[Effective July 1, 17 2000.1 (a)(1) The Except as provided under subdivision (2) of this section, 18 19 public school districts in the state shall each employ a superintendent of 20 schools, whose qualifications and duties shall be prescribed by the General 21 Assembly and the State Board of Education. 22 (2) Upon the creation of countywide administrative units under 23 this § 6-17-1701 through 6-17-1704, neither the countywide school district 24 nor any school in the countywide administrative unit may employ a superintendent of schools, but shall employee in lieu of superintendents only 25 26 one (1) county chancellor of education to perform duties previously performed 27 by the separate superintendents and duties which shall be prescribed by the 28 General Assembly and the State Board of Education. (b)(1) "Superintendent of schools" is defined as means the executive 29 30 officer of a school district board of directors directing the affairs of the 31 school district and teaching not more than one-half (1/2) of the time in the 32 school day. 33 (2) "County chancellor of education" means the executive officer

8	(2) Schools and parents must work as knowledgeable partners in
9	order to support the goal of the schools to educate all students effectively;

14	achievement; and

10	communication with parents and legal guardians, including, but not limited
11	to, publishing the school's process for resolving parental concerns,
12	including whom to approach first and how to develop solutions;
13	(4) Make recommendations regarding the school's parental
14	involvement program, including activities such as sponsoring seminars to
15	inform parents and legal guardians of high school students about how to be
16	involved in the decisions affecting course selection, career planning, and
17	preparation for postsecondary opportunities, as well as other activities to
18	promote parent participation;
19	(5) Provide input into the development of parental involvement
20	activities as required in the school improvement plan;
21	(6)(A) Make recommendations regarding appropriate professional
22	development activities to be included as part of the required professional
23	development for teachers and administrators.
24	(B) These professional activities shall enhance the
25	understanding of effective parent involvement; and
26	(7) Make recommendations regarding the school's collaboration
27	with community organizations for the purpose of enhancing student
28	achievement.
29	(c) The parent advisory council for each school may choose one (1)
30	member of the council to serve as an ex officio nonvoting member of the
31	countywide school board of directors.
