26	with his family at age 9 to El Dorado, where he built his first structure.

36	WHEREAS, Fay Jones entered the University of Arkansas' 1 st class i	n

1 architecture, returned after World War II to teach architecture and 2 eventually became Dean of the University of Arkansas School of Architecture; 3 4 WHEREAS, Fay Jones is widely acknowledged as a man of brilliance and 5 6 integrity; a man who is patient, calm, generous, and profound and with a fine 7 sense of humor; and 8 9 WHEREAS, Fay Jones has designed more than 200 buildings in his career, 10 over 100 of those structures in Arkansas, including Thorncrown Chapel near 11 Eureka Springs and Mildred B. Cooper Memorial Chapel in Bella Vista; and 12 13 WHEREAS, Fay Jones' Thorncrown Chapel was voted the No. 4 building of the century by the American Institute of Architects, and in 1981, won the 14 American Institute of Architects Honor Award, and in 1991, was voted the 15 16 finest American building built since 1980; and 17 18 WHEREAS, Fay Jones won, in 1990, the American Institute of Architects' 19 highest honor, the Gold Medal, which was presented to him at a formal 20 ceremony at the White House by President George Herbert Walker Bush; and 21 22 WHEREAS, Fay Jones' work embodies spirituality and evokes serenity 23 through the employment of light, scale, proportion, balance and contrast, using the natural raw materials of Arkansas, stone and wood, orienting his 24 25 buildings to nature by conforming them to their sites and by opening them up 26 to the outside; and 27 WHEREAS, Fay Jones has created several buildings which are among the 28 29 greatest ecclesiastical buildings of the century, displaying a belief that 30 humanity can live in peace with nature; 31 NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE EIGHTY-32 THIRD GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS: 33 34 35 That this resolution is adopted in honor of Fay Jones, recognizing his many

contributions to architecture and the State of Arkansas.
