SECTION 12. SPECIAL LANGUAGE. NOT TO BE INCORPORATED INTO THE ARKANSAS 25 26 CODE NOR PUBLISHED SEPARATELY AS SPECIAL, LOCAL AND TEMPORARY LAW. TRANSFER 27 AUTHORITY. The Director of the Department of Education, with the approval of 28 the Chief Fiscal Officer and after approval by the Arkansas Legislative 29 Council or Joint Budget Committee, is hereby authorized to request necessary 30 appropriation transfers and any other budget related adjustments necessary. 31 Determining the maximum number of employees and the maximum amount of 32 appropriation and general revenue funding for a state agency each fiscal year 33 is the prerogative of the General Assembly. Of the total amount appropriated for 30 Assessment/End-of-Level Testing for each fiscal year of the 2003-2005 2005-2007 biennium, up to \$500,000 may be authorized by the Director of the 31 32 Department of Education to be used to provide staff development training for 33 educational cooperatives, school districts, and for Department of Education 34 staff on such content areas as test interpretation, goal setting, educational 35 plan development, curriculum development, instructional strategies, classroom 36 management and for evaluation procedures.

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17 SECTION 21. COMPLIANCE WITH OTHER LAWS. Disbursement of funds authorized 18 by this act shall be limited to the appropriation for such agency and funds 19 made available by law for the support of such appropriations; and the 20 restrictions of the State Procurement Law, the General Accounting and 21 Budgetary Procedures Law, the Revenue Stabilization Law, the Regular Salary 22 Procedures and Restrictions Act, or their successors, and other fiscal 23 control laws of this State, where applicable, and regulations promulgated by 24 the Department of Finance and Administration, as authorized by law, shall be 25 strictly complied with in disbursement of said funds.

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27 SECTION 22. LEGISLATIVE INTENT. It is the intent of the General Assembly 28 that any funds disbursed under the authority of the appropriations contained 29 in this act shall be in compliance with the stated reasons for which this act 30 was adopted, as evidenced by the Agency Requests, Executive Recommendations 31 and Legislative Recommendations contained in the budget manuals prepared by 32 the Department of Finance and Administration, letters, or summarized oral 33 testimony in the official minutes of the Arkansas Legislative Council or 34 Joint Budget Committee which relate to its passage and adoption. 35

36 <u>SECTION 23. EMERGENCY CLAUSE.</u> It is found and determined by the General

1	Assembly, that the Constitution of the State of Arkansas prohibits the
2	appropriation of funds for more than a two (2) year period; that the
3	effectiveness of this Act on July 1, 2005 is essential to the operation of
4	the agency for which the appropriations in this Act are provided, and that in
5	the event of an extension of the Regular Session, the delay in the effective
6	date of this Act beyond July 1, 2005 could work irreparable harm upon the
7	proper administration and provision of essential governmental programs.
8	Therefore, an emergency is hereby declared to exist and this Act being
9	necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and
10	safety shall be in full force and effect from and after July 1, 2005.
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
