Arkansas Code 6-15-801 is repealed. 6-15-801. Title. 25 26 This subchapter shall be known and may be cited as the "School Report 27 Cards Act". 28 29 SECTION 2. Arkansas Code 6-15-802 is amended to read as follows: 30 6-15-802. Legislative intent. 31 In order to enhance the public's access to public school performance indicators and to better measure the dividends paid on the increasing public 32 33 investment in Arkansas' schools, the General Assembly finds that a separate office section of accountability should be established within the Department 34 35 of Education. The foremost obligation of this office section shall be to publish annual school report cards assessing the performance of schools and 36

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    school districts serving students in grades kindergarten through twelve (K-12)
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    inclusive, with comparable characteristics such as socioeconomic
    characteristics, size of districts, etc., across a range of indicators and
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    over a period of time, and providing information to set future performance
    goals for each school or school district and report academic progress.
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    coequal obligation of this office is to be accurate and open with the
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    department, the advisory committee, the subcommittee, and the public.
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                       Arkansas Code 6-15-803 is amended to read as follows:
           SECTION 3.
           6-15-803. Creation - Coordinator and Appropriate staff.
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           (a) There is created the Office of Accountability an accountability
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     section within the Department of Education.
           (b) The Director of the Department of Education shall establish a
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    coordinator an upper level management position and appropriate staff for the
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    office section.
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           (c) The coordinator and staff shall assist the citizens' advisory
    committee on accountability in the annual publication of school report cards,
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    as defined in this subchapter, and the performance of other duties as set
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    forth herein.

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           6-15-804. Advisory Committee on Accountability.
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           (a) To assist the Office of Accountability, there is established the
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    Advisory Committee on Accountability to be composed of the following members
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    who must be willing to devote adequate time to the work of the committee:
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                 (1) The Director of the Department of Education, or his designee,
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    who shall act as secretary to the advisory committee;
                 (2) Three (3) members of the business community with knowledge in
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    the particular areas of concern;
                 (3) One (1) member of the Senate;
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                 (4) One (1) member of the House of Representatives;
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                 (5) One (1) person from a list of three (3) names submitted by
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    the Arkansas Association of Educational Administrators;
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                 (6) One (1) person from a list of three (3) names submitted by
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    the Arkansas Education Association;
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                 (7) One (1) parent of a school-aged child; and
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1 (8) One (1) person from a list of three (3) names submitted by 2 the deans of the colleges of education of the institutions of higher learning 3 in the state. 4 (b)(1) The three (3) members from the business community, the parent, 5 the Arkansas Education Association representative, the Arkansas Association of 6 Educational Administrators representative, and the representative of the deans 7 shall be appointed by the Governor, subject to confirmation of the Senate. (2) The President Pro Tempore of the Senate shall appoint the 8 9 Senate member to a two-year term. (3) The Speaker of the House of Representatives shall appoint the 10 11 House of Representatives member to a two-year term. 12 (4) All voting members shall serve four-year terms. All terms shall expire on April 1. Membership is limited to two (2) terms. 13 14 (5) The director or designee and the legislative members of the 15 committee shall serve as advisory members without voting privileges. 16 (c) Nonstate employee committee members and legislative members of the 17 committee shall serve without compensation, but: 18 (1) The Legislative members shall be entitled to reimbursement of 19 expenses and mileage allowances for attendance at committee meetings at the same rate as is authorized by law for legislators' attendance at meetings of 20 21 interim committees of the General Assembly; and 22 (2) The nonlegislative members may receive expense reimbursement 23 in accordance with § 25-16-901 et seq. 24 25 Arkansas Code 6-15-806 is repealed. 26 6-15-806. Annual report - School report card. 27 (a) The Office of Accountability shall issue an annual report on the performance of each public school district in the state and, where feasible, 28 29 on the performance of each school within a school district. This report will be known as the "school report card" and shall be an index of each school or 30 31 school district's performance measured against statewide standards for comparable school districts and schools. The school report card shall make 32 33 comparisons to a school or school district's performance in preceding years 34 and project goals in performance categories. 35 (b) The school report card shall contain, but not be limited to, the 36 school district's or school's:

1	(1) Drop-out rate;
2	(2) Retention-in-grade rate;
3	(3) College-going rate;
4	(4) Attendance rate;
5	(5) Test scores on nationally normed tests;
6	(6) Corporal punishment rate broken down according to the

8	(A) Sex;
9	(B) Race;
10	(C) Age;
11	(D) Special education or regular classes;
12	(E) Type of offense; and
13	(F) Number of offenses;
14	(7) Number of students required to take remedial courses in high
15	school and college; and
16	(8) Ratio of expenditures per pupil on administrative, athletic,
17	and gifted and talented expenses.
18	(c) The school report card must be published no later than December 1
19	of each year, and it shall be published in a format that can be easily
20	understood by parents and other members of the community who are not
21	professional educators.

