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21	WHEREAS, the surgeon General of the Public Health Service announced as
22	a goal the elimination by 2010 of health disparities experienced by racial
23	and ethnic minorities in health access and outcome in six (6) areas: infant
24	mortality, cancer screening, cardiovascular disease, diabetes, acquired
25	immunodeficiency syndrome and human immunodeficiency virus infection, and
26	immunizations; and
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28	WHEREAS, despite progress in the overall health of Arkansans, there are
29	continuing health disparities in the burden of illness and death experienced
30	by African-Americans, Hispanics and Native Americans, compared to the
31	Arkansas population as a whole; and
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33	WHEREAS, minorities are more likely to die from cancer, cardiovascular
34	disease, stroke, chemical dependency, diabetes, infant mortality, violence,
35	and in recent years, acquired immunodeficiency syndrome; and
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1 WHEREAS, there is a need for scientists in the fields of biomedical, 2 clinical, behavioral, and health services research to focus on how best to 3 eliminate health disparities; and 4 5 WHEREAS, individuals such as underrepresented minorities and women in 6 the workforce enable society to address its diverse needs; and 7 8 WHEREAS, behavioral and social science research has increased awareness 9 and understanding of factors associated with health care utilization and 10 access, patient attitudes toward health services, and risk and protective 11 behaviors that affect health and illness, and those factors have the 12 potential to be modified to help close the health disparities gap among ethnic minority populations, 13 14 15 NOW THEREFORE, 16 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE EIGHTY-FIFTH GENERAL 17 ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS: 18 19 THAT the House of Representatives of the Eighty-fifth General Assembly 20 recognizes that: 21 (1) An Arkansas Minority Health and Health Disparities Month should be 22 established to promote educational efforts to improve the health problems 23 currently facing minorities and other health disparities populations; 24 The Director of the Department of Health should present public 25 service announcements on health promotion and disease prevention among 26 minorities and other health disparities populations in Arkansas and educate 27 the public and health care professionals about health disparities; 28 The Governor should issue a proclamation recognizing the immediate 29 need to reduce health disparities in Arkansas and encouraging all health 30 organizations and Arkansans to conduct appropriate programs and activities to 31 promote healthfulness in minority and other health disparity communities; 32 (4) Federal, state, and local governments should work in concert 33 with the private and nonprofit sector to emphasize the recruitment and 34 retention of qualified individuals from racial, ethnic, and gender groups 35 that are currently underrepresented in the health care professions;

(5) The Department of Health should collect and report data on

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     health care access and utilization on patients by race, ethnicity,
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     socioeconomic status, and where possible primary language, to monitor the
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     state's progress toward the elimination of health care disparities; and
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                 (6) The information gained from research about factors
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     associated with health care utilization and access, patient attitudes toward
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     health services, and risk and protective behaviors that affect health and
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     illness, should be disseminated to all health care professionals so that they
     may better communicate with all patients, regardless of race or ethnicity,
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     without bias or prejudice.
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
