19	REQUESTING AN INTERIM STUDY BY THE HOUSE

25	WHEREAS, on February 19, 2005, we were reminded of the extremely
26	dangerous nature of highway-railroad crossings when three (3) ambulance
27	attendants were killed on a Saturday afternoon in broad daylight at a
28	railroad crossing in Hempstead County, Arkansas, which contained no warning
29	devices or crossing gates and which had been the scene of many fatal
30	accidents in the previous years; and
31	
32	WHEREAS, the extreme danger of highway-railroad crossings continues to
33	be one of the significant issues in highway safety in Arkansas where on a
34	ten-year average at least sixteen (16) Arkansas residents will die each year
35	and another fifty (50) Arkansas residents will suffer nonfatal injuries
36	annually at highway-railroad crossings in accidents between trains and

1 automobiles; and

WHEREAS, the railroad tracks of the various private railroad companies intersect with state highways, county roads, and city streets at approximately three thousand (3,000) at-grade highway-railroad crossings in Arkansas, and the private railroad companies have a stake in the costs and responsibility for rail crossing improvements for crossing gates and warning signals; and

10 WHEREAS, the State of Arkansas receives only two million four hundred 11 thousand dollars (\$2,400,000) annually in federal funds for railroad crossing 12 safety where the average cost of a set of railroad crossing gates and signals 13 can easily cost as much as two hundred twenty thousand dollars (\$220,000) per highway-railroad crossing, a railroad underpass can cost over five million 14 15 dollars (\$5,000,000), and a highway bridge and overpass can vary in cost from 16 five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000) in rural areas to over forty million 17 dollars (\$40,000,000) in heavily urbanized areas; and

WHEREAS, the Arkansas State Highway and Transportation Department currently spends no state funds for railroad crossing warning signals or crossing gates while most other states devote additional amounts of state revenues to improvements at highway-railroad crossings; and

WHEREAS, special fuels and petroleum products used by railroads are currently exempt from the Arkansas sales tax under Arkansas Code § 26-52-401(11)(A)(ii) and these or other funds could be a source of revenues for a state program of installing railroad crossing gates and safety warning systems at railroad and highway crossings in Arkansas; and

30 WHEREAS, aviation fuel sold in Arkansas is not exempt from Arkansas 31 sales tax and the revenues from this tax are deposited into the State 32 Treasury as special revenues for use by the Arkansas Department of 33 Aeronautics as grants to local airports and airfields to match federal funds 34 for airport improvements and navigation aids,

4 THAT the House Interim Committee on Public Transportation is requested 5 to conduct a study of the issue of highway-railroad crossing safety in 6 Arkansas to determine the amount of private funds that railroad companies 7 devote annually to the improvement of highway-railroad crossings in Arkansas 8 and to determine a proper balance of private and public funds, including the 9 expenditure of state revenues in addition to federal funds, for railroad 10 crossing warning signals or crossing gates for improvements at highway-11 railroad crossings in Arkansas.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that to study the feasibility of removing the sales tax exemption from special fuels and other petroleum products sold for consumption by railroads to be used by the Arkansas State Highway and Transportation Department for supplementing federal funds used to install railroad crossing gates and safety warning systems at highway-railroad crossings in Arkansas.
