6	a central office performing the administrative functions for all schools
7	within a county;
8	(5) "General administration support services" means activities
9	that are related to establishing and administering district policy, including
10	the activities of the district board of education, elections, reappraisal of
11	property, the overall general administration of the district, and the office
12	of the superintendent;
13	(6) "Operation and maintenance support services" means
14	activities related to the operating and maintaining of the plant, grounds,
15	buildings and equipment, maintaining general purpose vehicles including, but
16	not limited to, trucks, tractors, graders, and staff vehicles, and
17	maintaining order and safety in school buildings and on school grounds;
18	(7) "State funds" means:
19	(A) All money derived from state revenues and distributed
20	through the Department of Education Public School Fund; and
21	(B) Ad valorem property tax, up to the uniform rate of tax
22	established under Amendment 74 to the Arkansas Constitution and distributed
23	to the districts; and
24	(8) "Student transportation support services" means activities
25	related to the transporting of students to and from school and other
26	activities, including supervision, and vehicle operation and maintenance.
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28	6-13-1703. Countywide administrative units.
29	(a)(1) The administrative functions of public school districts shall
30	be administratively reorganized so that all schools in a county become one
31	(1) countywide school district and share one (1) countywide administration.
32	(2) The administrative reorganization required under this
33	subchapter is intended to require reorganization of only the administration
34	and administrative functions of a school district and shall not be construed
35	to require the consolidation of schools, the relocation of schools, the
36	closing of any facilities, or the transportation of students.

1	(b) For purposes of this subchapter, a school shall be considered	
2	within a county if the school district's principal administrative office is	
3	located in the county on January 1, 2005.	
4		
5	6-13-1704. Organization of countywide administrative units.	
6	(a)(1) The boards of directors of each school district within a count	
7	shall collectively meet to develop a plan to create a countywide	
8	administration and countywide interim board as allowed by under § 6-13-1406	
9	and in accordance with the provisions of this subchapter.	
10	(2) The plans shall be submitted for approval to the State Board	
11	of Education by April 30, 2006.	
12	(3) Each plan shall be drafted in a manner that:	
13	(A) Complies with all state laws, federal laws, state	
14	rules and regulations, and applicable court orders;	
15	(B) Is fair to all districts involved; and	
16	(C) Serves the best interest of the students served by	
17	each district.	
18	(4) The state board shall require the modification of any plan	
19	that is not in compliance with subdivision (a)(3)(C) of this section.	
20	(b) The state board may receive and hear petitions or move on its own	
21	motion to create countywide administrations of school districts in a	
22	timeframe to comply with the provisions of this subchapter.	
23	(c)(1) The state board shall cause the creation of countywide	
24	administrations in accordance with this subchapter effective July 1, 2006.	
25	(2) The state board may take action prior to July 1, 2006, as	
26	necessary for an orderly and efficient transition of administration and	
27	administrative functions on July 1, 2006.	
28	(d) No existing school administration shall be reorganized if the	
29	reorganization is prohibited by an existing court order.	
30	(e)(1) Countywide school boards established under this subchapter	
31	shall be created in compliance with existing laws for school district board	
32	of directors.	
33	(2) Additionally, each local school's parent advisory council as	
34	established in § 6-13-1801 may have a member serve as an ex officio nonvoting	
35	member on the countywide school board.

1	SECTION 2. Arkansas Code Title 6, Chapter 13, Subchapter 6 is amended
2	to add the following section:
3	6-13-635. Countywide school district boards of directors - Election
4	zones.
5	(a) Each countywide school district shall elect its board of directors
6	from single-member electoral zones with the exception that those school
7	districts with seven (7) or nine (9) board members may have two (2) of its
8	members elected at-large.
9	(b) On or before August 1, 2005, each school district shall produce
10	and file with the county board of election commissioners a map or a legal
11	description of its electoral zones to be used at the next school election.
12	(c)(1) At the 2005 annual school election, any school district whose
13	boundaries will be changed under § 6-13-1701 through §6-13-1704 or who
14	previously had a board consisting solely of at-large members shall conduct an
15	election at which all board members are elected.
16	(2) Members elected at the 2005 annual school election shall
17	begin their term of office on July 1, 2006, and the members serving on the
18	board immediately prior to the 2005 annual school election shall continue to
19	serve until June 30, 2006.
20	(3) At the first meeting of the board of directors following the
21	2005 school election in those school districts to whom subdivision (c)(1) of
22	this section applies, members shall draw lots for term lengths.
23	(d)(1) Upon completion of the 2010 decennial census and every
24	decennial census thereafter and ninety (90) days before the 2012 school
25	election and every subsequent school election falling two (2) years hence of
26	the decennial census, the school district shall redraw its electoral zones to
27	be in compliance with the federal Voting Rights Act of 1965 and the
28	Fourteenth Amendment of the United States Constitution.
29	(2) The election following the adjustment of electoral zone
30	boundaries shall be of the same manner as explicated in subsection (c) of
31	this section.
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33	SECTION 3. Arkansas Code \S 6-13-620(a)(4), concerning the powers and
34	duties of the local school board of directors, is amended to read as follows:
35	(4)(A) $\underline{(i)}$ Employ teachers and other employees necessary for the
36	proper conduct of the public schools of the district and make written

