13	RECOMMENDING THAT THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED
14	STATES AND THE ARKANSAS CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION
15	REAUTHORIZE THE TEA-21 HIGHWAY AUTHORIZATION LAW
16	AND FUND THE FEDERAL HIGHWAY PROGRAM AT THE

20	RECOMMENDING THAT THE TEA-21 HIGHWAY
21	AUTHORIZATION LAW BE REAUTHORIZED AND
22	FUNDED AT THE HIGHEST POSSIBLE LEVEL.
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24	WHEREAS, Forty-five percent (45%) of Arkansas' major roads are rated in
25	poor or mediocre condition and twenty-six percent (26%) of its bridges are
26	structurally deficient or functionally obsolete; and
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28	WHEREAS, Arkansas received \$444 million in federal funding for highways
29	and bridges under the TEA-21 highway authorization law in FY 2002 while
30	Arkansas motorists generated approximately \$470 million a year in revenues
31	for the Federal Highway Trust Fund; and
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33	WHEREAS, the current highway authorization law, the Transportation
34	Equity Act for the 21st Century, expires on September 30, 2003,
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36	NOW THEREFORE,



BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE EIGHTY-FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE
 STATE OF ARKANSAS, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING THEREIN:
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That the 84<sup>th</sup> Arkansas General Assembly recommends to the Congress of the United States and the Arkansas Congressional Delegation that:

6 (1) The Transportation Equity Act for the 21st Century be reauthorized 7 by September 30, 2003, to guarantee that federal highway funding will be 8 maintained at the highest level possible, that the 2.5¢ per gallon motor fuel 9 tax on gasohol now deposited in the General Fund will be redirected to the 10 Federal Highway Trust Fund, that the 5.3¢ per gallon motor fuel tax exemption 11 on gasohol will be removed and revenues directed to the Federal Highway Trust 12 Fund, and the Federal Highway Trust Fund will be drawn down to the minimum 13 sustainable level; and

(2) That the minimum guarantee of federal highway funding to states
will be increased to ninety-five percent (95%), that the Revenue Aligned
Budget Authority will be continued and refined to avoid radical swings in
funding, that budget firewalls will be retained, and that federal-aid highway
programs will be combined into a minimum number of programs and categories;
and

(3) That the present emphasis for environmental streamlining for highway project development will be expanded, that incentives and not sanctions will be used to encourage achievement of certain program goals, that annual transit funding guarantees will be maintained, and that the matching share for transit will be retained at an eighty percent (80%) to twenty percent (20%) ratio;

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27 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED:

That, upon adoption of this resolution, the Secretary of the Senate shall transmit a copy of this resolution to the presiding officers of the Unites States Senate and the United States House of Representatives, and to each member of the Arkansas Congressional Delegation.

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