Findings and recommendations. 14 (a) The Advisory Committee on Accountability shall submit prior to 15 January 1 each year a written report containing its findings and 16 recommendations in regard to its specific areas of concern to the House and Senate Interim Committees on Education and the State Board of Education. 17 18 (b) The members of the committee shall receive, under the direction of 19 the Director of the Department of Education, assistance and cooperation of the 20 staff of the Office of Accountability and other related divisions within the 21 Department of Education, the Department of Higher Education, the Department of 22 Information Systems, and all other branches of state government as directed by 23 the respective agency directors. 24 25 Arkansas Code 6-15-1402 is amended to read as follows: SECTION 8. 26 6-15-1402. Purpose - Report - Confidentiality - Rules and regulations. 27 (a) In order to generally improve public school accountability, to 28 provide benchmarks for measuring individual school improvement, and to empower 29 parents and quardians of children enrolled in Arkansas public schools by 30 providing them with the information to judge the quality of their schools, the 31 Department of Education shall annually prepare and publish a school 32 performance report for each individual public school in the state, including 33 the Arkansas School for the Deaf, the Arkansas School for the Blind, and the Arkansas School for Mathematics and Sciences, and shall distribute the report 34 35 to every parent or quardian of a child in kindergarten through grade twelve (K-12) in the public schools of Arkansas. 36

1 (b)(1) The annual school performance report shall be based on reliable 2 statistical information uniformly required to be collected and submitted by 3 each local school district to the Department of Education and shall be 4 published in a format that can be easily understood by parents or guardians who are not professional educators and distributed to the parents or quardians 5 6 of children enrolled in the public schools via the postal service. Individual 7 school reports shall also be made available via the Internet. The information 8 necessary to produce the school performance report, including the names and 9 addresses of parents and quardians, shall be filed with the department. The department is strongly encouraged to contract with individuals or businesses 10 11 knowledgeable in the areas of graphic and computer design to ensure that the 12 school performance reports required by this subchapter are published in a 13 format that encourages their utilization by the citizens of the state. The department may enter into a contract arrangement with other parties in order 14 15 to provide appropriate printing and distribution services. 16 (2) The report for elementary schools shall include: 17 (A) Include three-year trend data and allow parents or guardians to compare the schools' school's performance with state and national 18 19 averages in areas and shall include, but not be limited to, the following 20 measures: 21 (A)(i) School safety; 22 (B) Di sci pl i ne; 23 (C)(ii) Norm-referenced test results; 24 (D)(iii) Criterion-referenced test results; 25 (E) Percentage of students promoted to the next grade 26 I evel: 27 (F)(iv) Certified staff qualifications; 28 $\frac{(G)}{(V)}$ Total per pupil spending; 29 $\frac{(H)}{(Vi)}$ Assessment of the local taxpayer investment 30 in the school district; 31 (1)(vii) Percentage of students eligible to receive 32 free or reduced-price meals; 33 (J)(viii) Average salary of the staff; and (K) (ix) Average attendance rates for students.; and 34 35 (B) Indicate separately whether: 36 (i) The school distributed the school's student

33	classified school employees, and volunteers have been provided with
34	appropriate student discipline training.
35	(c) School districts may prepare and distribute supplemental materials
36	concerning the information contained in the school performance reports.

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(d) The department is encouraged to include with school performance reports explanatory material regarding efforts to improve the state's public schools. The department is also encouraged to explore the feasibility of incorporating the school improvement plans developed by schools and school districts with the school performance reports.

- (e) The school performance report shall not include individual student information if the information is reported in a manner which would identify a particular student.
- (f) The department shall not disclose parent or guardian names, addresses, or other identifying information under any circumstances, and the department shall require any vendor, contractor, or supplier utilized to provide services under this subchapter to sign a confidentiality agreement which shall prohibit the disclosure of parent or guardian names, addresses, or other identifying information.
- (g) The Arkansas School for the Blind and the Arkansas School for the Deaf shall submit to the department the results of the appropriately adopted student achievement tests for the students enrolled at these schools. In addition, the Arkansas School for the Blind and the Arkansas School for the Deaf shall submit to the department a list of other schools' programs to which these schools can be compared.
- (h) The department is authorized to promulgate rules and regulations reasonably necessary to carry out the purposes of this subchapter regarding the annual school performance report.
- (i) The department shall issue the first annual school performance report no later than September 15, 2000 March 15th of each school year.
