(a) The Arkansas Advanced Placement <u>and International Baccalaureate</u>
 <u>Diploma</u> Incentive Program is hereby established, to be administered by the

4 (b)(1) Contingent upon legislative appropriations and based on
5 criteria established by the department, schools participating in the program
6 may be awarded a one-time equipment and instructional materials grant for
