1	cooperative programs and activities involving the establishment and

5	(c) The commission shall have all the powers necessary to carry out its

SECTION 6. All provisions of this act of a general and permanent nature are amendatory to the Arkansas Code of 1987 Annotated and the Arkansas Code Revision Commission shall incorporate the same in the Code. SECTION 7. If any provision of this act or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications of the act which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this act are declared to be severable. SECTION 8. All laws and parts of laws in conflict with this act are hereby repealed. SECTION 9. EMERGENCY CLAUSE. It is found and determined by the General Assembly that the economic and societal changes that have occurred in the last half of the twentieth century have been driven primarily by major advances in the fields of science and technology; that these advances have caused unanticipated and dramatic shifts in the educational and skill requirements for the nation's workforce and wide disparities in the availability of economic opportunities within and between states; and therefore this act is necessary because of the rapid change in technology and resulting economic opportunities. Therefore, an emergency is declared to exist and this act being immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety shall become effective on July 1, 1999.
