WHEREAS, Fay Jones was born in Pine Bluff, Arkansas, January 31, 1921,
and has become world renowned as one of the 20th century's most innovative
and inspirational architects; and

WHEREAS, Fay Jones moved to Little Rock with his family at age 8, moved
with his family at age 9 to El Dorado, where he built his first structure, a
tree house, became an Eagle Scout, and graduated from El Dorado High School;

WHEREAS, Fay Jones served his country in the South Pacific during World
War II as a Navy pilot of dive bombers and torpedo bombers; and

WHEREAS, Fay Jones entered the University of Arkansas' 1st class in
architecture, returned after World War II to teach architecture and

1 eventually became Dean of the University of Arkansas School of Architecture;

4 WHEREAS, Fay Jones is widely acknowledged as a man of brilliance and
5 integrity; a man who is patient, calm, generous, and profound and with a fine
6 sense of humor; and

8 WHEREAS, Fay Jones has designed more than 200 buildings in his career,
9 over 100 of those structures in Arkansas, including Thorncrown Chapel near
10 Eureka Springs and Mildred B. Cooper Memorial Chapel in Bella Vista; and

12 WHEREAS, Fay Jones' Thorncrown Chapel was voted the No. 4 building of
13 the century by the American Institute of Architects, and in 1981, won the
14 American Institute of Architects Honor Award, and in 1991, was voted the
15 finest American building built since 1980; and

17 WHEREAS, Fay Jones won, in 1990, the American Institute of Architects'
18 highest honor, the Gold Medal, which was presented to him at a formal
19 ceremony at the White House by President George Herbert Walker Bush; and

21 WHEREAS, Fay Jones' work embodies spirituality and evokes serenity
22 through the employment of light, scale, proportion, balance and contrast,
23 using the natural raw materials of Arkansas, stone and wood, orienting his
24 buildings to nature by conforming them to their sites and by opening them up
25 to the outside; and

27 WHEREAS, Fay Jones has created several buildings which are among the
28 greatest ecclesiastical buildings of the century, displaying a belief that
29 humanity can live in peace with nature;

30

31 *NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE EIGHTY-THIRD GENERAL*
32 *ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS:*

34 That this resolution is adopted in honor of Fay Jones on his eightieth
35 birthday, and in recognition of his many contributions to architecture and
36 the State of Arkansas.
