30	WHEREAS, ensuring that our senior citizens can live their retirement			t
31	years in dignity is a promise that each new generation of Americans must make			make

34	in Arkansas alone, more than five hundred thousand (500,000) of our citizens			ens
35	receive Social Security benefits; for many Arkansas seniors, Social Security			ity

1 mouths; this safety net must be maintained if we are to ensure that our 2 seniors will have a sound income in their golden years; and for many, it is all that stands between years of dignity and years of poverty; and 3 4 5 WHEREAS, Social Security is the most popular and successful government 6 program in the nation's history, and the benefits that are paid from Social 7 Security are protected against inflation and the risk of stock market 8 collapses; privatizing Social Security would be devastating to Arkansas; and 9 it would weaken the program and jeopardize the retirement benefits that our state's workers rely on; and 10 11 WHEREAS, Social Security works for working families and is essential to 12 workers who become disabled and to their families; nearly forty percent (40%) 13 of Arkansans who draw Social Security receive disability and survivor 14 15 benefits; a Government Accounting Office report shows most privatization 16 plans would mean a benefit cut for workers with disabilities; and without 17 Social Security's disability insurance, fifty-five percent (55%) of families with a worker with a disability would have incomes below the poverty line; 18 19 and 20

21 WHEREAS, women comprise the majority of Social Security beneficiaries, 22 representing almost sixty percent (60%) of all Social Security recipients age 23 65 and over; women are also less likely than men to have pensions or 24 retirement savings to supplement their Social Security checks; and without 25 Social Security, fifty-two percent (52%) of white women, sixty-five percent 26 (65%) of African-American women, and sixty-one percent (61%) of Hispanic 27 women over the age of 65 would live in poverty; and 28

29 WHEREAS, it is important that the impact of any changes in the Social 30 Security system does not fall disproportionately on lower income groups or on 31 those Americans whose work life has been physically demanding; Social Security remains especially important to African-Americans and other racial 32 33 and ethnic groups as they have traditionally been at the low end of the 34 earning scale over their lifetimes; and as a result, Americans of color are 35 less likely to have substantial individual savings and are generally more 36 dependent on Social Security in their retirement years; and

1 2 WHEREAS, we should encourage working families to build private pensions and savings on top of Social Security as the carving out of payroll taxes to 3 4 finance risky speculation in the stock market would undermine the assured 5 income that Social Security provides to the elderly and the disabled; and 6 7 WHEREAS, today's younger workers would bear the brunt of the so-called 8 transition costs in moving to an individual account system; private accounts 9 that drain money out of Social Security would cut its guaranteed benefits, increase the national debt by \$2 trillion, and pass the bill on to future 10 11 generations; and in addition to bearing the transition costs, workers 12 becoming disabled or dying young would not have had time to build up their 13 accounts; and 14 15 WHEREAS, privatizing Social Security would dismantle the program by 16 permitting some to use their Social Security contributions to play the stock 17 market and would cut guaranteed benefits by thirty percent (30%) even for workers who do not choose private accounts, 18 19 20 NOW THEREFORE, 21 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE EIGHTY-FIFTH GENERAL 22 ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS: 23 24 THAT the House of Representatives of the State of Arkansas commends 25 Senator Blanche Lincoln, Senator Mark Pryor, Congressman Marion Berry, 26 Congressman Vic Snyder, and Congressman Mike Ross on their leadership in the 27 fight to protect Social Security. 28 29 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the House of Representatives of the State 30 of Arkansas requests that the Arkansas Congressional Delegation work to strengthen and protect Social Security and to oppose efforts to divert Social 31 32 Security contributions to investment accounts. 33 34 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that upon adoption of this resolution, the Chief 35 Clerk of the House of Representatives of the State of Arkansas shall transmit 36 a copy to each member of the Arkansas Congressional Delegation.
