31	of this act and shall indicate on the school's performance report under § $6-$
32	15-1402 if the district is in compliance, or if the district is not in
33	compliance, with this act.
34	(2) If the Department of Education determines that a school
35	district is not in compliance with section 1 of this act, the department
36	shall send the district written notification indicating any deficiencies in

1	the district's plan no later than January 1 of each year and allow the
2	district an opportunity to correct any deficiency.
