meet this challenge, a revision of
24	existing statutes is necessary.

28	"6-15-1003. Learner outcomes generally Academically competent students.
29	The State Board of Education shall by July 1, 1991, adopt learner

8	scientific problem solving), and social studies (history, geography,
9	economics, and civic education).
10	(b) Arkansas public school students will apply practical knowledge and
11	skills.
12	(1) Students will meet required academic standards in those areas
13	that will better prepare them for lifelong career opportunities.
14	(2) Students will achieve competency at the local level in
15	computer science and other technologies, practical economic and consumer
16	skills, and be offered courses in vocational-preparation skills.
17	(c) Arkansas public school students will demonstrate achievement.
