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24	BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE EIGHTY-FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE
25	STATE OF ARKANSAS AND BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES, A MAJORITY OF ALL
26	MEMBERS ELECTED TO EACH HOUSE AGREEING THERETO:
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28	That the following is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of
29	the State of Arkansas, and upon being submitted to the electors of the state
30	for approval or rejection at the next general election for Senators and
31	Representatives, if a majority of the electors voting thereon at the election
32	adopt the amendment, the amendment shall become a part of the Constitution of
33	the State of Arkansas, to wit:
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35	SECTION 1. The State of Arkansas assumes the debt of all public school
36	districts and pledges its faith and credit for repayment of the indebtedness.



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2	SECTION 2. (a) The General Assembly, by law, may levy a uniform rate
3	of ad valorem property tax on taxable real, personal, and utility property in
4	the state. The revenue from the tax shall be used solely for the support of
5	public schools.
6	(b) The General Assembly, by law, may limit the taxing authority of
7	school districts.
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9	SECTION 3. The General Assembly, by law, may issue bonds or other
10	evidence of indebtedness pledging the full faith and credit of the state or
11	any of its revenues for the construction or repair of school facilities.
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13	SECTION 4. This amendment becomes effective January 1, 2005.
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
