| 14 | 6-18-1005. Student services program defined.                                |
| 15 | (a) A "student services program" is defined as a coordinated effort         |
| 16 | which shall include, but is not limited to:                                 |
| 17 | (1) Guidance and counseling services, which shall include, but              |
| 18 | are not limited to:   |
| 19 | (A) The availability of individual and group counseling to                  |
| 20 | all students;   |
| 21 | (B) Orientation programs for new students at each level of                  |
| 22 | education and for transferring students;                                    |
| 23 | (C) Academic advisement for class selection by                              |
| 24 | establishing academic goals in elementary, middle, and high school;         |
| 25 | (D) Consultation with parents, faculty, and out-of-school                   |
| 26 | agencies concerning student problems and needs;                             |
| 27 | (E) Utilization of student records and files;                               |
| 28 | (F) Interpretation of standardized criterion-referenced                     |
| 29 | and norm-referenced testing and dissemination of results to the school,     |
| 30 | students, parents, and community;   |
| 31 | (G) The following up of early school dropouts and                           |
| 32 | graduates;  |
| 33 | (H) A school-initiated system of parental involvement;                      |

- 17 (A) Evaluation of students with learning or adjustment

- 20 programs;
- 21 (C) Consultation and counseling with parents, students,
- 22 and school personnel to ensure that all students are ready to succeed and
- 23 that all students are preparing for college and work;
- 24 (D) A system for the early identification of learning
- 25 potential and factors which affect the child's educational performance;
- 26 (E) A system of liaison and referrals, with resources
- 27 available outside the school; and
- 28 (F) Written policies which assure ethical procedures in
- 29 psychological activities;
- 30 (3) Visiting teacher and school social work services, which
- 31 shall include, but are not limited to, the following:
- 32 (A) Providing casework to assist in the prevention and
- 33 remediation of problems of attendance, behavior, adjustment, and learning;
- 34 and
- 35 (B) Serving as liaison between the home and school by
- 36 making home visits and referring students and parents to appropriate school

- 2 (4) Occupational Career services, which shall include, but are
- 3 not limited to, the dissemination of career education information,
- 4 appropriate course-taking patterns, and follow up studies the effect of
- 5 taking more rigorous courses so that students are better prepared for college

- 7 (5) Group conflict resolution services, which shall include, but
- 8 are not limited to, the following:
- 9 (A) Educational and social programs that help students
- 10 develop skills enabling them to resolve differences and conflicts between

- 12 (B) Programs designed to promote understanding, positive
- 13 communication, and a greater utilization of a race relations specialist or
- 14 human relations specialist to assist in the development of intergroup skills;

- 16 (C) Programs designed to prevent bullying.
- 17 (6) Health services, which shall include, but are not limited
- 18 to, the following:
- 19 (A) Students with special health care needs, including the
- 20 chronically ill, medically fragile, and technology-dependent, and students
- 21 with other health impairments shall have an individualized health care plan.
- 22 (B) Invasive medical procedures required by students and
- 23 provided at the school shall be performed by trained, licensed personnel who
- 24 are licensed to perform the task subject to § 17-87-102(2)(D) or other
- 25 professional licensure statutes. The regular classroom teacher shall not
- 26 perform these tasks.
- 27 (C) Custodial health care services required by students
- 28 under an individualized health care plan shall be provided by trained school
- 29 employees other than the regular classroom teachers; and
- 30 (7) The distribution of a suicide prevention public awareness
- 31 program developed for distribution by the interprogram task force established
- 32 by the Lieutenant Governor's Teenage Suicide Prevention Task Force.
- 33 (b) School counselors shall spend at least seventy-five percent (75%)
- 34 of work time each week providing direct counseling related to students and
- 35 shall devote no more than twenty-five percent (25%) of work time each week to
- 36 administrative activities provided that the activities relate to the