1	contracts with teachers and all other employees in the form prescribed by the	
2	State Board of Education.	
3	(ii) If a school district shares a countywide	
4	administration, the board of directors of each school shall not have the	
5	authority to hire a superintendent or other countywide administrative staff.	
6	A superintendent and countywide administrative staff shall be hired by the	
7	countywide school board.	
8		
9	SECTION 4. Arkansas Code § 6-13-109 is amended to read as follows:	
10	6-13-109. School superintendent. [Effective July 1, 2000.]	
11	(a) $\underline{(1)}$ The public school districts in the state shall each employ a	
12	superintendent of schools, whose qualifications and duties shall be	
13	prescribed by the General Assembly and the State Board of Education.	
14	(2) If a school district shares a countywide administration and	
15	administrative function, there shall be only one (1) superintendent for all	
16	of the districts served by the countywide administration who shall be hired	
17	by the countywide school board.	
18	(b) "Superintendent of schools" is defined as $means$ the executive	
19	officer of a school district board of directors directing the affairs of the	
20	school district and teaching not more than one-half (1/2) of the time in the	
21	school day.	
22		
23	SECTION 5. Arkansas Code Title 6, Chapter 13, is amended to add the	
24	following new subchapter:	
25	6-13-1801. Parent advisory council - Establishment.	
26	Each school shall establish a parent advisory council based on the	
27	following tenets:	
28	(1) A student's education is a responsibility shared by the	
29	school and family during the entire time that he or she spends in school;	
30	(2) Schools and parents must work as knowledgeable partners in	
31	order to support the goal of the schools to educate all students effectively;	
32	(3) Parents are integral components of a school's ability to	
33	provide for the educational success of students, although parents and	
34	students are diverse in culture, language, and needs;	
35	(4) The engagement of parents is essential to improve student	
36	achievement; and	

1	(5) Schools should foster a safe and secure environment that	
2	supports active parental involvement.	
3		
4	6-13-1802. Parent advisory council — Membership.	
5	(a) The parent advisory council shall consist of the school principal	
6	and no fewer than six (6) parents or legal guardians, representative of the	
7	grade levels, race, gender, and socio-economic status of the school's	
8	population.	
9	(b) No parent or legal guardian representative on the parent advisory	
10	council may be an employee of that school.	
11	(c) Each school shall establish policies regarding individual members'	
12	length of service on the council and filling vacancies.	
13	(d) Membership on the council shall be by nomination from the school	
14	principal and that school's organized parent group.	
15	(e) The countywide school district board of directors shall confirm	
16	nominations.	
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18	6-13-1803. Parent advisory council — Meetings.	
19	The parent advisory council shall be convened at least quarterly during	
20	the school year.	
21		
22	6-13-1804. Parent advisory council — Roles and responsibilities.	
23	(a) The parent advisory council shall recognize the principal as the	
24	chief academic and operational officer of the school.	
25	(b) The council also shall:	
26	(1) Annually review the school improvement plan, including the	
27	desegregation of achievement data from each tested grade or course in the	
28	school as well as the performance of the various student subgroups;	
29	(2) Annually review the school's report card, including the	
30	narrative of yearly progress based on current state and federal requirements;	
31	(3) Make recommendations encouraging regular, two-way meaningful	
32	communication with parents and legal guardians, including, but not limited	
33	to, publishing the school's process for resolving parental concerns,	
34	including whom to approach first and how to develop solutions;	
35	(4) Make recommendations regarding the school's parental	
36	involvement program, including activities such as sponsoring seminars to	

1	inform parents and legal guardians of high school students about how to be
2	involved in the decisions affecting course selection, career planning, and
3	preparation for postsecondary opportunities, as well as other activities to
4	promote parent participation;
5	(5) Provide input into the development of parental involvement
6	activities as required in the school improvement plan;
7	(6)(A) Make recommendations regarding appropriate professional
8	development activities to be included as part of the required professional
9	development for teachers and administrators.
10	(B) These professional activities shall enhance the
11	understanding of effective parent involvement; and
12	(7) Make recommendations regarding the school's collaboration
13	with community organizations for the purpose of enhancing student
14	achievement.
15	(c) The parent advisory council for each school may choose one (1)
16	member of the council to serve as an ex officio nonvoting member of the
17	countywide school board of directors.
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
